A NEW THEME BUT THE SAME FIDDLERS

NE more season of table tennis is under way, but this time a season with a difference. A new structure for the divisions and a new system of awarding points. Whether either or both of these ideas will be a success only time will tell, but in my experience at least, players are talking about the points system and of the new faces they are meeting in their matches. All the criticism is not complimentary, but at least the changes are provoking discussion, which I feel is an achievement.

Elasticised Rules.

Unfortunately, we still have with us the same few, who are intent on stretching the rules to the very limit in order to gain advantage for themselves-I refer to the ranking lists of certain clubs wherein you will find some extraordinary evalutations of the capabilities of certain players. Rule 15 states that you must group your players in groups of 5, but unfortunately (or fortunately, depending upon your views on the subject) it does NOT state "in order of merit." Therefore, in my opinion, the Committee cannot object if a club registers its players for its 'B' or 'Č' team, thus enabling them to come up as reserves for tough matches and also play for the lower team in IT'S tougher games.

Am I a 'Square'?

I may be old-fashioned (or considered so by some), but I believe that the majority of clubs play table tennis in this League as a form of recreation, and consider it to be a sport—not a business matter in which you must win at all costs. I feel that our answer to these few fiddlers must be twofold. In the first place, this season, treat them with the contempt which they deserve, for ridicule can be a powerful weapon. Let them fiddle away, and win all their matches 10-0.

For this they will win a medal (or as Rule 27 states "some suitable token"). The others, by playing the game, will win some matches and lose others, but will have the satisfaction of gaining some friends and of knowing that the points you do accumulate will have been won on merit and are richly deserved.

Our second answer must be to endeavour to alter the rules to eliminate this pest from our League.

Another twist to the fiddling game is the 'Ghost' player. For the uninitiated (are there any?) a ghost player is one who is ranked in the top group of five but never plays. This enables the fifth best player in a club to be ranked at No. 6, making him eligible for the ''A'' team when they need strengthening. BUT, of course, he spends most of the season playing as 'reserve' for the first team. This results so that EVERY team in that club can call on the services of an additional strong player when required. One club has at least one such ghost player in their first team who HAS NOT PLAYED FOR AT LEAST THREE YEARS!). Who knows, he might even BE a ghost!!

This article is NOT directed at the many clubs who ARE playing the game. Please continue to do so in the right spirit. The temptation to fiddle to outwit the fiddlers is strong, but it weakens our hand when we come to deal with the matter at the end of the season.

To those clubs who are blatantly fiddling I make no appeal whatsoever. Whoever heard of a ghost who played in the right 'spirit' or had a conscience? I would merely recommend that they note the first sentence of Rule 17.

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Finance and the 'Open'

We Celebrate Properly!

This was our Silver Jubilee Tournament, and to celebrate the occasion we are pleased to report that as far as we are aware, we have made the largest profit in the history of the 'Open.' It has not been our policy to increase entry fees, and in fact these have not been increased for at least the past six years, but we DO endeavour to keep costs down, and this year our total costs are estimated at £53 as against £76 last year—mainly due to the saving in the cost of prizes.

Support down!

Entry fees were actually £2 less, and support from spectators fell away also, but, by organising raffles, we increased our revenue by £12. An extra payment this year was £3 to the E.T.T.A. in respect of the Master Points scheme, which was introduced too late for us to recoup from the players.

Our grateful thanks.

Finally, our thanks are due to Messrs. Dunlops (for the free use of the hall), to "Monty" (for obtaining the prizes), to the horde of willing workers, and last, but by no means least, to the troupe of attractive young ladies (too numerous to mention individually) who worked extremely hard in selling all those raffle tickets.

THE points system introduced this season has already been demonstrated as an utter failure on the first five weeks matches in this division. Liverpool YMCA are four points ahead of the field, and although both Bohemians and Rafters are as yet unbeaten, it is improbable that either will overtake the present leaders, for, even though either of these two sides might conceivably beat the YM 6-4 twice, the odd sets lost to lesser teams will still leave the YM up in front. So, it is possible (I do not say probable) that an unbeaten team will finish second to a team who may have been beaten twice. Absolutely farcical but true! Again, a glance at the lower half shows seven sides battling against the four relegation places, with yet an eighth (Waterloo Dock) still not While interesting out of danger. from the element of danger involved. in this case sides which have actually won more matches are likely to be relegated. What a set-up!

May I remark at this stage that to date I have met not one single first division player who can see any sense at all in this system. All seem to dislike it most heartily, and some are hoping that, at the seasons end, at least three or four sides tie for the fourth place from bottom, just to see what action will be taken. An interesting point.

Cadwa, strengthened by the addition of Wallay Allanson and Ted Birch, are doing well in their first season, and seem set to stay near the top, while their companions in promotion, Lucem, have still to find their feet, but I have an idea that Lucem will still pull something out of the bag as they have done so often in the past. Bootle YM have the weakest team for some years, and with their present strength seem doomed, but the rest of the lower eight are all well involved in the struggle for survival. Despite ' Dunbars' comments that Linnets are the worst team ever seen in this division, they scraped together 15 points in the five weeks despite meeting three of the strongest sides in the first three matches. 'Dixie Dean, condemned as 'useless' in the same article has won a few points, and even a certain old man has laboriously climbed from his bath chair with some success. Balfour have not yet found a settled side, but I don't expect to find them so low down at the end of the season.

Rafters 'A' despite the loss of several key players, are putting up a good show, and Bohemians 'A' have still to meet their companions in misery, so by the time the next 'Digest' comes out the situation might be nearer solution or even more tightly compressed. Your guess is as good as mine.

One final point on friend 'Dunbars' article--I was deeply sorry to learn that Pete D'Arcy was so completely out-of-touch! You'll have to put some practice in next summer, Petc!

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sticking my neck out by forecasting an easy passage into Division I for They have been further them. strengthened by the signings of Ted Mortis and Gordon Brownlee (ex-Bootle YMCA) which gives the side an experienced well-balanced look.

Their match v. Cadwa "B" produced two surprises when P. Ferris (Cadwa) beat F. Farguharson 14-21, 21-16, 21-19 and R. McPherson beat G. Brownlee 17-21, 21-19, 28-26. Two very hard fought sets. These youngsters show a lot of promise, and more will be heard of them in the near future.

The battle for second place looks wide open, with 5 or 6 teams all closely grouped in the table. Bath Street, Crawfords, Linnets 'A', Fairlawn, LPAS and Anfield 'A' are all in with a chance.

LPAS v. Crawfords was a very close affair with the Police getting the verdict 6-4, Crawfords however, being weakened by the absence of their No. 1 Arthur Jones. Linnets 'A' had a good win over Bohs. 'B' doubles from Allan Watson and Eric Wood going a long way to make it possible.

Waterloo Park 'A' and Bath St. 'B' look like facing relegation unless they show a rapid improvement, and the fact that Waterloo Park have already conceded 20 points by failing to fulfil fixtures twice will not help them to avoid the drop.

The new points system has given rise to a lot of discussion and the devotees of both new and old systems seem about equally divided. personal opinion is that this present system, where each set counts as a point has grave snags. START with an appeal! Prior to the season I gathered unto myself a nice little band of contributors for divisional notes. Unfortunately the lady who was to write for this division now finds herself playing for another of her

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club's teams in another division, so I am writing this from score cards, tables, and my limited personal knowledge of your players. Will some willing soul undertake this job? Come on, you budding journalists. Give me a ring and I'll tell you just what we want. Obviously this way of doing the job is not the best.

As I write, Crawfords 'A' and Coll. Tech. are pulling ahead from the field, but there are so many score cards not yet in that to predict that they will stay there is stupid. For instance, Liverpool Jewish have two matches in hand—if won by a good margin they will climb right up among the leaders, and the YMCA 'C' team are in with a good chance. However, while this is still well and truly undecided, I lean to the view that Crawfords, who have proved their worth in the past, will be sitting pretty at the end.

THE positions in the league tables, as most team captains and players must realise, are dependent, not purely on the games played, but rather on the results of those games which reach the address printed on the back of every match card. Many clubs are at fault in failing to send in results, as league positions will no doubt indicate. Please, if you are given a match card to post, tie a knot in something till you reach the post-box. The English Electric club particularly should take the hint.

I sympathise with English Electric 'A' for their 3-7 defeat at the hands of Balfour 'D'; no fewer than 5 out of 6 deciding games, and 4 deuce games going in Balfour's favour.

The number of 10-0 results in both 3D and other 3rd divisions show that many clubs and players are having a very unhappy season. Desertions to 'Other Leagues' and early retirement are said to be imminent in many individual players cases. It is very likely that in the near future some representation will be made to ensure that some of the totally one-sided games currently being played will not be repeated next season.

Some honorable mention is due, I feel, to those players registering their teams only successes in a 9-1 defeat. Up to the 5th week of the season the players include: K. Thompson (L'pool YM 'D') twice, J. McVey (Domestic Mission), R. Hopwood (Lucem 'A'), J. Rice (Bradstones 'A'), W. Kelly (Linnets 'D'), E. McCullough (Lucem 'A'),

A. Roberts (L'pool YM 'D'). It is not difficult to see which teams are likely candidates for the wooden spoon at the end of the season.

At the other end of the table the leadership seems likely to be hotly contended. St. Edward's, Balfour 'D' and Anfield 'C' being the current main contenders. Anfield 'C' after a promising start of 29 points from 3 games then conceded 6 points each to the teams above them. Although these are early days, St. Edward's seem to have a very strong team, especially at 1 and 2, and could do very well.

It is always disconcerting to have to record W/O in match scores. In the process of partly playing 5 matches, one Lussac player has conceded no fewer than four sets, due to non-arrival apparently.

Commiserations to his team mates who must know who, if not where,

he is.

Commiserations also to all those ex-8th Division teams who are struggling manfully with little hope of success at the foot of the table. A consoling thought may be that there is, as yet, no relegation to worry about.

FTER the first five weeks of matches it is too early to make any prophecies about eventual champions, but it has rapidly become clear that the issue will lie between Bohemians, Rafters and Cadwa. Strangely, although the details of these two games common knowledge, no card has been sent in (after three weeks) for the ladies' match, so for obvious reasons I don't feel competent to name the club involved, but it is a poor show when a strongish side arrives after a ten mile journey to find three very weak players opposing them and no reserve to fill the fourth place because three strong girls are in a men's team! Again. in my opinion, it is a very poor spirit when a player of some twelve or more years experience sets out to win 21-0 against a complete beginner. playing in her first match. doesn't seem to be the way to build up ladies strength in the league.

We've got two new sides with us this season, English Electric and Linnets A' and only one of each side is anything but a beginner. Having seen both teams in action, it is my opinion that these girls are all on the right lines, and from them we hope for some future City players. In particular do I prophecy a bright future for Marion Lewis (Linnets 'A') and Valerie Ball (English Electric), and I was very pleased to see them in the Merseyside Open. On behalf of the 'old' hands I extend a welcome to these girls and their fellow newcomers, and I hope their keenness lasts long enough for them to take their places among the list of

stronger players.

Jack McCaig deals with all City games in his article elsewhere, but I would like to thank all of the girls who gave up two Sunday afternoons and one evening of their time to take part in a somewhat exhaustive series of trials for the two Liverpool teams. We tried to give a show to every possible girl, and the trials proved

their worth in that Pat Brown (English Electric) was eventually selected together with Mabel Francis, who has 'opted' for Liverpool instead of the Business Houses this season, both for the "A" team. Another who has shown a tremendous advance during the summer is Maureen King (Balfour), and there is no doubt that a little more steadiness and practice will find her taking one of the few places before very long. The advent of these new

players gives us a wide variety for selection and the competition might prove beneficial to the City sides. But here I appeal to all Club Secretaries whose girls were missed from the trials—if you think you have any girls good enough, let me have their names and I will see that they are included in future trials.

Next month there should be some comment on league games, for one or two tight clashes are expected before then. A happy season to all.

Don't for one moment imagine that the Management Committee don't know what is going on. They do, but the difficulty arises as to how it can be stopped. Refuse the grouping list! On what grounds? the best of its ability the Committee is always ready and willing to apply and uphold the rules MADE BY YOU.

Of the local players, 16 were in the Draw on Saturday, 4 didn't arrive to play, and 2 won through two rounds.

The Women's Singles provided few surprises. The No. 1 seed, Miss C. Blackshaw (Doncaster) lost in the Pinal to the No. 2 seed, Miss J. Canham (Kent). Miss Blackshaw had an attack of cramp in the second game when leading 10-5, and although she won this game, the third proved too much for her and Miss Canham romped home.

Eight locals were put through to Saturday but as only one of them won through one round, the least said the better. At least they all turned up to take part.

The greatest local success was without doubt the appearance of Wally Allanson and Peter Hurworth in the Semi-Final of the Men's Doubles. Up to that stage they had
