Editorial

Go to any recreation ground in this city on a Saturday afternoon and you will find, whatever the weather conditions, full teams of footballers engaged in giving their utmost for their clubs. Compare this with the creeping disease now spreading in this game of ours of late arrivals, late starts, late finishes—with very rarely two full teams in attendance—and walk-overs. These things do no good for the game and inevitably even conscientious players start adopting the same manners.

It is a known and accepted fact that a great many players have various commitments which prevent them arriving on time and every allowance is made for this by most clubs. Unfortunately those who have no reasonable excuse still arrive late. Add to this the time taken to get changed plus the inevitable knock-up which most players assume is their right whether they arrive at 7.30 or 8.30 and it is little wonder that few matches get started before

8 p.m. and even fewer finish before 10.30 p.m.

Few players seem to realise that the stated starting time of 7.30 is for commencement of play and not commencement of changing time. Everyone complains when matches finish late, particularly if they have a long distance to travel, yet no-one seems to appreciate the fact that most matches would finish before 10.15 if play was started at 7.30 p.m. No matter how many players are present at starting time no-one ever seems prepared to suggest getting matches started. This is a team game and except for exceptional circumstances all players should be present for the whole of a match and not just for the part in which they are actively concerned.

I know this has all been said before and will again be ignored, for what is really needed are a few captains who are prepared to make a stand and compel both their own players and their opponents to conform to the rules. This will probably never happen, but if it ever does it will be for the good of the game

in the long run.

I don't know whether or not my last appeal for your letters was well received, but I have received six letters and space has been made for them all. Several interesting points are raised which might even encourage more of you to write. Tom Blunn (Hull & ETTA) has sent a very interesting letter to us on matters affecting us locally and another writer raises the question of the high price of T.T. balls. This is an important point for all of us and perhaps one of our advertisers may reply on this, that's if they bother to read the proof we send them. I have also received a Cross-word from one player and this will appear in the February issue (I hope).

Many players approach me at matches with complaints or ideas and I always suggest they write to me as editor. So far, none have, but I assure everyone that letters will be printed whether the subject be old or new and that nothing is ignored merely because it may not have my approval. Space is the only factor that counts and I do my best to find space for your letters

and articles because this is YOUR magazine.

From the Secretary's Desk

AT A RECENT MEETING OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE, WE WERE MADE AWARE OF A PARTICULARLY SERIOUS OFFENCE WHICH HAD BEEN COMMITTED BY THE LINNETS CLUB, WHEN IN A LEAGUE MATCH, THEIR "B" TEAM BEING ONE PLAYER SHORT, A MEMBER OF THE "A" TEAM WAS PLAYED AND A FALSE NAME (THE NAME OF A "B" TEAM PLAYER) WAS INSERTED ON THE SCORE CARD.

THE COMMITTEE'S DECISION REGARDING THIS INCIDENT WAS AS FOLLOWS:—

- (a) ALL SETS PLAYED BY THE INELIGIBLE PLAYER, TO BE AWARDED TO THEIR OPPONENTS.
- (b) THE LINNETS CLUB TO BE FINED £2.
- (c) THE "A" TEAM PLAYER, J. BIRD, AND THE CAPTAIN OF THE "B" TEAM, G. WILLIAMS, TO BE SUSPENDED FOR THE NEXT 10 LEAGUE MATCHES, AND FOR ALL CUP MATCHES FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE SEASON, AND DURING THE PERIOD OF SUSPENSION G. WILLIAMS NOT TO HOLD ANY OFFICIAL POSITION IN THE LINNETS CLUB.

We have also received recently one or two complaints regarding playing conditions, these have been investigated and I am pleased to say that in one case at least the complaint was unfounded. It is, however, a change to have clubs taking sufficient interest to even raise a query of this nature, but I would ask all clubs to take note of this item of news and check that their own conditions are up to standard, and that they are making the fullest possible use of the facilities at their disposal.

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Letters to the Editor

Dear Sir.

It is now over ten years since I left Mersevside but I still feel part of it by the receipt of the "Digest" at very regular intervals. I have at very regular intervals. I have often felt that I should make some contribution in return and current issue offers quite a number of items on which I feel I could make

some useful comment.

Ranking. I could never understand why in Table Tennis we punish ourselves by inflicting the need to rank our players at all levels. At best it can only be considered to be an attempt to produce a fair result, at worst it produces fiddling and distrust amongst teams, which is regularly in evidence in the "Digest." Does it therefore achieve its object? I doubt it, for it requires an assessment which in many cases is almost impossible and in most cases has got to be reduced to guesswork. Even though some rankings may well be genuine it presumes that conditions are consistent in every respect during the period. It does not take into account the physical condition of the players which, due to many causes, could vary tremendously from one week to another. worst aspect, of course, is the manipulation which produces the exact opposite to the aims of friendly competition. It reduces the captain to a record keeper and eliminates intelligent tactics and counter tactics. At County and National level the repercussions are far greater and are a constant source of irritation (particularly to the chairman of a selection committee). Why do we do it?

I agree with your correspondent that the ideal combination is threea-side but this brings its problems which I will comment on later. For the sake of national and international seedings and Open tournaments, rankings are very necessary, but is it really necessary to insist on league ranking for local competition?

Three or Five. I am sure that the advantages of three over five are so obvious that there is no point in going over them. The main and probably the only objection is the lack of playing facilities. It is not possible to run five teams of three with the same playing facilities required for three teams of five. Some players have to be left out and regular team combinations are permanently disrupted. Quite understandably, this position is just not acceptable to the bulk of players, and it would be quite wrong to force a change against the will of a majority. Of the 80,000 league members in England, less than 3,000 attain league or county standard and play outside the weekly competition. But some leagues produce more better players than others and I am convinced that in this connection, five-a-side leagues are at a definite disadvantage. I am about to make a detailed investigation into this particular problem and the findings will be published in due course.

The only solution I can offer is to bring the younger generation up to play 3-a-side; all junior divisions and youth clubs could play this method. A premier division would provide the opportunity for top teams and in time the change could spread through the league, though it would be a long term policy. But for juniors it is an urgent problem bearing in mind that over a short junior life of 3 to 4 years, a junior would have 50% greater experience.

Graded Tournaments. I am pleased to see that the 'Merseyside' has applied for Graded status. Sponsorship is the main answer but it is very difficult to obtain and a lot of hard work is needed. A graded tournament with top England players is a better incentive for a sponsor. Incidentally, any ideas for a better title

than 'graded'?

Annual Accounts. I am very pleased to see that my old friend Don Cameron is still keeping his end up with the books. I regret that I do not hold his opinion that it is a good thing to keep affiliation fees down for such a long time. If good reserves were once available I feel a policy of financial assistance to juniors would have brought much more satisfaction to the members. I am fully convinced that only by continual competition in Tournaments will the juniors make the grade. I have had this brought home to me more than ever since I came over to Hull. We are isolated

here, and have an hour's journey before we really start to go anywhere. Nevertheless, we have always entered our juniors in open tournaments and given them as much competition as possible. The success of Hull Juniors in schools and cup competitions is written in the records for anyone to seel

The difference between Club fee and fees paid to the ETTA and LTTA is very small and works out at about 6d. per player: this compares with 2/- per player in Hull. In addition the ETTA fees seem to be about 6d. per player compared with 2/6d, in Yorkshire. But again, Yorkshire finance their juniors to a very great extent and the success of the seniors in the County Championships Premier Division is a satisfactory reward. I am afraid success has to be paid for by somebody. Why not a massive effort to sell the ETTA lottery ticket this season? One league makes a profit of about froo per season. How about staging a first class international match? One league this season has made £300 for the ETTA and over £500 for themselves!

I hope I am not being too smug or critical but I am still a Lancastrian and am anxious to see Lancashire not only the biggest county, but also

the best.

General. I enjoy the regular articles and feel that you have two very good contributors in Phil Reid and John Molyneux.

Dear Sir.

In the November "Digest" Wally Sill mentioned some of the benefits to be gained from a change to threea-side teams but unfortunately he passed over the suggestion because it "would be impractical for some clubs." This has always been the standard argument used to prevent a change but has no more substance in Liverpool than in any other big city. The short answer to the argument is to quote the examples shown by the many Leagues who have already chosen to convert to 3-a-side despite any difficulties If this answer is ininvolved. sufficient, an examination of the handbook shows that this season :-

(1) No club has more than six teams.

Therefore even the biggest club
could convert without being forced
to deprive anybody of a regular

match.

(2) Only six clubs have more than three teams.

Hence, the vast majority of clubs would not be embarrassed at all by a conversion.

Examination of the league structure shows that currently there are 14 teams in each of seven divisions. Reorganisation could be achieved by forming fourteen divisions, each containing twelve 3-a-side teams. The effects of this would be:—

(1) Twice as many divisions.

Consequently players in each division would be more equally

matched.

(2) Fewer teams in each division.

Resulting in four more "free" weeks in which clubs having no spare match nights could play any rearranged matches or cup-ties.

(3) Matches would consist of 9 sets.

Drawn games would be impossible and there would be no possibility of fixture congestion through cup

replays.

It now seems obvious that there is only a tiny minority (if any) who would be adversely affected by a re-organisation on the lines described and even these would still derive the direct benefit that each player would play three more equally matched opponents with no possibility of 'fiddling.'

In conclusion I would like to reinforce Mr. Sill's closing remarks with the comment that it would be a tragedy if general apathy resulted in failure to obtain the necessary "two to one" majority over the few inevitable "dieheards" who will still vote to retain our outdated system. We will be far from the first to change either our team structure or our scoring system but PLEASI? let us not be the last!

Dear Sir,

In response to your request for views and opinions here are a few of mine.

I have been playing in the L'pool League for many years and in the past two years also in the Wirral League, but judging by what I have seen the organisation is not a patch on the one we have in Liverpool. It is one to be proud of and we owe a great deal to all concerned in running our League, we do have our problems but who hasn't these days?

One of the main topics is our points system. I would like to see us revert to the "two for a win and one for a draw" system again. Our present system has encouraged "fiddling" for the sake of winning sets at all costs, to the detriment of the game in general. Fiddling these days not only goes on in the lower divisions but also in the 1st division, which is supposed to be the "cream" of the league. It makes you wonder what is going on in the table-tennis world. They say it takes all sorts to make a world and it has proved right in this game of ours today.

In order to stop this fiddling I would like to see a system in operation were clubs register their team orders prior to the start of the season and if a team is then guilty of changing its order they would be penalised with so many points deducted from that match. It is a very sore point and will remain so until something is done about it.

During the season there are many players who do moan and grumble and if they would just send their views and ideas to the "Digest" instead of doing it on match nights, as most of them do, it would stop some of the bitterness that arises.

I have often wondered why such a big organisation as ours does not have an "End of Season" Dance. We make many friends during the season and it seems a pity we cannot get together socially once a year. With over 700 members I cannot see anything but success for such a venture. Can we have some views on this from our Management Committee and players?

Last of all I must mention the cost of TT balls. It does not seem long ago that they were only 9d. each. Now we pay 2/- for them and the way things are going it could soon be three or four shillings. It would not be so bad if they lasted sometime, but it is nothing unusual for a new 3 star ball to crack after a couple of sets and at the price we pay this is just not good enough. Most firms blame S.E.T. but you don't pay this for using the same machine over and over again. Cost of materials, yes, but not to the extent of the price we pay. I would like to see more opposition to these price increases otherwise we will end up paying more for a ball than for a net!

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What a great Season it has been so far !

Well certainly as far as I am concerned it has. All the shouting, groaning seems to be vanishing from our tournaments and they are the better for it.

I've attended two County Junior matches so far. Perhaps not the most exciting events in the world, but in both of them the sportsmanship was first class. The players played to win, played strokes all the time and gave the impression of really enjoying every minute. If this is County Junior table-tennis, then I can't see too much of it.

Around the tournaments things seem better than ever. I feared the increased prize money might bring out a spate of gamesmanship, doubtful services and the like, but so far I have seen no evidence of it. I have, however, seen some first-rate matches and if this sort of thing keeps up I forecast a return of the missing spectators. The North of England was excellently organised by Les Jones at Manchester. A pity so few of the top players were there but apparently they had checked on the prizes and found they weren't quite what they wanted. The North Middlesex Open was magnificently staged at Alexandra Palace and this fetched out nearly all the top players. When organisation in table-tennis is mentioned the name of Harry Spraggs springs quickly to the mind of many people. He and Mike Watts masterminded the Southend Open which had a strongish entry reinforced by the inclusion of the Hungarian team. They won nearly all the prizes. The trouble with this tournament was there was virtually no room for spectators. Players not actually required at that moment often enjoy watching other games but this was very difficult at the 'Southend.' The organisers even went to the extent of booking people requiring overnight accommodation in a very reasonable hotel and the meals at the venue (and the hotel) were first rate. I understand a new venue will probably be used next season.

The yellow ball! Well, I've played with them and as far as I am concerned it's going to be quite an improvement. Play with them when you get the chance—then make your comments, good or otherwise. Maybe you could let the editor know. I'm sure he would like to print YOUR observations (and not only 1st division players either). Who knows it might put a couple of points on

your game. An International match I saw recently featured England and Hungary. The best set of the evening. by popular consent, was that between Denis Neale and Janos Borzei. Denis had told me earlier how tiring the tour of Japan had been. He certainly showed no signs of tiredness in this match. All his enthusiasm and fire were there and the crowd rose to the two players. Perhaps a top class game between a hitter and a defender is all too rare these days. Denis won but it was a close thing. Trevor Taylor had earlier lost in two straight to Borzei and one or two people have since said since that the Hertfordshire left-hander hardly ever looked like winning. But to be fair-how often has Taylor had the chance to play against a defender of such class? In any case Taylor redeemed (if that is the right word) himself when he beat the Hungarian No. 1, Tibor Klampar, in straight games after 20-13 behind in the first. The match was at Loughborough by the way."

Yes, it's been a great season so far. As far as I'm concerned anyway.

Having been assured that Wally Allanson's departure to the North East was not the result of the column he wrote for the last 'Digest,' I have been persuaded to comment on the division as I see it. What I find disturbing at the moment is the present trend whereby the better players tend to be concentrated in a few clubs. Half the teams in this division come from three clubs and it is these clubs that seem to attract all the new 'talent' coming to the district. All credit to them, particularly W'tree Labour, for developing the potential of their existing members but surely the division would be more competitive if some of the middle of the table teams could attract some of the new good players. At the moment there are too few upsets of the kind caused when Mossley Hill beat the Y.M., weakened by the absence of Brian Parkinson, by six games to four. This seems to have been a real team effort with every member winning a game although the credit for the win must go to Alan Land for winning both his matches 21-19 and 21-18 in the third. Perhaps this will compensate Engl. Electric for losing three sets to Harry Johnston and Nick Gourley of Y.M. 'A.'

At the other end of the table the race is on to see who will avoid joining Cadwa in the 2nd division

next season. Bath St. have had a very poor first half and on current form look most likely to be relegated, although in Messrs. Taylor and Clayton they have two players who could very well lift them clear of the danger zone. Waterloo Park started off with matches against the top teams but recently have been accumulating points, including a very good six against Colonsay. English Elec. 'A' on the other hand started off well but seem to have found the competition much tougher of late. W'tree Lab. 'B' are not entirely out of the danger zone and Beauclair will no doubt miss Wally Allanson in the second half of the season. Perhaps English Electric will lend us one of their 1st team 'reserves' for the New Year.

To close may I wish all those team captains who intend a "tactical arrangement" against W'tree Lab. 'A' the best of luck as I understand they are now picking their team order out of a hat. Most unsporting!

With the season coming to the end of the first half the position is much clearer throughout the division. On top are Linnets, well ahead of their rivals and I can't see anybody catching them up. For myself, I think it is a great pity that a club like Linnets should rely on players from another town, for the past has shown that clubs relying on so many out-of-town players leave themselves very open should these players decide to stop coming so far from home just to play tabletennis every week. I only hope this doesn't happen to Linnets in the future.

The battle for 2nd place has narrowed to three teams, Knotty Ash Trinity and Colonsay 'A'. The Colonsay club have re-ranked their players of late and now only Harry Nelson and Ron Evans are left from the team which started the season. Les French has come down from the 1st team and up from the 'B' team come D. Williams and J. O'Sullivan. I was a little surprised at their dropping Johnson in favour of O'Sullivan for Johnson has much the better record, although to be fair to John he has played higher in the Still, in general, the team does have a stronger look abo t it and I can see a real challenge from them in the second half.

One team determined to get away from the bottom is Trinity 'A', they

have a different order, and usually different players, each week, but credit must be given to them for beating Police 6-4, no mean feat this even though the Police were without Don Gauld. In addition they have received a 10-0 w/o from the University so they must feel they have a great chance of pulling clear.
