Dear Ed.,

Congratulations on the Coming-of-Age—in fact, I thought the Digest had been going even longer than that. There must have been occasions when you and former Editors wondered whether the League members really deserved such a good information service!

Many of the items of interest, controversy and even annoyance haven't changed much over the years, but judging from the Ladies' Notes (a loss of 5 teams or 50 per cent of the strength in one year?) the Women's game appears to have gone back perhaps both in quality and quantity over the last 30 years.

About two weeks ago, my sister, who lives in Heswall sent me the enclosed cutting, which must be from the Liverpool Daily Post and the date about 1934/5. You will see that Liverpool Ladies in those North of England Championships held at Manchester Y.M.C.A. played a very prominent part—and were very successful against International Competition. Both Norah Norrish and Joyce Bartholomew were of course Internationals themselves!

If my memory serves me right, both these ladies and many others, served their apprenticeships playing against men (and a few women of course) in Men's or Mixed Leagues. It can only have been later that Women's Divisions were formed, but you will notice from the Press cutting that at least one all-Women's team Bootle Ladies' played in Division 3 and drew 11-11 with Fairfield "A". The scores listed suggest that teams at that time consisted of 5 players each of whom played 2 games best of three; in other words, if you won every game you won by 20-0. Even earlier than that, teams of 5 (mostly men!) played each other one single game, i.e. a total of 25 games. Perhaps Mr. Editor, you could persuade someone to do a bit of research and write an article about all the various systems of play which have been used during the lifetime of the Liverpool and District T.T. League. I'm sure it would be interesting to many of your readers.

Dear Sir.

Upon wondering how the "Digest" is celebrating its 21st year when I had No. 1 of Volume 25 in my hand (which of course is late as anticipated). I went back through the previous issues to find out when the error had occurred, and it turns out that Volume 20 has been elevated to 23 on the front cover, but the editorial page still shows the correct No.—viz. 20.

Last season someone must have decided to make a proper job of the lot—and what a job was made of last year's editions—and both cover and editorial page bore No. 24.

Incidentally, I was most annoyed to find that my copy of issue No. 1, Volume 1 (in fact, the very first Digest ever printed) is missing, and if any reader has a copy to spare I shall be most pleased to accept it.

With regard to the Secretary's Notes, wherein he states that this Digest has cost 100% more than those printed three years ago, surely the time has come to consider whether or not the expense to keep the thing going is justified, particularly when one takes into account the trouble experienced last year editorially, and now again this year, when we received our copies at the beginning of January—to find that the League tables cover five matches only.

Perhaps we should now concentrate on producing one or, at the most, two issues per season (not both at the end), and a duplicated sheet of league tables to each club at, say, six week intervals, or drop it altogether and just issue the league tables.

The views of other players would be interesting to hear, in view of the number of adverse comments which have been passing to and fro this season.

Dear Sir,

It appears from our early experiences this season that some clubs are ignoring Match Regulation 15 which states that the official starting time for matches shall be 7-30 p.m. and players absent after 8 p.m., when called upon to play shall forfeit such event. In these days when nearly everybody finishes work earlier than in previous years you would think that matches would have no difficulty in starting promptly but alas, this is not so; and up to now we have found the main culprit to be the home teams. My club, Linacre, arrived at one away match to find our opponents club locked and in complete darkness at 7-30 p.m. Eventually one player arrived, opened up and then we had to give him a hand to put the table up. The others arrived after 8 p.m., the match started about 8-10 and finished about 11-35 p.m. which meant that we were getting home about 12-15 a.m. At another away match it was much the same story although the place was open. There was only one opponent there and we gave him a hand to fix the lights before starting late again. I don't know whether other divisions have experienced this but it's very unsatisfactory. For one thing it limits the away captains choice of matches for if there is only one opponent there you can only call on him to play. Could I please appeal to all clubs in the second division, and indeed throughout the league, to make an effort to start all matches on time. We do not wish to start claiming any games of absentees but please be warned. Our patience is wearing thin!!

With the season now at the half-way stage, a definite picture has now emerged with Wavertree Labour, English Electric, Liverpool Y.M.C.A. and Colonsay as the only teams capable of winning the title.

Things are beginning to hot up at the top, the climax of which being the English Electric v. Wavertree Labour game which ended with the honours shared at 5-5. This was a good result for Wavertree as the English Electric team included Tony Clayton. The hero of the night was Wavertree's Dave Roberts who won his two singles against D'Arcy and Youd. Allanson and Clayton won Electrics five sets.

The Y.M.C.A. have strengthened their team with the acquisition of Frank Bailey after a spell out of the City. On his present form he could pose problems for the other top teams.

With six games in hand on the leaders Colonsay will have a say when the final positions are sorted out. I don't think they will win the league due to their early season defeats by English Electric 'A' and Way. Labour 'C'.

The middle of the table has sorted itself out with Wav. Labour 'A', Rafters, English Electric 'A', Bath St. and Wav. Labour 'B' changing positions week by week as their results come in.

Mossley Hill have cleared the bottom of the table with some good results, beating Wav. Labour 'A' and Wav. Labour 'B' and taking three sets off English Electric.

The relegation issue is almost settled with Linnets and Trinity taking the bottom rungs on the ladder, with Wav. Labour 'C' also in a relatively uncomfortable position.

In the Readman Cup an interesting situation has occurred with English Electric and Wavertree Labour having two representatives in the semi-finals. The draw for the semi-finals has not yet been made but I hope the top teams are kept apart until the final.

The position at the top is now a little clearer and promotion should be decided from amongst 4 teams. the moment the Y.M. 'B' have a slight lead over Crawfords and Colonsay 'A' with the Police in close attendance. Both the Y.M. 'B' and Colonsay 'A' have yet to play Crawfords, due to the first half matches being postponed, and the results of these matches could have a great effect on the final position. The Y.M. 'B' did themselves a great deal of good when they beat Colonsay 'A' 8-2 recently and if they keep up that sort of form they must have a good chance of finishing in first position.

Waterloo Park are up with the leaders but they have played a few matches more. I feel that they have lost their chance of promotion due to inconsistency, 7-3 defeats by St. Edward's and the Police, and 8-2 by Crawfords don't help your chances much. They do, however, hold the distinction of being the only team to beat the Y.M. 'B' which they did 6-4.

The main reasons for this win were a double for A. Delamere in the Singles and winning both sets of Doubles. They play the same Doubles pairings every week and this is reflected in their results which are amongst the best in the division.

Linacre and Wavertree Labour 'D' had a close match with victory to Linacre 6-4. A good win here for S. Fewtrell over Harry Reeve 22-20 in the third, although well beaten 21-16, 21-7 by Frank Laccy in his other set. R. Bulmer had a good night for the Labour Club beating Jack Davidson 21-15, 21-18 and Ken Ainsworth 21-14, 21-14.

It looks as though Beauclair will have the doubtful privilege of dropping from the first division to the third in successive seasons. They change their team each week with only Ted Birch playing and winning with any regularity. English Electric 'B' are due for the drop after only one season in this division. They must be a little disappointed as they were jointwinners of Division 3A last season with Wavertree Labour 'D' who occupy another of the relegation places. The other place goes to Sparta who have left themselves too many sets to catch up. It is interesting to note that both teams that came up from 3A are due to go down again whereas the two from 3B are in comfortable positions. Does this mean that gB is now a stronger division than 3A?

In the cup we are down to the last four. They are Colonsay 'A', Crawfords, Linacre, and Sefton. Colonsay 'A' got through after two drawn games with the Y.M. 'B', their winning total was 27 sets to 24. Linacre beat Beauclair 6-4 with double wins for Ted Birch of Beauclair and Ken Ainsworth of Linacre. Crawfords beat Waterloo Park 6-4 with Alan Reid winning two for Waterloo, and Mike Truman and Ernie Owens getting doubles for Sefton Beat Wavertree Crawfords. Labour 'D' 7-3 with Don Davies of Sefton and R. Bulmer of the Labour Club also getting double victories. On paper either Colonsay 'A' or Crawfords should be the eventual winners but league form counts for nothing in the cup and both Sefton and Linacre have a good chance of pulling it off.

Finally commiserations to Ken Jones of Wavertree Labour 'D' who was

beaten by Bill Crofter of Sefton 21-19, 20-22, 29-27.

In my last notes I suggested Colonsay or one of the Police teams would be next to suffer a 10-0 defeat. I am happy to say that Colonsay have proved me wrong. The distinction fell to Police 'C' and University on the same night. The victors being Bath St. 'A' and Trinity respectively. I am sorry to relate that University have failed to obtain a set on two subsequent occasions. Relegation for University seems inevitable. With Vagabonds strengthened by the return of Colin Crossley the candidates for relegation are Colonsay and Bath St. 'C'. It is interesting to note that both teams only obtained promotion to the third Division this season. Does this indicate a shortage of players of third Division standard? Indeed on looking through the score cards I notice that the reserves introduced have met with little success. At least a reserve ensures a game for the opponents.

I have noticed that a number of teams have played short this season. Although this gives the opposition three sets on a plate it is something we all do not want to see increase. Perhaps a deterrent would be heavier fines, plus the possible forfeiture of guarantee (Rule 14) and a suitable extension to Rule 20. Suspension of the offending player who is not able to offer a suitable explanation for his non-appearance. The result a possible increase in the League's income or more effort by players and club officials to ensure their teams do not play short.

I think I am right in saying that the

only ladies playing in this Division are at Rafters, Colonsay and University. Rafters ladies plus the consistent Brian Jennings are quite capable of taking sets off the top teams. I do not think Trinity will whitewash them in the return fixture. The younger ladies of Colonsay seem to be finding their task harder but nevertheless from time to time have produced some good individual results. Miss Baxendale having defeated A. Chase of Trinity and A. Robinson of Police 'A' in straight sets.

C. Roberts of Cadwa had good wins over B. Cullen and J. Donnelly of the Y.M.C.A. which earned Cadwa 'A' two valuable points. Both Police teams appear to have difficulties with players in addition to their normal "duty" problems. Whilst their "A" team hold a good position the "C" team are hovering in the relegation area and will have to find an early solution to their problems. Linnets would seem to be another team with problems and are in the same category as Police 'C'

There have not been many surprise results but Maghull did draw with Trinity which was a very good effort. The next best was the defeat of Police 'A' by Bath St. 'C' 7-3. There is still time for shock results and perhaps the inconsistent Liverpool Jewish plus Vagabonds and Rafters will provide them.

No team undefeated and the championship and relegation issues are wide open,

We are now well into the second half of the season, and with six clubs jockeying for the top two places we have the exciting prospect of a very close, tense finish.

Colonsay (my nap selection) are in sixth position, and after studying a rather mixed up league table, I have drawn two conclusions. That (a) they have not played a match for nearly two months or (b) someone has forgotten were the postbox is!—No doubt Eddie Cameron will believe the latter.

Rafters have now settled down into their most consistent form for a few years and are at present averaging seven points a match, which will give them a total of between 182-190 pts. A total that should be enough to finish in second place ahead of Old Swan, who I'm afraid will have to learn to accept defeat a bit more readily if they are to progress in the table tennis world.

Cadwa are still in with an outside chance as too are the Police and Orrell. I don't know how Orrell managed to move up the table so quickly, but they must have had some pretty good results. I have no score cards in my possession so I cannot give any further details.

Knotty Ash now look certain to be relegated. It will need something not far short of a miracle to save them, but to be fair I think they have been playing under-strength for most of the season. Who goes down with them?? It looks like English Electric, but they never go down (so I keep telling myself) and besides they are too good a side. Wally Sill, Ron Craddock, Ken Black and "Albi" Parker—surely that's no relegation side. Come on Electric, pull your socks up—we cannot afford to lose another club with a bar!!!

Trinity and Waterloo Park have had a spate of good results and are almost clear, but what has happened to Liverpool Jewish. They have really slumped, and at the time of writing are only eleven points ahead of English Electric. Sparta have also improved, thanks to some steady play by Leeming and Holmes and are in no danger of relegation.

I found it very interesting reading Keith Fitzsimmons' notes for Division Two in the last issue, especially the point he raised about Cup matches being decided on the counting-up of sets.

I wrote about this in Jan, 1970 issue, but unfortunately there was not the response I had hoped for. You may remember the case—Bath St. v Hilltop. First match 5-5, return match 5-5, count-up of sets 25-25, then the mammoth count-up of points which went in Bath's Street's favour by a mere seven points. Ever since then I've regarded the Cup rules as something of a farce, and its not been sour grapes either. Surely we can have another match, and then maybe count up sets, but not points, or even play on until there is a winner as Keith suggests. Anyhow it's up to you, I'm sure our editor would be very pleased to have some correspondence from you, or your club, on this subject.

May I finally, on behalf of Division 3B offer our condolences to the family and friends of Les Singleton, whose sudden death was a terrible shock to all who knew him.

Why is the magazine always so late and out of date? Can the editorial board give a simple answer? While I have visited 4A quite often this season I am not truly a local—so if a local lad wishes to take over—fair enough.

Some terrific games at the top and bottom this period, Liverpool Jewish and Knotty Ash drew 5-5 in the wooden spoon battle with Hall U. beating Cohen M. 25-23; 23-21 and Rotherham beating Anna Cohen 22-20 in the third, Taylor of Jewish was the only double winner.

In the Crawfords derby game Carney and Wilson were double winners but seven games went to three in the 'B' teams 6-4 win.

A rather hefty reserve whom I had seen playing and winning in Division 1 swung the game in Y.M.C.A's. favour over Crawfords 'B'. Cummings won 2 and his doubles in the Y.M's 7-3 win. Polytechnic continued their much improved form with a 5-5 draw against Liverpool Y.M. (Jones R. 2). Jarzecki won two for Polytechnic and with Gilbert lost 22-24 in the third against Wishart and Jones.

English Electric 'D' are another team showing good form taking 3 points at Y.M. and seven at Rafters, Crally and Johnson getting two apiece,

While big scores are still in fashion there are many really tight and exciting results. Maghull seem to be at the centre of many of them losing 6-4 at Rafters (Davey 2), and draws with English Electric 'F' (Sill A. and Callaghan 2) and Bath St. (Clark and Brookfield 2). Jones A. improves each week for Maghull a close knit team who never give in easily.

Police are suffering from the improved standard of the divisions, Cadwa are finding things tougher than Division 5 a 7-3 win over Electric 'F' kept them in good heart, M. Power and Biggs gaining doubles.

Aviss was a lone winner against Crawfords 'B'. Andy Byrne is another casualty and is in hospital—get well soon Andy. Crawfords 'D' beat rivals Polytechnic 7-3 yet scraped a 6-4 against Electric 'F'. Hall (Knottv Ash) beat Clark (Bath St.) 21-19; 17-21; 25-23. Colonsay are OUT: Jones (Maghull) beat Georgison (Bath St.) 21-19; 21-23; 22-20.

I never cease to be amazed at the lengths clubs go to just to prove me wrong. First Crawfords lose several matches and spoil their title chances and then Old Swan move Colin Hall up to the 1st team when he only needed two more matches to qualify for the averages. I should confine my predictions to the Labour club as I can at least exercise some control over them.

The pre-Christmas clash of the top four runners helped clear the air a little at the top and at the moment the Labour club have a clear lead. Giro could alter this when they play off their matches in hand but I have just been informed by John Nelson (Giro) that they may find it difficult to maintain their challenge as due to night school commitments Theo Mills will not always be available. It will be unfortunate for everyone if this is the case for a really interesting struggle lies ahead of the top four clubs.

Old Swan were first to slip when in successive matches they lost to Crawford's 'C' 7-3 and Wav. Labour 'E' 8-2. They have lost Colin Hall to the 1st team and his replacement, Steve France, does not appear to be regularly available and this will not help them. Crawfords were next to lose their grip when they lost to Wav. Labour 7-3 and Giro 6-4. If you all give this project your full support it could be possible to raise the grand amount of £250 or even more. In that case you never know but it may be possible to reduce the fees.
