Editorial

For the second season in succession the Management Committee have had the unpleasant task of applying the provisions of Rule 20 to expel a club team from the League. This time, however, it is a multi-team club which is involved and much to their regret the Management Committee have had to expel the Ladies team from the club concerned. Unfortunately the team concerned have only recently joined the Women's Division, and have not been responsible for all three walk-overs. However, this point was made perfectly clear when this rule was proposed, and the Management Committee have acted in what they consider is in the best interests of all concerned. Whilst it is a matter of regret that it has once again been necessary to enforce this rule, perhaps, this time clubs will take notice that the Management Committee intend to enforce this rule to the ultimate benefit of all clubs.

The demand for 'Order of Merit' team play is beginning to be heard and whilst it all sounds very musical to some I feel it is time this matter was looked at in its proper perspective.

The system of scoring in use at present actively encourages team captains to place their teams in the order which will bring the most points, and it should not be any other way. Why, should clubs struggling for survival present their opponents with maximum points, when, by astute captaincy they can salvage precious points for themselves, and at the same time make things harder for those challenging for titles? For too long now the top clubs have had things all their own way, with often a guaranteed 10 points, merely because it is considered not the thing to alter the team order. That is so much rot Every team must act in their own interests and let their opponents look after themselves.

Whatever rules are passed to ensure some form of merit order you can be sure ways will be found to get round them and varied will be the opinions regarding each team's 'Order of Merit'. In my opinion the team captain is best qualified to decide his team order, depending on what tactics he wishes to adopt. So, let team captains continue to decide their own tactics and perhaps we will see an end to a lot of those 10-0 results and more open title battles.

How good is your Club Secretary? A recent dispute has brought into the open a fact which many know, but few will admit, that a good secretary is a club's most important asset. Sometimes they do slip up and everyone jumps on them, but next time it happens at your club just remember that without your secretary you would have no club, as any ex-Oakhill player will confirm.

A Toast to the Ladies!

Our Ladies team goes from strength to strength this season, for they have now played four, won three and drawn one. They have only two matches still to play, v. Manchester (at Crawfords, Feb. 23rd), and v. Stockport (Crawfords, March 22nd) and having beaten Manchester once, in the Rose Bowl, another win cannot be ruled out. All three girls, Judy Crafter, Barbara Cain and Mabel Francis are making an allout effort to win the League for the first time in 20 years, and if they fail they will go down fighting but there is no thought of failure in their heads. So I hope that the members of the League will roll up in large numbers to support them in their last two hurdles, just to let them know that the League does recognise that we have a Ladies team.

Their victory over Manchester in the Rose Bowl came after a stern battle, in which Judy and Mabel won two, and Barbara one. Barbara was going through a bad patch in which her attack went right off the boil, but she is back to normal now. Mabel won her set v. Mary Leigh, to break new ground for herself.

This is the first win over Manchester since 1952 . . . in the heyday of Andree Jones, Eileen Mansell and Bluey May so our three representatives deserve a rather special bit of support in the next one to help in a repeat performance. We went out in the next round, however, to Doncaster (away) a team of "ranked" players, Leslie Proudlock, Cynthia Duncombe and Pat Dainty. We lost 9-0, but six sets went to three, and our girls were far behind the Yorkshire trio. Apart from John O'Sullivan, who captained the team, our girls found themselves with another supporter, Don Davies (Cadwa). How I wish we had a few more Don Davies's in the League!

Our youthful Ladies 'A' Team went to Burnley to win 7-3. Janet Rumjahn (3), Pam Fidler (2) and Jean Mackenzie (1) plus Jean and Pam in the Doubles, were our winners. From three matches they have now earned 4 points, which is a vast improvement over 'A' Team performances in recent years. Their next match is on February 16th, v. Warrington at Bootle Police Stn. and the final game is v. Southport (away) on March 8th. And we hope for more points yet to come.

Out of the "Wilmott" and "Norman Cooke" Cups as well

Our Men's team went out of the "Wilmott' Cup to Bolton, which was not entirely unexpected. But at last the gap is closing. Gordon Birch beat Bryn Farnworth and B. Mitchell, both currently playing for the County, and Pete D'Arcy beat Farnworth also, to turn the customary 'whitewash' into a respectable 3-6 Later, in the Norman Cooke trophy, against the same opponents, Judy Crafter was the sole winner in a 1-8 loss. I'm told that this was an even closer match, but that on this occasion the luck went against us. I'm not a great believer in 'luck' and prefer to think that the Bolton boys won this time on merit. Still, there is some writing on the wall now.

After an 8-2 win v. Hyde, the team suffered its worst hammering of the season against Stockport when they went down o-10 to Derek Schofield, Brian Keene and Don Berry. There is no disgrace in losing to a trio such as this, although I am not alone in thinking the final score a travesty of justice. But there it is. There are now two matches left, on March 8th at Liverpool—Y.M. v. Preston and on the 22nd v. Lytham (away). We should win both of these, but this being the uncertain game it is, please don't take that as a forecast.

Editor's Note. Jim's notes are unfortunately incomplete as he was taken bad whilst writing them and has since been admitted to hospital. I am sure that in wishing him a speedy recovery I speah for every member of the League.

A new venue has been found for the 'Liverpool Closed' which will be held this year on April 16th to 19th, at New Heys Middle School, Greenhill Road, Liverpool 18. We believe conditions will be better than last year, particularly with regard to the amount of run back.

You will see from the above dates that once again we are holding the tournament on four nights, Tuesday to Friday, with the Finals held on the Friday instead of Saturday. This arrangement appeared to be

favoured by both competitors and the Final spectarors last year. It is hoped that entry forms for

the tournament will be enclosed with this "Digest". Please return as soon as possible. We had a good entry last year, our aim must be to

improve on it this year.

Unfortunately the Committee have had to enforce Rule 20 again this season, in this instance C. F. Mott Ladies team have been forced to withdraw after the club had conceded 3 walk-overs. It is unfortunate that these things have to happen, but the Committee must enforce the rules which you make.

Despite any action taken by the Committee, such as warnings, fines, etc., there does not appear to be any improvement in the situation with regard to teams playing short, and

there are still a fair number of walkovers reported to the committee. Over the years we have had exchanges of opinion in the "Digest" on many subjects, but I cannot recall seeing in print any ideas for stopping this curse of playing short, with the exception of the point per set system of scoring which is now in force, and which did initially, I think, do some good.

With another A.G.M. in the very near future the time is ripe for giving some thought to possible rule changes. Surely there is someone in the League who has travelled a long distance on some cold and wet night. had only one or even no sets to play. who can come up with an acceptable idea which will help stamp this out. It may not require a rule change, deduction of points, increase in the number of players required to be registered for a team (this would require a rule change), are possible YOU are the people remedies. affected by the forfeiting of sets, so let us have your views.

I have just been informed that Jim Green has been admitted to hospital. Jim has had a particularly bad spell of health lately, and I am sure you will all join me in wishing him a very speedy return to good

health.

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Some Umpiring Misapprehensions

--OR KNOTTY KNOTTY POINTS

On being asked to supply an article for this "Digest"—I could only think of the one I intended to write last season, but never got around to doing so. But now my hand has been forced—so to speak. Here are a few scoring anomalies that I have come across during my recent years of playing and I am sure they will enlighten those who have never bothered to read the full rules of Table Tennis, or troubled to have an 'umpiring problem' cleared up.

The main one, where many a player must have been 'diddled' without realising it, is the rule whereby—a volleyed net serve is a let. If in serving, the ball touches the net and goes off the table, the point is given to the receiver. But if it is VOLLEYED by the receiver, the server does not get a point, it is a LET.

A player CAN strike twice at the ball, for if he misses it completely first time and then plays it successfully, this is within the law, provided of course the ball has not touched anything (and gone out of play) in between the two strokes.

The ball does NOT go out of play by going above the lights. The key factor is whether or not it touches anything in its flight.

A ball CAN be returned good by going AROUND the net as well as over it. This means, of course, the end of the net supports and not (as some would argue) by passing between

the support and net—if there was such a gap (as often there is). It is also a good return even if it touches the support in passing around—just like the 'plain nets' as we all know them.

In doubles, a question posed was—
If the ball (going off) gets volleyed
by the player who is not receiving it,
who gets the point? For the purpose
of most laws in doubles, the two
players are as one, and so a volley
by the partner of the receiver is a
point AGAINST the volleying pair.

"A player shall lose a point if his free hand touches the playing surface while the ball is in play and if, before the ball in play shall have passed over the end lines or side lines not yet having touched the playing surface on his side of the table since being struck by his opponent it comes in contact with him or anything he wears or carries."

The above 'highlights' are just some of the disagreements that I have personally come across and hope they will help anyone else in doubt.

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Room for Defenders?

In these days fast attacking play seems to be all the vogue. Sandwich rubber bats are clearly responsible in the main for this. With the bat comes faster shots, more intricate spins and tricky services, all of which favour the attacker. defenders are out. Or are they? The day of the all 100% defender has gone I think at top level. If only because the expedite rule precludes this type of play. But defenders can take heart for there is still room for them. The last two world championships have seen one European player in the men's singles semi-finals. On each occasion it was Eberhardt Scholer, almost certainly the best defender in the world. In England, who will forget Ian Harrison's wonderful retrieving against Denis Neale in the 'English Closed' Final. Bryan Merrett seems as though he can carry on indefinitely pushing his way to victory for Gloucestershire. Derek Schofield, the Cheshire plumber can still return one shot too many for most attackers and is well worth his premier division place. Munt, the Warwickshire player would never win first prize for bright play, but his value to Warwickshire has been inestimable as he has cut one player after another down to size. One needs to go no farther than Bolton to see George Livesey still ready to take any shots anyone is prepared to venture against him. The number of players in Lancashire likely to beat George could be counted on one hand.

So, although attacking players are in the vast majority, defenders are

still there, still obtaining good results. One advantage with the defender is he is likely to last much longer. Ian Harrison has seen players come and go but he is still there in the top six and no one is sure of beating him. Ebby Scholer and Derek Schofield could reasonably be expected to have seen their best days in table tennis but there is nothing to suggest either are declining in the least. Why do they outlast attackers? Because I think defenders rely less on quick reflexes, more on anticipation and footwork. Both these come with practice. Reflexes are just quick or they are not. Attackers are inclined to rely on their reflexes, which is natural enough, but once these slow down then, unless they are able to adjust their game, they are in trouble. So it seems to me that anyone who wants to defend should not necessarily be discouraged. Most youngsters will want to be attackers. It's more attractive to play and quicker to get results. And, to be fair, in the main they are more likely to be successful with an attacking But anyone who wants to defend and has the aptitude still has a future in the game. But I feel the ability to kill the loose ball is essential but I also think there must always be a place for defenders. They provide a contrast with attackers. Table Tennis without defenders is a game with only half the spectacle.

So here's to defenders. A rarer breed than in the past but vital to the game if it is to survive as a spectacle none the less.

Dear Sir.

I feel I must comment on the remarks made about St. Elizabeth's (Div. 3B) in the January issue. I would like to make it clear however that I am not making a personal attack on the divisional correspondent who can only write as he sees fit to, but I feel the circumstances concerning our club have not been put in the proper perspective.

We lost our clubroom a week before the season was due to start and with the threat of expulsion from the League if we conceded three walk-overs hanging over our heads we had to search for new premises and at the same time try to re-arrange our home fixtures. We ourselves were in a position to claim a walk-over from the Police, but as we needed the co-operation of the other clubs to fulfil our fixtures we did not do so. Playing in different clubrooms has had its effect on the form of our team with the exception of one member, Geoff Edmunds.

The response from other clubs to let us play at their quarters has, in the majority of cases, been practically nil. I would have thought they would be glad of the extra cash it would bring in.

We are now fixed up at Trinity but may not be able to continue there next season, and I have also heard that another club in our division is in danger of losing their playing quarters for next season.

Would it be possible therefore in the future for other clubs who may find themselves in the same position as we did, to play at four or five clubs to fulfil their fixtures while trying to find new quarters.

A comment on that excellent new feature "Net Cords". Playing at Crawfords recently for the first time and I hope the last, not only having to contend with poor lighting, a football match in the gym next door and an uneven floor, the table was just about on its last legs as well as being the slowest I have ever played on. However, this is not to detract from the play of the Crawford team, Daly and Roper particularly in inflicting a double against Geoff Edmunds.

Playing at Linnets last week one of our players had his van stolen and has not up to the time of writing had it returned.

English Electric are falling behind in the battle for the championship, as can be plainly seen from the tables, yet on the face of it, it would seem completely impossible that such could possibly be so, for in no less than FIVE of their eleven first-half games, Gordon Birch featured in the No. 4 spot. Now, since Gordon is the current League champion, and is the only male player from Liverpool for many years to get a Lancs. County badge, it strains credulity to believe that the team has had three better players available on no less than FIVE occasions.

Don't get me wrong I'm not knocking either Gordon, his team or his Captain, for the entire division, with one solitary exception, plays the same "tactical game" of vo-vo. either looking for easy sets (by lining up your 1 and 2 against their 4 and 5) or in the attempt to try to find their wandering I and 2 with yours (who you think the stronger). So the ultimate result of any match is decided before play starts, the best "guesser" gaining the ultimate advantage, but the players are those who suffer. But you must conform to survive!

You don't believe me? Well, take it alphabetically, Bath St.; can anyone name the four players who caused Arthur Taylor to drop on merit to No. 5 (twice) and John Ogston to No. 4 (four times)? Beauclair, everyone has had a go in every position, as have those of Linnets and Linnets 'A' (except I'. Thomas). The Y.M., only George Smith has had a regular spot, the rest playing up and down as the

whim of their captain dictates, their 'A' team likewise. Mossley Hill shoot Kenwright and Millward up and down like a pair of express lifts, simply to ensure (if possible) a minimum of 4 sets per match. Waterloo Park have played every player in the top two positions from time to time, even poor Bob Rohrer, whose tally of 3 wins in 20 sets hardly seems to fit him for the honour! The disease has spread to Wavertree Lab, where no player of the 1st team. and only one of the 'A' are currently in a position to "qualify" for red figures at the end of the season. Where are RAFTERS? They are the shining example to the rest of us . . . having played all season in the same order, win or lose . . . with reserves being brought in at the tailend.

I'm not a member of Rafters, in fact I've probably had more narks with them than anyone else (being a narky sort) but I lifts me titfer to them for straight dealing.

There is a simple answer to this, of course. Rank players in order of merit, and play in ranking order. Since everyone has differing views on merits, the Committee can accept a club's list (except in flagrant cases, such as Gordon Birch at No. 4), BUT no player to move up or down more than one place, and this only after he has played on two occasions in his currently ranked position. When playing against any side, one would then know within limits, who you will meet. Then, at least, we might feel fairly confident that the better team would win, instead of the best guesser!

Don't forget one thing, whatever system is adopted at any time, it is those who do not conform who get clobbered.

I shall now be moaned at for giving my personal views in this column. That is not so. I have been fortunate enough to have had visits from a large number of 1st division players during my illness (for which I am very grateful), and the majority of them, especially the better players, feel the same way. In fact they are fed up with having to meet inferior players, them watching the best of the opposition wasting their evening in turn!

Cadwa have already assured themselves of 1st Division table tennis again next season, but having done so well in the League they were surprisingly beaten in the Cup, for which they were firm favourites.

The promotion battle is by no means ended as a terrific struggle is going on for that precious runner-up slot, and Cadwa could have some say in this as they have still to play most of the contenders. The two most fancied teams are Crawfords 'A' and Wavertree Lab. 'B', only a few points separate these two. I have spoken to players from both sides in the last week and they are each convinced that promotion will be theirs. They met at the Labour Club last week and once again Crawfords 'A' were winners 6-4. However, the Labour Club were, as in the previous encounter, playing with a reserve, and although their captain is a confessed 'Order of Merit' man, he put his reserve in at No. 2 but all One of Crawford's to no avail. strongest points has been their ability to field an unchanged side. Labour Club on the other hand have very rarely managed to do so. the time of writing the Labour Club have got the upper hand having brought their fixtures up-to-date and got the points in. Crawford's on the other hand have a match outstanding against Linacre, with the prospect of another postponement due to Cup Coincidently, their commitments. opponents in the semi-final will be

Linacre, but the result of this match cannot be taken as a guide to anyone's promotion prospects.

Do not assume from all this that these two clubs have it all cut and dried, far from it, for they are being hard pressed by a number of clubs all waiting to step in if these two slip up. One of these, Linacre, have done well in the Cup and their successes in this sphere may well spur them on to step into that second place. All the teams involved in this struggle have to play each other so we will have to wait a good while longer before we know who will be accompanying Cadwa.

Liverpool Jewish after a very bright start have now fallen away. They have gathered only 80 pts. from 15 matches, and although shown as third theirs is a false position and they will probably finish up at 7th or 8th.

Should it be Crawfords 'A' who win promotion then we shall have created some sort of record as it will mean that both promoted teams will have a woman player as one of their main props. Much good, however, promotion will do the Crawfords 'A' team, as next season the team in Div. I would become their 1st team and that in 2B their 'A' team. That would surely give rise to some anxious moments when they came to do their ranking for next season.

What of the bottom clubs? Relegation for Linnets 'C' is as certain as promotion is for Cadwa, but this is mainly due to the very trying period through which their club has been passing. Their companions will probabiy be the Police, but their position may improve as they have had some good results, having drawn with Liverpool Jewish and beaten Lussac 8-2, so it looks like a battle at the bottom as well as the top. However, who ever is the loser in this battle should still avoid relegation as we are already one team short and with the prospect of a further vacancy even Linnets 'C' may avoid the drop.

My remarks in the last issue regarding the rarity of teams playing short were a little premature, I'm afraid. The latest batch of cards shows a big increase in "walkovers." May be this is due to the wintry weather which seems to deter the less enthusiastic players. This unfortnate state of affairs seems to worsen, I have noticed, when Liverpool or Everton have a midweek match. In one case recently, a visiting player rang up during the day to say he would be unavoidably late in arriving. The home secretary, thinking that it was no doubt some urgent business or family matter which would detain him, said it would of course be perfectly alright for the player to arrive late. When the player concerned eventually arrived at about twenty to ten, it transpired that he had merely 'been to the match.

Generally the League positions have remained fairly static. Colonsay 'B' however must be due for a rise, they have a much stronger team now than they had in the earlier part

of the season. In fact, only one of that earlier team remains.

A quick run through the cards shows a good win for Crawfords over English Electric by 8 sets to 2, J. Hodges and George Moon getting English Electric's two sets. No less than eight of the sets went to three.

Liverpool Y.M. and Colonsay had a close game with the decision going to the Y.M. 6-4. Bailey and Brown got doubles for the Y.M. and Les Franch two for Colonsay. Three of the sets were decided at deuce in the third game.

Sparta did well to take three games from English Elec. on the latter's table. Terry Holloway in particular did well to beat J. Hodges in a three game set. Trinity had a very good spell just before and after Christmas with 10-0 wins over Palmerston and Linnets 'B' and a very good 6-4 victory over a full strength Colonsay side. In this game Brain Leeson helped Colonsay considerably with a double over A. Southall and A. Abbott, both in straight games. The set against Southall included a 30-28 game. Is this a record?

Regarding the match between St. Edward's and English Electric which. you remember, was abandoned after 6 sets due to a fire. Apparently there is no rule to cover this eventuality and the Committee have to decide each case individually. In this instance, not unanimously I understand, they have come to the rather strange decision that only the outstanding four sets must be played, with the same players involved. Perhaps the same ball must be used and a new moon must be shining as on the night of the interrupted match.

They are not up to the level of the leading teams but Coulson and Garside, their respective captains, are determined to make their opponents know they have a fight on their hands. It is always easy to maintain enthusiasm in winning teams but a much more difficult proposition to keep the flag flying in repeated defeats, all Leagues must have a bottom two teams and with L.Y.C.A. and C.F. Mott as precarious outposts of the League operating under difficult circumstances it is greatly to the credit of both clubs that they battle on so cheerfully and valiantly.
