Editorial

Although we are now well into 1968, I would like to take this opportunity of wishing all members on behalf of the Management Committee and myself a rather belated Happy and Prosperous New Year.

Now to business. I wonder how many members noticed that the figures in the Org. Secretary's Report in the November issue were a 1/- short? I must confess that I myself did not, and was very surprised when informed of it a week later. However, this brought me down to earth, as until that moment I had been congratulating myself on having succeeded in producing and distributing my first issue. Unfortunately for me one particular person did not miss it, and on ascertaining that the mistake was mine and not the Org. Secretary's, he proceeded to put the information to good use. On the subject of these figures, I was sure they would arouse some comment from members when they realised how much of our income is swallowed by the E.T.T.A. and the County. It seems, however, to be very true, that the only figures most players are interested in are their own average figures!

THAT NOM-DE-PLUME!!!

I have been taken to task regarding the nom-de-plume used on the new column "Net Cords" but whatever the eventful outcome I stand by my decision that it is definitely suitable. I would like to make it clear, however, that this was entirely my idea and the writer of the column was in no way connected with it. However, to put matters right, and avoid embarassment to my own colleagues on the Editorial Board, who have been asked about it, the column this issue will carry the writers name. I, personally, think the nom-de-plume suits it better, and will therefore be used in future issues, assuming of course, that sufficient material is available. The column itself has aroused considerable comment, most of which has been favourable. Many people agree with the criticisms and comments passed and are in favour of this method of presentation. The end result has been two letters one for, and one against which is not a bad start, and we hope it will lead to more. The idea of this column is to stimulate interest by commenting on happenings, opinions, and criticisms, which are widespread in the Clubs, but never get into print. There will obviously be those who object for one reason or another, but I feel it is not a bad thing to know what others are thinking, and at the same time to be able to have a laugh at ourselves. What do you think?

The hardest part of this type of column is getting hold of the right material and we would appreciate any information about happenings in your own Club, or at matches which we can use. So, if you know of any thing useful, why not send it to me and I will pass it on for consideration.

Having played only three matches our ladies team have concluded one-half of their league programme, and have reached the zone final of the Rose Bowl. They have beaten Wirral and Preston, and drawn with Blackpool, but what their league position is I have nt a clue, since I've received no league tables this season as yet. Their next League match is at Crewe, on 11th January, and considering the strength of our team this year we should pick up two more points.

We reached the Zone Final of the Rose Bowl by means of a bye in the 1st Round and a walk-over conceded by Burnley in the 2nd, and now face Manchester at the English Electric on April 6th, at 3-0 p.m. We have an excellent chance of beating our oldest rivals, for while we have our strongest side for some years in Judy Crafter, Barbara Cain and Mabel Frencis, the Manchester team is much weakened by the absence of Connie Moore, due to a serious operation. Kay Rumjahn is to captain the team in the unavoidable absence of Elizabth Loughrey.

Our Ladies "A" Team, Janet Rumjahn, Pam Fidler and Jean Mackenzie have played 2, won 1 and lost 1. Following our 8-2 win over Bury, the girls lost 2-8 to Oldham, Janet winning the only 2 sets. Now, while we all like to see our teams win, the object of selecting these three youngsters was to give them experience in the inter-city field, and we cannot expect them to win all the time, for they are constantly meeting older and more experienced opponents. They will certainly enjoy more success after a little more match play in this company.

The Men's 1st Team have won only 3 points from their first four matches, having lost at Burnley 6-4, and 1-9 versus Bolton at home. Business commitments have prevented both Gordon Birch and Pete D'Arcy from playing in every match, but it seems likely that they will be available from now on. Arthur Taylor (Bath St.) has earned the 3rd place in the team, who now meet Hyde, at the Liverpool Y.M.C.A., on 5th January. On the 6th, the same team travels to Bolton for the Zone Final of the Wilmott Cup, where we hope for a better result than in the recent

League game. Neither Birch nor Taylor were playing on that occasion so anything can happen.

In the Norman Cook Trophy, after a bye in the 1st Round, our team of George and Roy Smith, Arthur Taylor and Judy Crafter beat Blackburn 7-3 and our opponents for the next Round (3) are not yet known.

The Men's "A" Team are having a rough time in Division 2 North, having played 4, won 1 and lost 3. However, with an easier second-half programme they should pick up a few more points yet. Dixie Dean now replaces Ian Burrows in the team. Ian wanted a "rest" having gone stale from $4\frac{1}{2}$ years non-stop play. There is little doubt that he will be returning to the team in the future, but it is problematical "when."

The Youth team have 5 points from 5 games. In November, they won 10-0 versus Crewe, away, then lost 2-8 at home versus Mid-Cheshire, iu a match where only Richard Heath won 2 sets. In December an 8-2 win over Ellersmere Port (Heath 3, Dean 2, Wensley 2) was dimmed a little at Warrington, where the best we could achieve was a draw. Heath was unable to play. so Dave Watson (YMCA) made his first appearance of the season. Alan Dean and Watson each got 2, and Ian Wensley 1. Their next match is away versus Stockport, on Jan. 9th, and since Heath is still not available, the same three will do duty once again.

The unfortunate Juniors have played another of their very few matches, and lost to Burnley "A" o-10, but the results of certain sets was much closer than such a sweeping score indicates. For instance, Alan Williams (Colonsay) lost one set 22-20, 29-22, 21-19, and you cannot get much closer than that. Ian Shaw and Alan Metcalfe justified their inclusion also, and the same side will meet Oldham, away, on 24th January.

Unfortunately Janet Rumjahn was unable to make the trip to Birmingham for the Inter - Zone match in the Bromfield Trophy, so an all Colonsay side of Pam Fidler, Jean Mackenzie and Christine Lavelle took on a very strong Birmingham team. Each won I set in a not

unexpected defeat, but they gave their opponents a few nasty moments before the issue was decided.

My thanks to Ken Jones and Vic Chesham for having taken over as Captains of the Men's 1st and "A" Teams respectively, more or less at a moments notice, and I must express my sincere and grateful thanks to Brian Leeson, who has taken so much

work off my shoulders while I have been ill. I don't think that any previous Match Secretary could have had more loyal support from both Captains and players that I have had this season, but Brian's efforts have gone beyond the "call of duty," a fact which I must acknowledge freely and publicly.

That "New" Service Rule

HOW IT IS ABUSED

Last season we saw the spread of those acrobatic services from below table top level. There was no doubt in most people's minds that the players making use of this type of service were bending the service rule to their own advantage and were making deliberate use of the fact that most players acting as umpires did not know where legality ended, and they were thus able to get away with far too much.

All credit then to the E.T.T.A. who have acted promptly and put into operation, for a trial period, a service rule whose wording for the most part is unmistakable. The result was an immediate cessation of the low level service, which has been to everyone's advantage. This is not to say that a player should not be able to obtain any advantage from his own service, far from it, but any advantage gained must be within the rules.

Alas, for this imaginative attempt to improve our game, for if ours is a sample of general practice, and I believe it is, the rule is already being abused. We, the players, in both our playing and umpiring capacity are to blame, and for why?

The main answer to that question is too many players don't wish to acknowledge that they know what the words "Palm of the hand" mean. Far too many place the ball on the fingers or serve with the fingers cupped around it. This immediately becomes a foul service as the umpire must be able to see it "visibly leave the palm." The way some players hold it you would need X-Ray eyes to see it at all.

Another part of the wording being abused is "projected near vertically upward" are players doing this? No. Those who previously rolled the ball onto the bat continue to do so and brave the umpire who dares to call them.

Similar abuse is being given to the wording "so that the ball is visible at all times to the umpire." Again, some players wave the bat around it momentarily obscuring it from the umpires view. A minor point this you may say, and so it is. Nevertheless, it is from such small beginnings that the spread of the low level service began.

Another version of this is the practice of some players to throw the ball almost to ceiling height. Depending on room conditions it would be difficult to say whether or not the umpire lost sight of the ball. even so, this type of service places an unjust strain on the umpire who has to follow the flight of the ball, and then when it is struck, switch his vision to the net. Try doing this yourself and you will see what I mean. There also arises the point that the servers opponent also loses sight of the ball giving an unfair advantage to the server. This could be stopped by adding to the wording "not to be thrown above the level of table lights."

HOW WE COULD OVERCOME THIS ABUSE!

The biggest obstacle to be overcome is on the umpiring side, for as we all know many of the players who act as umpires do so reluctantly and often unsuccessfully, thus there is very little chance of offenders being

pulled up. The players also are to blame for not accepting the umpires decision. They usually glare and pass remarks about the umpires own service and then proceed to repeat the offence. Result of all that, no further attempt by the umpire to insist on correct services. Why can't we just accept the umpires decision and get on with playing to the rules?

I would like to see each team select one player with the ability to insist on the service rule being correctly obeyed and he would then act as umpire for all their matches. This, I well realise is throwing all the work onto one player, but once teams realised that they were not going to be allowed to get away with anything they would soon begin to respect any team operating this system, and the system itself would soon catch on when its efficiency was realised. Few are the teams, especially those concerned in promotion or relegation, who can continue to lose sets because their own players refused to obey the umpire, with the subsequent loss of points.

I know there are a lot of snags, and I know its hard to find the players able to carry it out successfully. But, as I have already said, it only needs one club to make it work for it to catch on.

However, please don't look to me to start the ball rolling, as I regret to say, that like the rest of you, I am at heart a moral coward!!!

Sharp Practice—or Tactics?

To an outsider to your League, it would perhaps seem your Divisional write-ups would be of little or no interest. To most people this may well be true, but I personally read any table tennis magazine from cover to cover including every issue of the Liverpool magazine. I was then interested in two remarks which to me, an outsider appeared rather contradictory, though I may have got the wrong end of the stick. Jim Green, in his Division I notes (this is the November issue, by the way, perhaps I should have said that carlier says — "and secondly by some astute captaincy by Bath St. whose order was completely reversed" Gordon Nevins, writing on Division 2A, reports-"A. Horewood picking up two sets at the No. 4 spot—possibly suspension for two weeks would cut this sort of thing out."

Now, reading those two reports there appears a conflict of opinion. are Clubs supposed to place their players in order of merit or are tactical manoeuvres permitted? It may be of interest that up to the war, I'm told, teams in the Leicester & District League were of five players, but each player played the

five opponents a single game. After the war, teams of three were introduced and this is still the system used. With everyone playing there is no way of any player avoiding any of the opposition, which I suppose is one of the advantages, but it does have its disadvantages. One is that only three players can occupy a table in any one night and clubs with a big or good membership may only be able to give a limited number of players a game. The big disadvantage of the 3-A-Side teams, as I see it, is that one really good player can almost assure a point for his team. With his three and the doubles, his two team-mates need only pick-up one set between them to gain a point. In other words in the 3-A-Side, a player can play in 40% of the matches and in the the 5-Aside only 20%. The latter is clearly more dependent on team-work than on one player. Notwithstanding this however, I cannot ever see us in Leicester ever reverting to the $5-\Lambda$ -Side League, It is too well established There are many small clubs who who would be hard pushed to register the requisite number of players—but—back to square one is it sharp practice or tactics?

Dear Sir,

I thought the selection of 'Net Cord" comments were amusingly written and interesting. But I raised my eyebrows at the one re critics of the scoring and league set-up systems.

I agree that the scoring system has proved a success-I hoped it would from the outset, but to suggest the pyramid league has proved even remotely successful is putting a strain on the facts. It was a dismal failure the first season and was modified to the present inefficient

and unfair "Twin Stream" get-up.
I can assure "T.T. Ball" that I have remained fiercely critical of this set-up and have tried repeatedly, but without success, to express my criticisms, which included some new suggestions for improving this ridiculous system.

The biggest and most glaring defect in our system is surely the unbalanced divisions-non-existent in straight divisions. The winners of an "A" Division for example are often inferior to the runners-up in "B." but still get the medals and promotion It sounds ridiculous, but it does happen.

Take this season's 4A Divisions for example:—English Electric "D" must be favourites for the title, medals and promotion. If we were in 4B, however, I doubt if we would get higher than fifth place. This is fine for us, but hardly fair to those stronger teams in 4B.

These teams (Bootle Y.M., Mossley Hill, Pirates, English Electric, etc.) should not be in such low divisions anyway. They should be together in a 4th or 5th Division in a straight Leaving their opponents set-up. with more equality in a 7th or 8th division.

Another effect of this can be seen in 2A and 2B. In 2A, Crawfords "A,, play English Electric "A," but in 2B Crawfords first team meet only English Electric "B." Logically these fixtures should be reversed, but if this happened one division would be markedly stronger than the other. Despite the best efforts of the selection committee we have to live with these anomalies, as they are inherent in the faulty "Twin Stream" set-up.

To me it is as plain as a pike-staff that straight divisions are superior and when I read comments enthusing on the present set-up I wonder whether I am going mad or they are.

I put it to "T.T. Ball," or anyone else for that matter if you honestly believe this pathatic set-up is the best, then let's have some facts and figures. I'd love to be convinced.

The top of the Division has an aspect most unusual at this stage of the season, for customarily one can forecast the ultimate winners with a reasonable amount of accuracy, but the position is so tense between the three leading sides that only an inspired guess is likely to foretell the ultimate champions.

Examination of score-cards appears to show that the new system of "swopping the order" is one of the major contributory factors of the existing tension. When we find such players as Gordon Birch, Arthur Taylor and Peter Hurworth lurking around the tail end, then there is definitely something wrong, and the sooner that "order of merit" brought back the better! Strangely, the leading teams agree with my views. They would prefer to play in order of strength, but like others, they know that to do so is to cut their own throats. But we are likely to see many strange names in "red" figures in the seasons records, and even more uncommon ones among those in the 3-5 class!

However, this system does give many strange results, which have no relation to the various strengths of teams, and to forecast any final order would be utterly foolish. I still incline rather to the Y.M.C.A.'s chances for they have their strength more equally distributed.

Bath St. are having a good season, and Mossley Hill have quickly established themselves in this Division Both teams have certain "strong men" to bear the brunt of the opposition, but are good teams overall. We all regret the losses Mossley Hill have sustained by reason of the emigration of Eddie Cooke, and the operation to Bob Hudson, which might keep him out for the rest of the season. I think I can speak for everyone connected with the division when I wish him a speedy recovery.

Linnets are having a thin time-Gordon Exell hasn't yet been able to turn out, Frank Thomas's injured arm has been slow in mending, and with Ian Burrows enforced lay-off, are feeling the pinch. But somehow they feel no fear of relegation as yet. But their "A" team seem sure bet for next years 2nd Division. It still seems unsure which team will be the other unlucky one, for the battle at the bottom is as tough as that at the top.

A Keen Promotion Struggle.

Bath Street "B" have now emerged as clear favourites for promotion, with Wavertree Labour C, Trinity A, Orrell and English Electric C well in the running. There is no apparent weakness in the undefeated Bath Street's line up, and they have now defeated all their close rivals with each of their players winning consistently.

Bath Street's main rivals, as I see it, are Trinity A. After two early season defeats at the hands of Crawfords C and Bath Street, they have now picked themselves off the floor and have dropped only 13 points in their last six matches. Unlike Bath Street's solid team effort, the success of the Trinity side has been mainly due to the fine play of three players-A. Abbott, R. Bailey and John Hankin- in fact R. Trinity had a great home win over Orrell by 8 sets to 2, although I doubt if the margin of victory would have been so great had the match been played at Orrell. Abbott. Bailey and Hankin all scored doubles. with Law and Hulm chipping in with one each. Gerry Brint and Tony Morris were the only successful players for Orrell, who despite this defeat are still top of the league, having played a game more than Bath Street.

English Electric C are another side who have made a tremendous improvement after an uncertain start. Ken Black at No. 1 has proved to be their most consistent player, and in his last six matches has suffered only two defeats, these being to K. Chan (Coll. of Tech.) and G. Edmunds (St. Eliz.). Apart from K. Black, Bill Burness, playing most of his games at No. 3, and Abby Parker, playing mostly at No. 5, have the most impressive records.

An interesting position has developed at the bottom of the table, where four clubs are having a battle of their own, fighting to hold their Third Division status. Of these clubs, Linnets D's position is hopeless, but all credit to them for carrying on under difficult conditions. other three teams-St. Elizabeth's, L. & B.P.A.S. "B" and University "B"-seem to be about equally matched, although the University side have habit of improving as the season progresses.

St. Elizabeth's are lucky to have the tall left-hander Geoff Edmunds in their side at No. 1, and from that position he has won nearly half of his teams sets on his own. He has shown that he is one of the most outstanding players in the Division, and has lost only one set so far, going down in the third game 21-18, to Hilltop's, Bobby Chew.

I notice that certain clubs, on arriving at away matches with only 4 players, have left the blank at No. 1, in case deliberately moving the regular No. 1 to No. 2. I realise that this is quite legal, but is it really necessary?
