It was unfortunate that on the night of the match he had to play with an injured wrist, but even so he gave a very creditable performance, and, with two more seasons as a junior after the current one, he has a great opportunity to consolidate his position as one of the county's up and coming stars.

Although now at Cadwa, where he turns in creditable performances in the first team, Gordon learned to play at Bootle YMCA and was a regular member of their teams over the past three years.

His success has been due to his dedicated approach to the game, a dedication such as is all too rarely seen in youngsters today. From his first League appearance he has shown a steady improvement and his application is such that, despite his lack of inches, he could very soon develop into an outstanding player.

From the beginning of last season he has been a regular member of the League's Junior team, a situation we hope will be continued until he reaches the age limit, and we offer, on behalf of every member of the League our sincere congratulations on this, his first County honour. May it be but the first of many.

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NATIONAL RANKING LIST

AVING been urged last season to extend the interest of "Table Tennis Digest" beyond the boundaries of Liverpool, we have pleasure in publishing the current National Ranking List for both men and women, with the figures in brackets indicating their position on the last Runking List.

The biggest jump of all has been made by D. O. Creamer of Middlesex who has climbed from 11th to 3rd place, whilst a new name is that of M. Symonds, an 18 year old Lancashire County player who has a good record as a juster and has been prominent in early tournaments.

The women's list is notable for the inclusion of Miss A. Teft (Hertfordship). previously unranked but now figuring 4th after winning the recent Worth of England Tournament.

Just as the men have a promising youngster in Symbonda, so the women's list includes Miss L. Bell (Rssex), a 16 year old international.

The first move was to hold the annual trial for junior players, which resulted, I am pleased to report in almost double the number of players than last season coming to light. Senior Trial.

Liverpool V.M.C.Ar. kindly staged the men's trial when nearly twenty players took part. Again the keen competition and rivalry was good to behold and many close sets were Emerging from this trial played. is a new face to league representative play in David Butterworth who was subsequently selected to play in the "A" team against the Wirral league at Beauclair on Friday, 2nd November. I am sure the player will be keen to do well and his form at the trials was certainly impressive. David Ferguson and Roy Smith complete the "A" team, making up, I think, a pretty strong team.

One of the principle objects of the men's trial was to select's number 3 for the ist team; it having been decided early on that Arthur Taylor: and Norman Jones are still worth their places as numbers 1 and 2 respectively. A considerable amount of elimination had to be done before Wally Allanson the player to impress most. He accordingly made his debut in the Wilmott

Cup against Salford and won two of his three sets as did, also, Taylor and Jones in a fairly comfortable 6-3 win. All three were defeated by Cartwright, the ex-Manchester player, but I am sure that Norman Jones is kicking himself for letting Cartwright off the hook when in a virtually unassailable position. Having won the first game and leading 15-10 in the second he adopted the fatal policy of counting his chickens before they were hatched, and paid the full penalty in the end. A sound enough beginning for the team just the same.

A Chance for Youth.

With the introduction of a Youth Division this year, our league wisely dropped the Junior "A" team and substituted a Youth team, thereby giving young players, no longer juniors, but between the ages of 17 to 20 a chance to improve their chances of eventual senior status. Although this team has not yet started the programme, Trevor Owens (Wavertree Labour), Robert Eden and Roy Smith (now in a dual role) will make their initial challenge against Salford Youth team on Friday, 16th November.

What about the Ladies?

I understand that a ladies' trial is due to take place under the critical eye of Miss Mansell, when I imagine there will be more keen Meanwhile Mrs. Moya rivalry. Jones and the Misses Crafter and Willcox did duty in the first match of the season against old enemies Manchester, and acquitted themselves well, obtaining the best result for a number of years. One looks forward to the day when we can think in terms of a 7-3 win instead of a 3-7 defeat, good though this result appears by comparison with past efforts.

The same team will tackle Stockport at the Orrell club on Friday, 16th November, but the match to really look forward to is that between our two ladies teams which will be played at Beauclair on Friday, 7th December. This should be a real needle match for which the teams

spotlight this centres on the Bootle YMCA —Victoria Park match at Bootle, and in particular on the set between Wally Allanson and Eddie Clein. I am told that this started at 9-25 and at 10-45 the score was one game all. At this stage, although Bootle were leading 5-1 Stan Harvey gave Bootle the outstanding sets, due to the need for getting home. Sympathy must be felt for those who only played one set, also for the two contestants, neither of whom could be expected to throw away any chance f victory, but I offer my heartfelt sympathy to the unfor-tunate Umpire, Ted Birch. And to Harvey, congratulations on his stand. I believe that both players asked whether the time limit rule could be applied, but Birch (rightly) ruled that there was no such provision in League rules. Maybe it is time that there was.

Balfour defeated 1-9 by Liverpool YM "A", in which only Norman Jones had a win, underlined the loss of Davies and Willcock, and indicates that they will not be contenders for the championship which they held so long. And Bohemians 9-1 win at Oakhill seems to show that the ultimate winners will come from Liverpool YM, Rafters and Bohemians.

The first five weeks have weeded out the teams much as expected, leaving seven teams to do battle for the other, unenviable title of woodenspoonists, and this is likely to be a dogfight from first to last. I rather

(by our Special Correspondents)
think that Rafters A" will keep clear, for team order plays a bigger part with them than the others. Peter Short, by winning sets, has worked his way from No. 1 to No. 5, to be replaced by Murphy and Bowden by virtue of their being the more consistent losers. Still, with both ends of the table wide open, it should be an interesting session. Three teams unbeaten, and one point covering the bottom five makes for a more sustained interest than has bee the case for a long time. Bootle YM are feeling the loss of Gunnion, and together with Balfour, a strengthened Oakhill, and the strong Liver-pool YM "A" are in the happy position of being neither serious contenders for the top nor in telegation danger—a happy spot.

The game of general post between clubs and the star players seems to have left the top teams as you were, Oakhill and Liverpool YM's second string stronger, with Balfour, Anfield and Linnets depleted. Still, everyone seems happy, and that's the main

object.

Even after this loss, they are definitely a force to be reckoned with, and they had a rare struggle with Sefton, eventually sharing the honours. It is interesting to see that Seiton have L. Rosenbloom available more often this year, and have signed in addition Dr. Zaidi, an experienced player from Pakistan.

The sides relegated from Division 2 are having varying fortunes. Bath Street "A" started with a bang by trouncing the newly-promoted Police "A" 8 sets to 2, and suffered their first defeat to Cricket Club in a match which proved a personal triumph for Bath Street's no. 2, K. Hunt, who won both sets. For Oakhill 'A' it is sadly different, they having had only one win from their first five matches, and they now languish only 3rd from bottom, where they appear to be in some danger of the menviable double trop in successive seasons.

The season has opened with a bang for Cadwa "A". The tonic of relegation has, apparently, transformed the team into giant-killers, and how this side will fare against Wavertree Labour makes for interesting speculation—it will, I feel, decide the issue as to the ultimate winners of the division.

It was a disastrous match for Liverpool Post Office when they entertained Wavertree Labour at their new venue in New York The Labour side are playing with that confidence born of success, and to single out any players from their team for commendation is difficult. However, I would mention the fine play of Peter Hurworth and Norman Chaloner who inflicted punishment on A. The match was played in an extremely sportsmanlike manner, and it was a pleasure to have participated . . . other teams please note!

results from the opening matches, and it would seem fairly clear that this division will not be so much a promotion stringgle as a battle to avoid relegation. Crawfords and Wavertree Labour "A" look like eventually topping the division, but the lower end of the table is extremely open, although it is early yet to make any accurate lorecast.

It was regrettable to hear that Nalgo had withdrawn from the League but pleasing indeed to find that some of their players had joined another club. Perhaps next season Nalgo will find it possible to return. We hope so, for they were keers players, and it is all too common to hear of a lack of interest.

The match between Crawfords and Wavertree Labour "A", which ended in a draw gives some indication of the comparative strength of the two sides. Arthur Jones of Crawfords (ex-Rafters) maintained his 100% record though he had a grim 3-game set—each game going to a dauce—against Ken Chambers (ex-Balfour). Both of these players figured in the first division last season, and the return match should indeed be a great fight.

There are still some teams without a point, also a few players who qualify for a wooden spoon, but they should not lose heart. I know of at least one first division player who went for two seasons without winning a single set, so if all keep on trying, perhaps the next issue will find that this position is unheard of.

A great deal has been written, from time to time, on the subject of what players should wear for match play. HERE are many newcomers to this division this season who, maybe, will benefit from a little constructive criticism. RULE 8 MATCH REGULATIONS. To throw the ball up from the palm of the hand with fingers outstretched seems to be beyond some players, and even after being warned, and having had four services given against them, they have found much difficulty in putting over a correct service. One young player complained that he relied on his service for a lot of points, and it was suggested to him that he should practice imparting spin by means of the BAT ALONE.

I am sure that some of the more experienced League members will point out any bad faults that they see in matches to the people con-It will save a few games, cerned. even matches, being won on a foul service. Such occurrences always

give rise to controversy.

Maghull Co-Operative are a young team, full of enthusiasm, but lacking experience. Almost every one of them served from his fingers, but on being told that this was a foul service did their level best to right the wrong. F. Brown wins many points, and seems to rely on doing so by his service, which is a very effective side spin imparted by the N. Higham is a potentially good player with a strong game and good strokes, and D. Newton will give a good account of himself when he has gained more experience.

ARTICLES WANTED!

Green asked me to get cracking on an article for the first edition of the magazine for the 1962-63 season. This has been my lot now for quite a few years, and finding new subject matter becomes increasingly difficult, but the job must be done by someone and the reluctance of other League members to have a shot at it means that either Jim Green or myself has to produce something. Having rambled on so far with no definite theme, allow me to continue equally vaguely, and in my mood of justified despondency.

Why have J.G. and I got to write so much? We are neither of us professional journalists, nor are we better at it than other members of the League, yet, ordinary bods though we be, we have to rack our brains to find new material for nearly every

issue.

There must be some hidden talent among the Clubs who could write much better than either of us, but from whom (perhaps owing to shyness) we never hear. A great deal of discussion goes on in clubrooms all over the town on various aspects of the game, yet we cannot join in since none of the orators ever puts his views in black and white for us all to comment upon. Healthy criticisms and discussions breed new ideas, and can only do good to the League and its members. Perhaps you think that it's no use sending in an article because the Editorial Board won't print it if they don't like it? Let me assure you that nothing is further from the truth.

I am not taking now for a "Letter to the Editor", although these are always welcome; but for some informative article on a specific subject. We do not mind if you have a pet bind to sir—nor if you show good cause for the destruction of long-applied theories, PROVIDED that in place thre comes something constructive.

Here I offer a list of well-worn subjects which, though often discussed, offer room for new thoughts, and I am sure that there are many interesting theories on these topics which can well be aired — Coaching, Clubrooms, Manners, Sponge bats, Constitution of the League, Rules, Early starting, Late starting, Fines, Discipline, Dress, Umpiring.

And how often have we heard, during the tea-break chat, some incident from a past game described with such depth of feeling and humour that all present are entertained, yet these never get put down on paper for the enjoyment of all. I would that they were, for many of these stories are worth preserving.

So long as the views in an article are sincerely held, that article is usually worth reading, and in this connection let me illustrate on the subject of "Early Starting".

There has long been an idea bandled about that it would be a decided advantage to have League matches started at 6 or 6-30 p.m. instead of at 7-30 (or later) as at present. The scheme has been tried successfully in other Leagues, and even by mutual agreement in our There are many people who work in the city, travel to one extreme to go home for tea, and then back to the other side of the town for their matches. Alternatively they have to have tea in town, then mess about killing time until it is time to go to the match. Again there are a number of young players whose parents feel that II p.m. is too late to arrive home from playing in a table tennis match (go onsay it! "What? In these days?"). Then there are the married couples who wish to play, but who find it more difficult to find a baby-sitter between 7-30 and 11 than it would be between 6 and 9-30. All of these individuals would be benefited by an earlier start, and there are few who would find it any hardship. These are just my own views on this idea. Maybe you hold other views either for or against, and by airing them, we may arrive at some solution acceptable to all—which would be something of an achievement.

Merseyside Open - Special
