EDITORIAL

As you read through this issue it will become apparent that many members have been giving considerable thought to improving the standard of play in Liverpool as well as stimulating interest which has all too obviously flagged in recent years.

PERSONALITY OF THE MONTH

ARTHUR **TAYLOR**

OME 12 years ago, ARTHUR TAYLOR entered the League playing for Litherland in the North Region, and so impressive was his debut that he played in the Liverpool team in his first season. For nearly three years he remained unbeaten in League matches, going for more than 100 matches without defeat, losing eventually for the first time to R. Hulse, the Crewe player, then assisting Wavertree Community Centre.

In his career, he has been a regular member of the Liverpool side and has been an automatic choice for several years. On one occasion he played for Lancashire, and was unfortunate in not being selected on Four times the other occasions. Liverpool "Closed" Singles champion, and runner-up on two other occasions is a proud record, and several times has won doubles titles. including three "Mixed" with his wife, Barbara (who has herself played for the City teams on occasion).

Although one of the outstanding players in the League, he has the happy knack of enjoying games against lesser bods, seldom "murdering" his opponent, and it has been very rare for a beaten opponent to fail to enjoy his game. It has never been Arthur's practice to display the " prima donna " tantrums of certain players, and we feel that in paying him this small tribute we are repaying some small part of the great service he has afforded Liverpool table tennis.

Starting at Panama-there is a very good table at the American Services Y.M.C.A. in Colon. Unfortunately, you have to be an American Service-man before you can get a game; not even my crewcut could wangle me one.

Only in Lima, the capital, did I find an organised League. English Cricket Club is a member of this League and any Liverpool T.T. player who finds himself or herself at a loose end on a Thursday evening in Lima (the very idea!) he or she will be very welcome, as I was, to a game and a pleasant evening. Apart from Lima, however, the Peruvian coastline is bereft of T.T. It's rumoured that the Spaniards confiscated the last of the Inca's stocks at the turn of the century.

Chile is mostly desert. This applies both to the landscape and to table tennis facilities. The one oasis I found was in Valparaiso. Seamen's Mission not only supplies the table but also 4 or 5 Chilean Senoritas who can give you a good start and a beating.

So, as far as I can see Liverpool T.T. is in a much healthier state than at least 5 countries. Added to this our wonderful climate is ideally suited to the game while these other countries have to play on warm sultry evenings.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Sir,

The joint authors of this somewhat revolutionary article have often pondered on various ways and means of increasing enthusiasm and generally stimulating interest in table tennis in the Merseyside area, and one of our pet ideas is one which has already been put into operation in another area with unqualified success, although on a far greater scale than would be necessary here.

On Merseyside we have three major Leagues, the Business Houses, Wirral and our own. There are several minor Leagues who could join in if they so desired, but for the purpose of this article, we will confine ourselves to these three.

Each of these Leagues has its own identity which they desire most earnestly to preserve, and, while nothing should be done to impair this individual identity, we suggest that closer co-operation between them is both desirable and necessary. This would be best achieved by the formation of a Merseyside T.T. Federation to which all three would belong, with a representative Committee to govern and control its activities.

Such a Federation would provide the most effective form of liaison between the member Leagues, so keeping each fully aware of the activities of the others, for example, the dates of "Closed" tournaments and Cup semi-finals and finals which could then be so arranged that clashes would be avoided.

In addition, while each League would carry out its own League and Cup programme (as now) without consultation with the others, in place of our own abortive 3-a-side division, a PREMIER LEAGUE could be provided, open to one team only from any club in membership from all three Leagues. This, we understand, has operated with great success in Birmingham, and by this means the clubs would play in active League warfare against club sides from all member Leagues, providing match play of a high standard each week in addition to the "local" match. Players would be assured of meeting others of comparable ability

every week, without recourse to drastic internal re-organisation of individual Leagues. Since different systems of match play are in use in all Leagues, it may be that 3, 4, or 5 a side would have to be agreed, but again, in Birmingham, the Premier League is on a 3-a-side basis.

Financially, such a Federation could benefit all Leagues. The cost of printing three handbooks could be reduced by printing one only, to cover the activities of all, the cost to be defrayed by member Leagues in proportion to the number of handbooks required. The cost might further be reduced by standardising certain basic rules to cut down "setting-up" charges. A player taking part in more than one League would be obliged to nominate one to have first claim on his services, and would only be allowed to play for a club of that League in the Premier League, and would receive his handbook from the club nominated by him.

In a similar manner, the "Digest" could be enlarged to apportion a set number of pages to each League and to the Federation (for the Premier League) the balance to be left open for articles, letters, etc., from any member of any League. And while each League would continue to play in the Lanes. and Ches. League (as now) it may well prove that stronger teams might be fielded by entering the Wilmott Cup and Rose Bowl as Merseyside rather than individually.

The possibilities of such an organisation are unlimited, and there are few snags which cannot be eliminated by a genuine desire from all Leagues to make it a success, and effort by the League Committees towards a common goal, but we fear that there exists, in some quarters, a militant feeling against other local Leagues which would have to be overcome. It would be entirely useless to attempt to bring the Leagues into closer contact unless officials concerned were prepared to work without jealousy and suspicion. but instead with a keen wish for harmony and a joint effort to make the thing go .

A shot in the arm is sorely needed throughout the whole area as regards our sport, and the adoption of a Federation such as this might well prove the one we require. In any case no harm can result while there is every possibility for success.

May we suggest that the individual

Leagues Committees start discussions to see if anything on these lines can be achieved.

IVERPOOL, Y.M.C.A. are now home and dry as League champions. Their "A" team virtually clinched it for them by beating Rafters 6-4 to give their first team a clear five points lead over Bohemians and Rafters, now battling it out for second place. There is no doubt that the absence for the last few matches of Arthur Taylor has proved too big a handicap for Rafters, for a player of his ability is irreplaceable when running for the championship.

The pace is hotting up at the nether end too. Visiting Victoria Park, Anfield had a tough time before winning 6-4, due mainly to doubles by Lawson and Cuff, with Barnes and Riding adding one each. Which shows that the Park don't intend to accept relegation without a fight. Linnets won their first

match of the season at Waterloo Dock 7-3, which makes it more than likely that Bootle YMCA "A" and Victoria Park will be the unlucky pair for the big drop.

Linnets win was earned by two reserves pulling rather more than their weight. Frank Thomas and Dennis Underhill each won two, the other regular first teamer having a bad night with a nought. Then the reserves did their stuff, Jeff Grimshaw beating both Les Sille and Charlie Dunne, and Eric Wood adding one for luck. So the relegation zone is still rather more open than is the head of the table.

Rafters "A" assured themselves of another season at least in the first division by means of a 9-1 win over Bohemians "A". Oakhill steadily climb away from the foot, and although they have a few points, their record shows that they would have been well up with the leaders had they not run into administrative troubles.

It is an interesting commentary that no team has conceded a 10-0 walkover in this division, and only on three occasions have sets been lost by non-attendance. It is far and away the best record in this respect for any division of the League, and to my mind it shows that the higher up the League you go, the keener are the players, despite arguments to the contrary.

CADWA, having run away with Division 2, were set for promotion with weeks to spare leaving Fairlawn and Lucem to battle it out for second place. The meeting of Lucem and Cadwa gave the Division 2 leaders their hardest match of the season. Although Cadwa emerged as winners, 6-4, only Gordon Birch's double success seemed completely convincing. He beat A. Heyes 15 and 10 and K. Davies 9 and 12. All of the other members of the Cadwa team lost one event each, Wilcock falling to Heyes, Eden to Rimmer, Crafter to Davies, and Travis to Jackson. Mrs. Rimmer was the unfortunate Lucem player to lose both sets, but in a memorable game with Bill Crafter she nearly managed to force him to three, losing 31-33 in the second.

In a previous edition I said that Beauclair could influence the top placings with home games yet to play against Fairlawn and Lucem. Since that time both of these matches have been played, and the results were 7-3 defeats for the Beauclair side. In the match against Fairlawn, however, they were unable to turn out at full strength and of course they might have done a little better if Weston and Rix had been playing. As it was, B. Pardy, B. Morris, and J. Whisler lost all their events, D. Inge lost one, and the Beauclair captain, Charlie Grimes won both, including one victory over your truly. F. Mooney and B. Carter won two each for Fairlawn while P. Whalley, J. and B. Leeson managed one each,

Waterloo Park, after narrowly losing 4-6 at Bath Street, made their position more secure by defeating the bottom team, Victoria Park "B" 8-2. S. Yeoman, A. Haydon and P. Ross won all their sets fairly comfortably, while for the losers, G. Cope defeated W. Spencer and Mr. Frydman beat K. Nelson.

I think that this Victoria Park team deserves a special word of commendation for their efforts this season. The same team has turned out regularly, playing in the same order, and although they have not yet won a match, they remain cheerful, and give the impression that they are not downhearted. They deserve some success before the season ends.

How form varies from year to year! Last year Rafters "B" were neck and neck with Fairlawn in the bid to top the Third Division. This year they have been concerned to avoid returning whence they came whilst Fairlawn, on the other hand, have been much in the running for a place in the First Division next year.

In the all-important match (the one possibly which will ultimately decide the championship) between Liverpool YMCA "B" and Liverpool C.C., the former crashed in a somewhat startling fashion, going down 9 sets to r. The Y.M's. consolation set was won by the

consistent Goldson, who, after losing the first game against L. Lewis to 9, went on to win the next two 19 and 15. Apart from this, such was the superiority of the Cricket Club that only two other sets went to three. So revenge was obtained for the Cricketers only defeat of the season, and in view of the positions of the teams, was rather more than sweet.

The only two other teams contending for promotion were Linacre and English Electric. The latter, after setting off at a cracking pace had a run in which they only took 6 points from 6 matches, whilst Linacre, over the same period, took 11, including one from the Cricket Club, making them only the second team of the season to take points from that source.

Fred Pheysey, now in his third season near (or at) the top of the division averages went down unaccountably easily to YMCA's No. 2, R. Goldson at 13, 16 and 9. A remarkably fine win for Goldson. A couple of matches or so later, Pheysey again lost, most unexpectedly to Linnets Eric Wood, who, since his team were depleted by supplying first-team reserves, was promoted to No. 1, and then calmly proceeded to hit Pheysey off.

At the other end of the table, Oakhill "A" despite their serious handicap, were steadily pulling away from the foot, and seemed likely to finish well away from the relegation zone when Victoria Park dropped out of the League leaving them and Bootle YMCA "B" in dire straits, which is a pity for nobody wanted to see Oakhill relegated under the circumstances.

They caused a surpr se, incidentally, by holding the somewhat erratic English Electric to a draw, though handicapped by having a reserve at No. r. Les Davies scored a double for Oakhill, and repeated the performance when his side, at full strength this time, went down to Bath Street "A".

A weakened Waterloo Park side put up a stout resistance before losing to Fairlawn, who, barring a bad collapse, look likely

THE top two positions go to Wavertree Labour "A", and Crawfords who can both look forward to playing in a higher sphere next season. Crawfords, without Arthur Jones, had a fright when visiting Liverpool YMCA "C", having to struggle to win 6-4, which demonstrated two things-first that even a promotion-looking side cannot afford to play without their No. 1, and two the overall strength of the YMCA when their fourth team can hold Crawfords first team so close. Crawfords had to thank A. Harrison and Phil Cox mainly, both scoring doubles with Gabler and Wood adding one each. For YM, John Taylor with 2 at No. 1, and Travis and Samber (1 each) did the damage.

Crawfords "A" and Liverpool C.C.
"A" are scrapping for third place, with St. Edward's running both close.

Bootle Nalgo appear dooned and will have either the luckless Rafters "C" or Domestic Mission as companions in distress, Possibly Bootle Nalgo deserve this "honour" rather more than the others, for they have given away two 10-0 walk-overs, and twice have conceded sets. It is not easy to retain a place in any division giving matches away in this style.

Fairlawn have cause to feel pride in their Barbara Hand, who did so well in the Civil Service competition that she went to Manchester to represent Liverpool. We have not yet heard how she got on, but she can be pleased that she earned the right to go.

Wavertree Labour "A" lost a personal interest in the Rumjahn Cup in the semi-final when they lost 8-2 to their own first team, this being the second Cup this season which they have met with the same fate. This time especially, it is unfortunate that the two Labour sides could not have avoided each other again, for we might have seen an all-Wavertree final.

A New Look for the League

THE Committee, in giving a great of thought during the season to the possibility of a re-organisation of the League, has a med at a scheme which would, amongst other things, fulfil the following conditions:

(a) Promote more interest, particularly in the lower Divisions;

(b) Make it possible for a new team joining the League to reach the top quickly, if they were good enough;

(c) Maintain interest throughout

the season;

(d) Be fluid enough to permit of alteration from year to year to accommodate the differing number of teams.

A Rule amendment will be placed before the A.G.M. which, if passed, will enable the Committee to put into operation a scheme which we believe meets the above requirements.

Briefly, the suggestion is that there be one Pirst Division, two Second Divisions, and four Third Divisions.

The Second Divisions would be called 2a and 2b, and the Third Divisions 3a, 3b, 3c and 3d.

Promotion and relegation would be as follows: Four down from Div. 1, two up from each Div. 2, four down from each Second Division with two up from each Third Division.

If the number of entries made it necessary for us to form a different number of Third Divisions, two would be promoted from each, and a corresponding number of teams relegated.

The Third Divisions would not be Regional in any way but, as far as possible, made up of equal strength teams assessed on the basis of this season's final League Tables.

To implement Item (a) of the conditions listed above it is proposed to re-introduce three competitions as follows:—

1. "Restricted Men's Singles" in the Closed Championships available only to Third Division players.

2. The Macclesfield Medals Competition. This would comprise teams of players representing each of the Third Divisions who would compete

on a League basis for a Challenge Cup to be presented to the winning section of the Third Division.

3. The Forrest Cup Competition. Restricted to the Champion teams of each section of the Third Division who would compete for the Forrest Cup on a knock-out basis.

In so far as Item (b) on the preceding page is concerned—the Committee feel that this is met satisfactorily in that under the new set-up a new member of the League can attain Division 1 status in two years.

Item (c)—that of maintaining interest—will be fulfilled by virtue of the fact that most Clubs will be involved in struggles either to gain promotion or avoid relegation.

The Rule amendment is a very simple one and will enable the Committee to vary the number of Third (or for that matter—Second) Divisions, as circumstances demand. This covers Item (d) of our requirements.

The existing Cup competitions will remain, the Rumjahn Cup being confined to Div. 2 teams and the Hyde Cup to Div. 3 teams.

The Committee has also considered the advisability of altering the number of teams in each Division, for, since the number of teams in a Division was increased to 14 some few years ago, the season has been very crowded with little time to spare for re-arranged matches or Cup ties and replays, with the position next season even more acute owing to the exceptionally early Easter in 1964.

It has, in the past, been normal practice to try and end the fixtures before Easter to avoid clashing with Tennis and Cricket. Unless the number of teams in each Division is reduced below 14 it will be necessary to extend the 1963-64 season until at least three weeks after Easter in order to complete the League programme and possibly even four weeks if we are to keep one week free for the Merseyside Open Championships and the First Round Cupties.

An earlier start to the season is not feasible. It is a tight enough

schedule to have the fixtures and handbooks ready for the middle of September and even then many people are either still on holiday or playing Tennis and Cricket.

If you accept our proposals for the re-organisation of the League this would be the most convenient year to make the change to say 12 teams a Division, when only two teams (the Third and Fourth from the bottom of the First Division) who would not normally be relegated, would in fact have to go down.

The Committee intend to put this matter before the A.G.M., not as a Rule change or a resolution, but simply to put the facts before you and ask for your views so that we may, when we have to take a decision, act in accordance with the wishes of the majority of members, but I must stress that a decision one way or the other will have to be made this year, whatever feelings are expressed, and irrespective of whether the League set-up is altered or not.

These two matters are of utmost importance to all registered members

and I would urge you not only to give them your careful consideration but to make sure that your Representative at the A.G.M. is fully aware of your feeling so that the decisions reached at that meeting will truly represent the views of the majority of the League members.

The only other Rule amendment we are putting forward is to match Regulation 12 which concerns the re-arrangement of postponed matches and the purpose of the amendment is to make it clear that it is the home team which fixes the revised date (which is not clear in the present regulation) and also to increase the notice required for such a re-arrangement from three days to 7 days—an increase which we feel desirable for all concerned.

The proposals we are putting before you are the result of much careful consideration and will, if passed, bring back some of the lost interest in the Liverpool League. They will benefit all sections of the League—not just the top or the bottom, and we feel they are at least worth a trial.

The Challenge of Sandwich

SANDWICH, as we know it, as applicable to our present day game, presents a challenge to the players. We must now accept the fact that a compromise has been made between those who wanted "sponge" banned and those who were against such a ban.

This presents a challenge to players in as much that these bats bring a lot more spin into the game, making it far more complex, which makes it essential to players, particularly the younger and aspiring players who are fitter both physically and mentally.

Although we use a lot of "flat" or "still" but techniques the basic foundation of the game is in the spinning strokes. We use these to achieve extra speed in attack—exaggerate them to produce the "loop" technique—the bane of defensive and chiscling exponents. We also have to remember, and this is vastly important, we use spins as counteracting and controlling agents

against the spin imparted by our

opponents.
Whilst "sandwich" in itself has not completely eliminated chiselling it has certainly gone a long way towards that end and this must be a strong point in its favour.

Counter-hitting, as a means of both attack and defence, has come much more into the picture, thus encouraging more spectacular and ambitious playing.

We should remember that the spectators' side of things, especially from the financial point of view, is extremely important.

This article is not intended to be the full picture of the use of "sandwich", nor is it intended to decry the supporters of the "pimpled" bat, but to those players who can look back on memories of wonderful Table Tennis from such as Bergman, Barna, Leach, etc., and who are still playing today DON'T think in terms of "You can't teach an old dog new tricks".

Give "saudwich" an extended try and I am sure that then, even though you might revert to the pimpled ")or not) you will at all events see the problem in such a prospective.

One word of advice. If you buy a

"sandwich" bat, buy a top grade one—it will repay you in the long T1117
