AN EXAMPLE TO FOLLOW

WE make no apology for using for our opening editorial a notice which has been exhibited in the Rafters clubroom for all their members to see and a copy of which was sent to the *Digest* by their secretary, Mr. Eric Caird.

It expresses a view which has several times been voiced in this column and it is pleasing to see that at least one club is determined to set a worthy example to the League. In his accompanying letter Mr. Caird expresses the hope that in making the notice public through the Digest, other clubs will take similar action—a hope we strongly endorse. Here is the notice.

At the club's A.G.M. on September 8, 1959, it was agreed that the general standard of turn-out in the Liverpool League left a great deal to be desired, as a result of which the members agreed that the committee of the Rafters Club should be empowered to enforce club Rule 22, which was amended at the aforementioned General Meeting, to read as follows:—

Any member of the club selected as a member of any of the club's teams must wear (1) royal blue shirt with club badge; (2) lower garment of grey material, if possible; (3) white socks; (4) white gym shoes.

It will be noted that all the four constituent parts of the above rule are obligatory with the exception of section 2 which specifies that the lower garment should be of grey material, IF POSSIBLE. In making this an optional clause the members had in mind that individuals might not wish to be committed to the expense of new lower garments of a grey material where they had perfectly good clothing of a different colour, but the hope was expressed that as and when these items become due for renewal they will be replaced by ones made of grey material.

A specific request is made to all members that white gym shoes are cleaned at frequent intervals.

THE Liverpool Boys' Association has now with the help of the has now, with the help of the Liverpool League, affiliated through the county to the E.T.T.A. opens the way for further cooperation between the two organisations, and I appeal once again to any club interested to contact me.

Clubs interested in the scheme will not tie themselves to hard and fast commitments. I will put secretaries of such clubs in touch with the secretary of their nearest L.B.A. club, and let them talk over the ways in which they can help

each other.

The L.B.A. now has 50 teams playing organised table tennis under the rules of the E.T.T.A. and this supply of young players, if catered for by the League clubs when they are 18 and leave the L.B.A., can make a tremendous difference to the future of the Liverpool League, and, of course, your own club.

PASSED TEST

Last season I asked for more members to take an interest in umpiring and try for their County Umpire's Badge. Three members of the League have since applied for test papers, and one, your chairman. Mr. Arthur Upton, successfully passed his practical test at the North of England Approved in October and has been awarded his badge. He has set the example -why not follow it.

The Committee has in its possession an official measure, supplied by the E.T.T.A., for measuring sand-wich bats. I hear that a few bats now in use in the League do not conform to the official ruling.

Many alterations have been made to the handbook since it was printed, more than any other season, and some thought must be given to this next year. If you have any suggestions I shall be pleased to hear them, but please don't suggest that the closing date for entries be put back.

Success and Failure

THE league has still further increased the number of teams competing in the Lancashire and Cheshire League this season, by the addition of a second junior team, making in all two men's teams, two women's and two junior.

Ted and Peter Rumjahn, respectively, have once again been appointed honorary playing captains of the men's first and A teams, while Eileen Mansell again takes charge of the women's first team. The women's A team will be in the very capable and experienced hands of Mrs. Ivy Crafter, who will doubtless be of great help to the players in her side.

Alec Gauld becomes non-playing captain of the first junior side, while Joe Ellison will have a similar role with the A team.

Although as I pen these notes neither of the senior sides has yet begun its league fixtures, both have been in action in the national competitions—the Wilmott Cup and the Rose Bowl respectively.

The men, represented by A. C. Taylor, N. R. Jones and R. Gunnion, duly put paid to Chester's hopes of further advancement in the Wilmott Cup, but the women suffered the indignity of once again being eliminated from the Rose Bowl at the first hurdle, this time by Stockport to the tune of eight sets to one.

RESOUNDING WIN

Taking the men's tie first, one must give credit to the Liverpool trio for achieving such a resounding victory at the Wavertree Labour Club, although to be fair the Chester side was rather weak and always under pressure. When one considers that of the nine sets played only one required three games to settle the argument, it must have been disheartening for the visitors.

Taylor was in his most dominating mood, keeping his trajectory so low and consistent that the highest number of points scored against him in any of his six games was 14. Norman Jones played well within himself, being content to gain an advantage and keep it.

For young Ralph Gunnion it was a happy if somewhat subdued

baptism, but one cannot do more than win all one's sets and he did just that.

It was an excellent start for the Liverpool team. The next round of the cup will probably be against Burnley or Blackpool, either of which will provide considerably tougher opposition.

Now what of the women's effort against Stockport at the Bohemians club, when Liverpool were represented by Mrs. Moya Jones, Mrs. Joyce Randall and Miss Julie Roberts?

All the Stockport players used the sandwich bat which probably did not help our girls, but be that as it may, Moya Jones was our only winner and one cannot but say that she alone of the Liverpool team appeared capable of seriously challenging the visitors.

It is an unfortunate fact that we are unable to field a side at present to stand up to such teams as Stockport, Manchester and Blackpool. The Liverpool League can surely never have been so devoid of top class women players as it is at the moment, and it is difficult to see a solution to the problem in the immediate future.

FLYING START

The only team, as I write, to have begun its league fixture is the men's A team, which played Wirral A on the other side of the water. Wally Allanson, John Cain and Ron Jones gave them a flying start with a clear cut 9-1 victory. Here again only two of the sets required three games for a decision. It was a most encouraging win and one cannot help feeling that the team has a grand chance of winning their division on the form shown in the first match.

The main attraction this month will be the clash on Friday, November 20, between Liverpool and Manchester, which will be played at Liverpool Y.M.C.A. at 7.30 n.m. I do recommend this encounter and am sure that spectators will go home well satisfied with their evening's entertainment. The Liverpool team will again be Taylor, Jones and Gunnion.

PROBLEMS FOR SELECTORS

PITY the poor members of the Selection Committee who have to choose players for the two junior teams to represent the League in the Lancashire and Cheshire League. No matter what decision they reach, they are bound to have made a mistake in some people's view.

But no one can accuse us of not trying to do our best. Two trials were held—one at Balfour where there were two tables, and the other at Wavertree Labour—at which 27 of our juniors demonstrated something of their mettle. And quite frankly what the selectors saw was most encouraging and gave hopes of our being able to retain the junior championship of the two-counties league.

The trouble is that only three players can appear in either the first or second teams and there were about four or five youngsters who made great claims for inclusion in the first team and a similar number who did likewise for the second string.

That is the reason why I ask you to pity the poor selectors. Some of the results produced at the trials seemed most contradictory and we had to try and judge whether "A" was a trifle lucky in winning or whether "B" was similarly unlucky in being beaten.

Then, of course, we hear of results in league matches which just play haywire of what we saw at the trials. But I suppose it is all those things which go to make table tennis an interesting game.

In my opinion we must concentrate on the first team and try to get our best players into it while

we can play about with the second team in such a way that we can give half a dozen boys a chance of showing what they can do in keenly competitive matches. Of course, that is simply my own view and it would have to be endorsed by the other members of the selection committee.

In the meantime I would like to ask all the boys chosen to play in either the first or second team to be as helpful to the two non-playing captains—Mr. Alec Gould for the first team and Mr. Joe Ellison, who will be in charge of the second—as were the four who played in our only team last season. Remember those two gentlemen are giving up their valuable time for your benefit.

What I found even more encounting was that among the 27 who appeared for the trials there were three or four youngsters just reaching their teens who showed great promise. It seemed to me that their clubs had a wonderful chance of developing them into first-class players, as much to their own benefit as that of the league, and I would strongly appeal to the officials of those clubs to see that those youngsters get plenty of coaching and guidance along the right lines.

We seem at the moment to have more young players taking part in league games than we have had for many years. Can we think that this is a good augury for the future? It should be if the senior players of the league will give them the right encouragement and help. They are the players we will look to in the future to uphold the name of the league.

The Ron Jones Epic

IWO years ago Trevor Ellis, then playing with the University. provided the big surprise of the Merseyside Open when he came within an ace of beating J. Somogyi, the former Hungarian who is now ranked No. 3 in England and who went on to win the title.

This year it was Ron Jones, of Liverpool Y.M.C.A., who was the surprise packet. But he went one better than Ellis for he beat Somogyi's fellow countryman, G. Muranyi, in a terrific battle 21-14 21-23 21-13 in the third round of the event

And that was not the whole Jones story for in the previous round he had convincingly beaten

round he had convincingly beaten the young Welsh international, Gelin Thomas, of Llandudno, 21-14 21-13, and still earlier had disposed of Ralph Gunnion, of Bootle Y.M.C.A. Trunning high of a Liverpool player appearing in the semi-finals for the first time for many years, when Jones went on to play Vin Hankey, of Stockport, in the quarter final, but we were doomed to disappointment for doomed to disappointment for Hankey played some great table tennis to beat the Y.M.C.A. player 21-16 21-12.

STRENGTHENED CLAIM

It must have been an even greater disappointment for Jones but he look back on this year's tournament with not a little satisfaction for during the several rounds he played some brilliant table tennis. And, incidentally, he must have, at the same time, greatly strengthened his claim for inclusion in the league's senior representative team.

But if we were not to see Jones in a semi-final, we had the consolation of seeing yet another young member of our league in the final of the boys' singles. He was 'fed Briscoe, of Liverpool Y.M.C.A., and if he was unable to match the victory of Derek Craig last year, he gave a fine account of himself against Colin Thomas before eventually losing 18-21 16-21.

He, too, must have given the Selection members of the Committee food for thought.

Although this year's Merseyside was disappointing from the point of view of the local entry, especially for the men's singles—causing the usual Friday night's play to be cancelled-there was nothing disappointing about the play seen during the whole of Saturday. The trouble which most of the onlookers found was to select the interesting matches to watch, so many fine games were being played at the same time.

It was probably the most open men's singles for many years and he would have been a brave man who would have gambled Saturday morning on a victory for Laurie Landry, of Middlesex. He did so by beating Jeff Ingber 21-18 21-15 in the final but must have considered himself a trifle fortunate in finding the Manchester player contribute to his own defeat by hitting several wild shots in each game, all of which cost him valuable points. At the same time one must record that Landry gamely over-came the handicap of cramp in his left leg.

Pam Mortimer, of Birmingham, went one better than on her last visit here when she was beaten in the final by Ann Hayden. It looked at first as though she was to meet the same fate at the hands of Betty Bird, of Surrey, when the latter took the first game, but the Birmingham player fought back to assume command of the set and take the next two games.

Strong bid by Cain & Co.

AFTER four weeks of league warfare, it is pleasing to record the success of a number of the younger players in our division.

Pride of place must go to Ralph Gunnion, of Bootle Y.M.C.A., one of the few unbeaten players to date, who has fully earned his place in Liverpool's Wilmott Cup team by victories over such notables as J. Cain, V. Chesham, T. Ellis, B. Hand, Ron Jones and M. Lijinsky.

John Cain, of Liverpool Y.M.C.A., distinguished himself by beating champion Arthur Taylor in the Y.M.C.A.—Bath Street match, a fine feat for young Cain.

It must be many years since such a young team was able to make a strong bid for the championship, but Liverpool Y.M.C.A. are certainly setting the pace this season and lead by one point from Balfour, Rafters and Victoria Park.

Surprise result to date was the Bath Street win over Balfour by eight sets to two. Suffering their first defeat in two seasons, Balfour contributed to their own downfall by forfeiting four events due to the non-arrival of two of their star players, Norman Jones and Les Mulholland. It must be remembered, however, that Bath Street were leading by four events to two, with A. C. Taylor and W. Allanson still having an event each to play. A draw or even a win was quite within their reach.

Finally, a worthy mention for veteran John Coveney, of Liverpool Y.M.C.A. A. Coveney has been largely responsible for his newly promoted teams excellent start to the season, with wins over R. Rumjahn, W. Harris, R. Grayson, T. Ellis and B. Townsend.

AFTER four matches Anfield A are the only team in the Second

Division with a 100 per cent record. In spite of this, however, they have close rivals in Victoria Park A and Waterloo Dock.

The Anfield club has been strengthened by their acquisition of Stan Draper, after 13 years with Bohemians. The team order of Bintley, Sanders, Draper, Cuff and Reg Gray, junior, seems strong but they were not properly tested in the first month of the season. They will probably find that Victoria Park A, Waterloo Dock and Litherland are much tougher opposition.

The Park and Litherland have already met and produced a drawn result. Doubles came from Ken Anderson and Clayton for Litherland, with one set from Killip, while Tarr and Carroll, with two each, and Houghton (one) replied for the Park.

Litherland also had a 6-4 win over Waterloo Dock, thanks mainly to two sets from Killip.

Although it seems early in the season for forecasting, I'll stick mv neck out and give Litherland to return to the first division, accompanied by either Victoria Park A or Waterloo Dock.

Rather surprisingly Balfour A have done nothing of note as yet. On only one occasion have they turned out what would appear to be their regular opening order—Davies, Wallace and Eileen Mansell. They have already been beaten 8-2 by Victoria Park A. No doubt Mal Wallace's absence contributed but perhaps Park's table also had something to do with it.

At the other end of the table Bohemians A and Oakhill A look like having a lean season.

An individual note—Cadwa's Arthur Jones did not concede a game in his first four matches, all being won two straight.

STERN FIGHTS LIKELY

THE first month's result in the Third Division point to Victoria Park B and R.A.F.A. as two of the strongest teams in the Third Division. Both were still undefeated at the end of that period and if their first results are a true indication of their form they will prove difficult to overcome. When the teams met in October the result was a draw, thanks to S. Butchart defeating E. Cameron 24-22 in the third game.

Neither Victoria Park nor R.A.F.A. are likely to get all their own way, however, for several teams will undoubtedly be making a strong challenge to their leadership, with perhaps Beauclair and Waterloo Park A leading the way.

Brian Pardy, of Beauclair, maintained his 100 per cent record during the first month and became the only undefeated player in the division.

Players with seven wins out of eight sets included J. Roberts (R.A.F.A.), Mike Truman and B. Capper (Victoria Park B) and H. Reeve (Linacre).

Balfour B have made a disappointing start to the season. Last season when playing in the Fourth Division they lost only one league match but already they have been beaten by Fairlawn (7-3) and Reauclair (9-1), both of which look like convincing defeats.

Admittedly they routed Bootle Y.M.C.A. B to the tune of 10-0, but the Bootle team contained some very inexperienced players, It therefore looks as though the Balfour side are going to find it tough going in this division this season.

WITH the 1959-60 season only a month old, the first results indicate that the Fourth Division

is going to produce a keen and close contest for promotion and an equally keen fight at the other end to avoid relegation.

Leading the division with four victories to their credit are the strong Liverpool Y.M.C.A. B team. The inclusion in their ranks of G. Smith and Ted Briscoe has already brought them successes over the Police and Cadwa A, two of the teams which appear most likely to be challenging them for honours at the season's end.

Incidentally the Y.M.C.A. B and the University are the only teams with 100 per cent records at the end of a month's play, and Bohemians B, unfortunately for them, are the only team still pointless.

The University have been strengthened this season by the signing of Mel Snyder, who last season played for Harold House, and they could be the team to upset the Y.M., especially if B. Jacobs, who makes a rare appearance for them, is available for those matches.

Victoria Park C drew two of their first three games, against the Police and Cadwa A, and although they have used the same five players in each match they have appeared in a different playing order on each occasion, which doesn't usually make for good results.

At the bottom of the table, Linnets B and Bohemians B will both need strengthening if they are going to avoid relegation at the end of the season.

Everybody will be pleased that Litherland B, after a pre-season withdrawal, have re-entered the fray of the division and the general hope will undoubtedly be that they enjoy a successful season.

TELECOMS' BRIGHT START

THE withdrawal of Litherland C and Aigburth from the league has hit the Fifth Division badly and the result is that on average only four matches are played each week. We must be doubly glad therefore that the further withdrawal of Florence Oxton, which at one time looked certain, was avoided and that the Mill Street club, who have been members of the league for so long, have been able to continue.

For years they have worked on a minimum of players so that the loss of a couple of them was a much more serious blow for them than it would have been for most clubs. Fortunately they have been able to recuperate their strength and continue to play.

All the other teams in the division will be more than glad that this has been possible, not only for the fact that the loss of yet another team would have made a hash of the division, but also because one is always assured of a good sporting game at the institute.

With things so uncertain it was not surprising that after opening the season with a convincing win over Bath Street B fortunes declined at Mill Street in the following weeks, but under the leadership of Eddie Moran they could easily improve and make Florence Oxton worthy opponents for any team.

As it is after the first month's play Waterloo Dock A and Anfield B held the joint leadership of the division, both, oddly enough, having dropped their single point in their opening matches. The Railwaymen, however, held a slight advantage in sets average.

Hard on their heels came Lussac and if the draw to which they held Waterloo Dock in the first match is any indication of future events, we are going to see all three teams fighting it out for the leadership of the division.

At the time of writing Lussac have an outstanding match to play with Oakhill B. There was apparently some dispute about the match and the Management Committee have ordered that it must be replayed.

Bath Street B are out on a limb for at the end of a month's play they had still to collect a point. But they need not be too downhearted for three other teams, Bootle Y.M.C.A. C, Police A and Oakhill B, were only able to register one victory each in the same period.

TELECOMS have made an excellent start to the season in the Sixth Division. Out of their first four matches they had four wins to their credit. Compare this with last season when during the whole term they won only seven matches, It certainly looks as though they will improve on that total this term.

Much of their success has been due to C. L. Jones and D. P. Lowe, both of whom conceded only one game in the first month of play, both, incidentally, to Bootle Nalgo.

Wavertree Labour are going to prove strong candidates for promotion. Convincing wins over Wavertree Baptists (8-2), Domestic Mission (8-2) and Liverpool Post Office (7-3) indicate the strength of the Labour Club's team and opponents will find that Farquharson, Chaloner, Hurworth and McEvoy are a formidable combination to beat.

Other players with good results during the first month included G. Fletcher (Co-op), L. French (Fairlawn A), C. Barton (Bohemians C) and R. Blackmore (Rafters C). Each lost only one game during that period.

Making Their Mark

On the other hand there are three players in the division who had still to register their first victory. Let's hope their luck changed quickly, for it's no fun being continually on the losing end.

THE Royal Ordnance Factory are certainly making their mark on their return to the league after an absence of several seasons. After dropping a point in their opening match against Bath Street C in the North Region they went on to take their next three games, including among their victims Waterloo Park B who could well be one of the most serious challengers for the region championship.

Much of R.O.F.'s success has undoubtedly been due to their No. 1, P. Wilkinson, who in his first month's play conceded only one set—to young Chris Coveney, who beat him 21-19 21-15. Apart from that set his hardest tasks have been to beat A. Rumph, of Waterloo Park B, to whom he dropped the first game 22-24 and then went on to take the next two 22-20 21-17, and to defeat R. Reynolds, of Warbreck A (21-16 16-21 21-17).

Their next most successful player was P. Scott, who won five of his first eight sets, two of them when beating B. Crummy and A. Hurst (Bootle Y.M. D), the latter after being dropped in the team sheet from No. 2 to No. 3.

One of R.O.F.'s best victories was that scored over Warbreck A by six sets to four, when M. Starky gave his skipper fine support by beating C. Stock (21-12 22-20) and P. Griffiths (21-16 22-20).

It was the only defeat which the Warbreck team suffered in the first month, during which their most successful player was G. Hill. He must be one of the most useful No. 5's in the region for he won all his eight sets in that period and was only once taken to three games. That was by D. Connell, of Bath Street, when the scores were 13-21 21-18 21-17 for Hill.

Warbreck are also fortunate in having a player of the calibre of J. Millin available when they want him. He played in two of the first four matches and on each occasion won both his sets, first at No. 3 and then at No. 1.

Threatening to make as strong a challenge as their B team are Waterloo Park C. Their one defeat in the first month was at the hands of Warbreck and even then were only beaten 6-4 when playing a reserve in E. Joyce.

THE leadership of the South Region certainly looks as though it will be a tough battle this season, with four clubs unbeaten in the first month's play, Liverpool Y.M.C.A. C and Liverpool C.C. both having won their first four matches and Fairlawn and Beauclair their first three.

Out of their four games the Y.M.C.A. dropped only three sets and two of those were to Linnets C who have now dropped out of the league and for whom only two players turned up for the match. Ken Jones, who won the two sets for Linnets in that game, is now playing well in the fourth division.

Nevertheless the Y.M.C.A. record is an impressive one and it is obvious they are going to take some beating.

In the same period the Cricketers conceded the same number of sets as the Y.M., two of which were lost in their first match of the season against Crawfords A when Mrs. D. Lewis was the unfortunate victim. In L. Lewis they have a fine No. 1, as his record for the first month showed. During that period ne was scarcely troubled by any of his opponents. Only once was he taken to three games—by J. Dunan, of Balfour D.

Beauclair A have now John McKim playing at No. 1 and he made a highly successful start to his season. He carried off all six sets in his first three matches and was only once really extended—by J. Higham, of Oakhill D, when he needed three games to win.

There is obviously very little to choose between all five of the Fairlawn B team. The three sets they lost in their first three matches were dropped by their Nos. 1 and 2, Evans losing to Higham of Oakhill and Wilcox of Wavertree Labour, Carter also being beaten by Higham.

At the other end of the table Oakhill, Crawfords B and Wavertree Labour were still looking for their first victory at the end of the month. Indeed, the general outlook at the Crawfords club must be pretty grim for their A team secured only one victory to their credit and their B team won only four of their first 40 sets.

Taking a general look at the region thus early in the season, it looks as though it will be split into two distinct halves, with a strong portion at the top and a weak one at the bottom.

THE East Region is, at the time of writing, a very open competition, with Police B, Crawfords, Anfield C, Wavertree Labour A and St. Edward's O.B. all getting off to a good start. To hazard a guess as to the eventual champions of the region would, at this stage, be unwise but from the matches I have seen and the score cards to date, it would seem obvious that one of those five will finish at the top.

New team St. Edward's are the bio surprise, and with their No. 1, G. O'Keefe, and their No. 2, T. C. Smith, both unbeaten in the first month's matches. their future looks very bright.

Police B, relegated from the Sixth Division this season, have only conceded one point so far and that was to St. Edward's. It seems a pity that their hopes should always be overshadowed by their inability to turn out their strongest side each week. This is obviously due to their fluctuating hours of duty.

Wavertree Labour must have thought themselves favourites at the start of the season—and who can blame them? After heading the table for almost the whole of last season, they struck a bad patch just when promotion was within their grasp and finished third. The inclusion of N. Hambleton, relegated from last season's first team, has added strength to an already solid looking side.

I saw part of the Wavertree Labour-Crawfords match, which turned out to be quite an exciting game. At one point Crawfords were trailing 1-4 but they put up a terrific fight and narrowed the gap to 4-5 before eventually losing 4-6.

The last and deciding set of the match was a real cracker between R. Thomas, Wavertree's No. 2, and the red-headed C. Hoare, Crawford's No. 1. Thomas won in straight games 21-19 25-23 but this must have been his toughest game this year.

A YOUNGSTER TO WATCH

THE Central Region is essentially a "young" division for half of the players are under 16 years of age and several of them only just entering their teens. It is fitting therefore that one of the youngest of them should be the subject of the first comments of the season.

At Bootle Y.M.C.A. there is a 12-year-old, by name Gordon Birch, who is delightful to watch. He is not yet a great stroke player (or he would be in a higher team), but he gets "stuck in" in a way which shames many seniors, and if he loses a point he gets even more "stuck in" to win the next. Not many players in the region will beat him in his present position, and if he keeps it up he will soon find himself promoted.

Ivor Chazen, of Harold House, should go through the season without suffering many defeats. That also applies to F. O'Shaughnessy. of St. Edward's, but these are seniors.

Of the juniors, R. Myers, of Cadwa, and Tony Green, of Linnets,

have both won more than they have lost, and both at No. 1. Judy Crafter, of Cadwa, has beaten boys of her own age, and for a young girl that is a remarkable achievement.

Lower down the teams, Michael Deane (Cadwa) is the man the put on at 5-4. He doesn't get troubled by nerves. Nor does Arthur Stringfellow (Linnets) and both will improve as they get practice and experience.

For the rest all seem to have in-and-out form, but here again experience will iron out the difficulties.

After the first month Harold House had yet to be defeated and Linnets Y had still to gain their first point, but anything can happen in a region so full of dead-keen players and there is little doubt that there will be a decided rise in the standard of these teams before the season comes to an end.

Judy is only 14 years old and it is a great pity that we have not got a few more like her coming along so that we can build up a really good inter-city team. If there are any young players in your club, please encourage them all you can. There seem to be quite a lot of keen boys but the girls are in the minority.

Will Cadwa or Rafters take over the women's championship this season now that Balfour have dropped out? Both teams were more or less level pegging last season and both have started off on the right foot by having comfortable wins in their first few matches.

Sound Victories

Cadwa, with a 10-0 victory over Waterloo Park, 9-1 over Linnets and 10-0 over Bath Street, look as though they have really got back into their stride. Gloria Burns's return has no doubt strengthened them considerably and they should have no difficulty in claiming either the first or second position in the table.

Their second team is not in such a happy position. They have just come out of the second division and are probably finding the opposition a little tougher. Nevertheless they seem to be having some very good matches, even if they are at the losing end. Miss E. Hook, who has played at either No. 1 or No. 2, has had two good victories to her credit. She defeated Reg Royle, the Liverpool champion, in straight games, which was an outstanding performance, and Billie Illidge, of Orrell, in a three-game set. Lowers Standard
