Editorial

The sudden resignation of the editor due to business commitments has flung me back into the hot seat and although this places us in a very awkward position I am hopeful that this issue will reach you before the season ends.

One of the most disturbing trends of recent seasons has been that of clubs getting out of town players to register for them with the obvious intention of winning awards. I find this extremely alarming for many reasons, not the least of which is that it must surely have a detrimental effect on younger players trying to break through

In its early years this was a strong thriving league and our players could hold their own with the best and commanded respect wherever they played. This was achieved by seeking out and giving help and encouragement to promising players. It is true that the standard in our 1st Division is not as good as it should be for a league as large as ours, but are imported stars the answer? I think not. I don't think they do anything for our league and they must do even less for club spirit. By pandying to these players we are in danger of making our league a branch line instead of remaining a major league.

The after effects of what can happen have been painfully obvious the last few years: On one occasion a player played his first ever game in this league in a cup final. In the replay he failed to arrive. A change of rules was necessary to prevent this occuring again. Another club brought in a complete team and were promoted to the 1st Division and won a place in the Readman Final. This season they failed to appear and the club were in the position of having a 1st Division place with no recognised 1st Division players. Again this season more big names have appeared with the avowed intention of sweeping the board and again a farce is made of the league.

Results of this invasion, strong teams turn out in major matches and when the players are unavailable or a weak team is being played a different team turns out. One relegation candidate was made a present of nine points. Another result was the deliberate "fiddling" by a club playing against them in a lower division because they were convinced that their opponents were also "fiddling". Although the club had acted quite fairly. Nevertheless, what happened was a direct result of the importation of players.

Do we really want players who play in our league providing they have nothing more important to do? Do we want to become a league where players come along to win a trophy and then disappear after spoiling things for everyone else?

I do not think our players have gained anything from this nor do I think they will in the fluture. Ambition will be stifled as young players find themselves pushed to one side in the race to win success at all costs, even if club spirit has to be sacrificed to do so.

Why bother coaching or bringing in promising youngsters when it is easier to bring in outside players. Would John Marshall, for example, have made such progress if his club had followed this pattern? Surely not.

This is no reflection on the out of town players who have played regularly for the same club and treat our league as their own and are accepted as being regular league members.

Let's get back to being the Liverpool and District League and get on with the job of improving the standard of our young players and give them every encouragement and let these, so called, "stars" shine elsewhere.

In conclusion let me say that these views are my own and have nothing whatsoever to do with any views which may be held by my own or any other club.

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Letters to the Editor

Dear Sir.

It was interesting to read the comments in the last two issues regarding the rule about counting points if teams are level on sets and games at the end of two cup-ties.

Having had great experience of borrowing rooms and tables for inter-city matches, I feel that I must point out the difficulties involved in going to a 3rd match. I find that club secretaries are most obliging when asked to make arrangements for special matches. They postpone league matches (often to an accompaniment of grouses from their own players), they provide refreshments (quite often free), and at the end of the evening's play, they brush the room, wash the dishes, etc., etc.

In the event of a drawn semi-final, the league official in charge is instructed to try and arrange the replay at the same venue, the following week. This, of course, imposes more hardship on the club secretary, and I suggest that to ask him to provide facilities for a third meeting is like going to the well too often.

The answer appears to be a 'sudden death' semi-final. This could be done in many ways, for cup competitions we could reduce the number of players to 3-a-side, each player playing 3 sets and exclude the doubles. An alternative way would be to play four-a-side as at present and exclude the doubles unless the scores were level at the end, when time would be available to play one deciding doubles.

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On meeting the World Champion .

One of the great joys I get out of my annual visit to assist at the English Open at Brighton is meeting so many players. This year Sweden were amongst the contestants and in their team was the World's Men's Singles Champion, Stellan Bengtsson. This was not the first time I had met Bengtsson—I was at Middlesbrough for the European Youth Championships in 1970 when the Swedish left-hander dominated the scene. Before then I had always been impressed with his modesty—surely being World Champion must have changed him.

On the face of it one would think—what does a World Champion look like? Well—this one I am quite sure would never seek the limelight. At a guess I would say about 5ft, 8ins., long blondish hair and a look of urgency about him. As if he wants to get somewhere quick. With a sort of shortie mohair coat he arrived carrying five bags, two in each hand and one hanging round his neck. He had been, with the rest of the party, to the West German Open.

At the tournament itself Bengtsson is no trouble. He complains about nothing. The table. The balls. Everything is the same to him. He looks happy to be there. There are plenty of people wanting the World Champion's autograph. He never refuses. I was able to interview him for the 'Table Tennis News' and if George Yates doesn't put it—the interview—in there then it will certainly be available for publication in here.

Interviewing Stellan Bengtsson was the easiest thing in the world for he speaks almost perfect English. In the interview he not only showed what a fine grasp of the English language he has—he also showed he has a phenomenal memory where table tennis is concerned. As we walked back through Brighton's rather crowded streets I thought that here he was able to walk, unrecognised—something which would surely not have been possible in his home town of Falkenburg.

At dinner that night I was sitting with Jill Hammersley. Stellan was on the next table and a young family were also having their meal there. They had three young children aged about 3, 6 and 9. The youngest of the three was gurgling contentedly at all she could see and [ill was laughing and joking with the child. Bengtsson—who loves children—was asking the child its name. The mother of the family was saying "They are table tennis players". Since there was nothing on their track-suits to signify they were I assumed the parents must at least know something of the game and they did. They did not, however, know that the young man who was so successfully making conversation with their young daughter was World Champion until I pointed it out. They were quite obviously taken back that they were in the company of so famous a personality. By this time Bengtsson was preparing to leave for the Dome and the mother remarked "my daughter would love to get Bengtsson's autograph—do you think he would sign?" I replied that nothing in the world was more certain and I asked Stellan if he would mind waiting a few moments whilst the girl fetched her book."Yes, of course I'll wait" he replied. Unfortunately the operation of finding the autograph book proved rather more lengthy than had been anticipated but at no time did Bengtsson show any sign of impatience. The book at last being located Bengtsson went to the trouble of asking the girl her name so that he could do the thing in style. It may not have been much but it certainly showed something of the character of the man.

Last word on Bengtsson from A. K. Vint (better known as 'Bill')—''Such modesty these days is very acceptable and he has shown the mantle of World Champion rests lightly on his shoulders. For his age he is a remarkably mature young man''. They are sentiments I echo to the core.

English Electric will win the league and cup, or there again Wavertree Labour may win both. The position is still so vague that we will most probably have to wait until the final match of the season to find out who. Fortunately the league has seen fit to make their final match versus each other, and as their last meeting resulted in a draw, even this might not settle the final league placings. In the cup semi-finals they both easily disposed of their opponents Elec. 'A' and Wav. Lab, 'B' 8-2 and 10-0. The final itself promises to be an extremely 'tight' affair as games between these two teams often have been in the past.

The Y.M.C.A. have dropped out of the reckoning for the title, as have Colonsay, although Colonsay's demise seems to have been due to some of their 'imported' players not playing regularly, as their 9-1 defeat by Linnets proves. On the other hand the Y.M.'s downfall appears to have been the crushing defeats by Colonsay (9-1) Eng. Elec. (8-2) and Wav. Labour (7-3). These have almost certainly made their chances of winning the title slight to say the least.

The middle order teams, Rafters, Wav. Lab. 'A'; Bath St. and Eng. Elec. 'A' are all having good seasons. The Rafters team, with John Marshall having an exceptional season with defeats being a very rare feature of his game, are playing very well and

John is getting good support from D. Ferguson, R. Rumjahn and P. Short.

One of the best results of this year was Y.M.C.A. 'A's 6-4 loss to Wavertree. Taking four sets off the title contenders is no mean feat especially as the Y.M. 'A' team included a reserve. This fixture seems to give Wavertree great cause for concern, as last season they lost 6-4 to the Y.M. 'A' team, thus losing all hope of winning the title. I hope this setback is not an omen for the following weeks.

Bath St. v. Rafters proved to be an interesting and enjoyable match, ending in a draw. In this match Arthur Taylor proved that he is still a force to be reckoned with by beating John Marshall 21/19; 12/21; 21/18. Dave Ferguson won his two singles and his doubles for Rafters.

Eng. Electric 'A' have had some good results of late, defeating Trinity (9-1) and Mossley Hill (8-2) as well as reaching the cup semi-finals. Their team of Pheysey, Hodges, McPherson and Nevins are all winning their fair share of sets and they should finish well clear of the struggling teams in 7th or 8th place.

As I said in the previous issue the relegation issue is almost settled, but not quite as I suggested. Wav. Labour 'C' are doomed for the drop to division two and I fear Trinity will accompany them, Linnets on the other hand have had some great results, Colonsay (9-1), Wav. Lab. 'C' (9-1 & 6-4), drawing with Wav. Labour 'B' and losing 6-4 to Y.M. 'A' and Eng. Elec. 'A'; not bad for players who last season were playing in the 3rd division. The man who has helped their cause most is Ray Lavin, he has had some great wins this season with Mandaluff and Youd amongst his many victims.

Another player with some good wins this season is Sammy Holland of Mossley Hill, His best to-date was a two-straight defeat of Eng. Electric's Gordon Birch, thus removing his 100%. Electric won the match 8-2, but the result must be Sammy's personal glory for the season.

The promotion race has narrowed down to three teams with the Police appearing to have given up the chase. Colonsay 'A' have pulled up a few sets thanks to some big wins, and the regular inclusion of Ian Johns will make a difference to their chances. Crawfords are the most consistent of the three teams, but have yet to play Colonsay 'A' in a league fixture, although they did beat them 6-4 in the cup semi-final. In addition they also beat the Y.M. 'B' 6-4; so they must feel they have a good chance. The Y.M. 'B' suffered a big set back when they were beaten 8-2 by St. Edwards. I have no details of what happened or of what sort of team they turned out, but they cannot afford to have any more results like that one. They are still top of the division but with the pressure really on from the other two they will be hard put to stay there. They are due to play Colonsay 'A' in the last week of the season so it is possible that the promotion issue may not be settled until then.

Beauclair gained their revenge on Linacre for the cup defeat when they beat them 6-4. The reason for their improved form is not hard to see for they appear to have found something approaching a settled team at last. It is no longer Ted Birch versus the rest, K. Harrison has started to play regularly and so has D. Berry and joining them is Frank Murphy whom I remember playing against some years ago when I first started playing. They are making a great bid to avoid relegation and it will be interesting to see how close they come or if they do, in fact, succeed. In the Linacre match D. Berry and F. Murphy were the main set winners, each winning

two, with Berry having a particularly good win over Frank Lacey.

Wav. Labour 'ID' are another team making a determined effort to avoid the drop and 5-5 draws with Colonsay 'B' and Crawfords and only losing 6-4 to the Y.M. 'B' must give them the feeling they have a good chance of making it. The regular team is K. Jones, R. Bulmer, S. Fewtrell and J. Hoban, and these four are swopped around in the order each week in order to gain the maximum number of sets.

If the Labour club do avoid relegation it will almost certainly be at the expense of Crawfords 'A' who started the season so well. They have lost two of their players and another, Geoff Wilson, is at University and so his season will finish early. This means playing three players from lower teams each week and I feel sorry for Bob Rohrer, the only member left, as he has no idea who will be playing in the team with him as the reserves are usually different each week.

Eng. Elec. 'B' and Sparta have no chance of avoiding the drop. Both have played short on at least two occasions and Sparta did not turn up at all for the match at Beauclair.

At the time of writing Sparta have not yet sent in a single score-card. This makes keeping records very difficult. When Crawfords played them at Sparta, Les Evans, the Crawfords captain, sent a card in himself just to make sure the Fixture Sec. received one. As far as Sparta are concerned this just isn't good enough and it is time members of the team sorted something out. Let's face it. Eddie Cameron's job is hard enough without this sort of thing happening.

The cup semi-finals were won by Sefton who beat Linacre Crawfords who beat Colonsay 'A' 6-4, This last was a tremendous match in which 7 of the 10 sets went to three and the result was in doubt until the last set. This was a nerve tingling affair between Mike Truman and Dave Williams, with Mike eventually hitting Dave off in the third game, much to the delight and relief of the Crawford's team. Now to the final in which Crawfords beat Sefton 8-2. Apart from the early stages the result was never in doubt. Sefton had trouble in turning a team out, Bill Crafter was in London and could not play, Don

Davies had to come from York, arriving at 8 p.m. with a train to catch back at 11 p.m. These sort of upsets don't help your chances much, and apart from Duncan Sayle who played better than I have ever seen him play, the Sefton players did not play as well as their league position would suggest. For Crawfords Mike Truman won two, Ernie Owens two, Les Evans one and myself two. The doubles were shared and Sayle won Sefton's other set by beating Evans in one of the best games of the evening, At the end of the match the cup was presented by Ronnie Rumjahn.

Commiserations this issue for the first time goes to a doubles pair, Birch and Murphy (Beauclair). They were beaten 22/20; 21/23; 21/19 by Reeve and Lacey of Linacre.

I wrote in my last notes that I did not think Trinity would repeat their 10-0 victory over Rafters. I did not expect Rafters to reverse the result but they did and it must be considered their best victory of the season.

I think it would be of interest to record the details, Rafters first: B. Jennings lost to A. Chase 16/21; 17/21; beat A. Southall 16/21; 23/21; 21/17; J. Reynolds beat A. Chase 21/18; 21/14; and L. Carmichael 21/19; 21/13. P. Lawrenson lost to A. Southall 21/14; 17/21; 19/21; and D. Newton 14 and 12; J. MacKenzie beat Carmichael 21/15; 19/21; 21/16; and Newton 25/23; 21/8.

In the two weeks prior to Rafters success over Trinity both of these clubs played Bath St. 'C'. Rafters

were defeated 6-4 whilst Trinity won 10-0. On the strength of these two results who would have predicted a Rafters victory,

Equalling the performance of Rafters was Cadwa's draw at the Y.M.C.A. Cadwa have to thank J. Henshaw (2), T. Hughes and I. Fletcher for this excellent effort. A less surprising result was the defeat of Trinity by the Y.M. 'C'. What was surprising was the score of 9-1. C. Cummings, R. Jones and J. Donnelly two each. A. Southall obtained the solitary set for Trinity defeating B. Cullen in the 3rd 21/19. Nearly a whitewash for Trinity and a set-back for their championship hopes.

Bath St. 'A' continue to make the running for the championship. With the experience of A. Gould, A. Walton and C. Smith, plus the improving Eric Hardman they are difficult to beat. They are winning consistently and will be hard to dislodge from their top position. Trinity took a four set lead in their match against Bath St. 'A' but eventually lost 6-4. The championship may hinge on the final match of the season between Liv. Y.M. and Trinity.

Another experienced and sporting team, Police 'A', continue to hold a good position in the league. Unfortunately Police 'C' are struggling to keep away from the relegation zone. However, their cause is being helped by Colonsay who on at least two occasions have played short. At this stage it looks as if Colonsay will join University in the 4th div. next season. No doubt this has been one of University's poorer seasons with only K Lightfoot capable of winning regularly. Part of their difficulties seem to be administrative. They do not seem to have anyone holding the reins from one season to another. I am sure the league secretary would be delighted if University advised him at the end of this season who will be their secretary next season. Surely a member of the current team can be prevailed upon to be secretary next season. From thereon it is only a question of handing down season to season.

Maghull have introduced A. Jones into their side and as yet he is undefeated. Liv. Jewish having taken four sets off the Y.M. early in February could only manage three

against Linnets two weeks later. Linnets, however, have been showing signs of improvement. Vagabonds have shown the most improvement and are now well clear of the relegation threat which was very real earlier in the season.

As these will be the last notes before the end of the season I will predict that Bath St. 'A' will win the championship and that Colonsay and University will be relegated.

On reading the notes for div. 3B I observe that Rob Lock was recalling a Hyde Cup match between Hilltop and Bath St. which Bath St. eventually won by seven points in the replay. Both he and I played in both matches and I think he would agree that the replay was one of the most tense in which either of us has played. The sides were so evenly matched that I doubt if a second replay would have resolved it and I am therefore not altogether in agreement with his view. I would certainly think the details would make the Guinness Book of Records.

Bath St. 'A' have drawn with O'S Swan in the final of the Hyde Cup and the result of the replay I would not like to forecast.

Due to power cuts, lost score cards, postponements, etc., I now have in front of me one of the most fascinating and interesting league tables I have seen for quite some time. Rafters are well clear, but Colonsay 'C' and Old Swan have plenty of games in hand. Police and Cadwa are waiting for any slip-ups that may occur. Liverpool Jewish and Knotty

Ash's records both include 10 points from claimed matches, which have to be deleted, as I hope these matches will be replayed in true, sportsmanlike 3B manner—and so relegation is wide open.

In the big "Crunch" match Rafters defeated Colonsay 6-4. Pete Rumjahn had no difficulty in beating Brenda Williams and Barbara Kirkman, but found it rather tougher against the two girls in the doubles. Playing with Reg Hetherington they scraped home 19/21; 21/19; 25/23. Other victors for Rafters were Reg Hetherington, Eileen Mansell and Jack McCaig (making a welcome return!!) all one apiece, and for Colonsay—Kirk-man, Williams, Field and Field/ Leeson were successful Incidentally, that was Colonsay's first defeat, and maybe they were suffering from the previous week's match against English Elec, which resulted in a magnificent performance by the Electric team in holding Colonsay to a 5-5 draw. The best game here probably being Ken Black's victory over Barbara Kirkman 21/19 in the third. Having mentioned Eng. Electric in the last issue of the 'Digest' as being too good a side to be relegated, surely this result proves me right!!

Old Swan seem to be yet another club out to prove my predictions wrong!! From a possible 30, they have taken 26 points and that is championship form. One result I have noticed was the 5-5 draw which Sparta held them to. Hero for Old Swan was C. Hall winning his three sets. Crispin lost to Leeming 22/20; 21/19; and also lost to Bill Holmes 22/20 in the third. Linforth lost to Leeming 21/18 in the third and to Harry Holmes 21/10 in the third, Kinnear lost to Jim Lightburn 21/14 in the third.

AT LAST! here they are, our first divisional notes of the season. Due to a little misunderstanding, along with a lack of communication, we were not represented in the first two issues of the magazine. Let me begin by giving a belated welcome to all the newcomers to our division, especially to those spending their first season in the league. It is heartening to see the enthusiasm of a lot of players has not waned, even if they have been on the receiving end of some heavy defeats. I believe the reward of this spirit is starting to be seen in some of the performances of the newcomers, and the experience they have gained is bound to prove invaluable in the future.

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Poor Conditions: - Habit or Indifference?

I was playing in a match recently which was interrupted both at 8 o'clock and 9 o'clock by a number of people clocking on and offi work, chattering nineteen to the dozen as they did so. The noise was so bad that the match had to be stopped for about ten minutes each time. The club were apologetic but said there was nothing they could do about it. This incident set me thinking about conditions in other clubs and I was surprised by the number of clubs that play in adverse conditions throughout the league.

It is easy to talk about poor conditions, the problem is to do something about them. The simplest method of improving things is to do it yourself, it is usually quicker and cheaper that way. If, for example, your club has inadequate heating and you are just about to throw out an old electric fire, why not take it to the club instead. It may not be much but at least it's something. You may have noticed that there are one or two clubs which could be described as a trifle chilly, but if only one or two players in a season took an old electric fire to their clubs the fight against players getting frostbite would be well under way.

Poor tables are in abundance throughout the league and why more clubs haven't done as Wavertree Labour and bought a new table themselves I don't know. The cost per player, per week, would depend of the size of the club, but a club with only ten players could have a new table in one season if they started at the beginning of a season and each mamber contributed 25p each week. This may seem a lot to pay EVERY WEEK but it is by far the easiest way of providing a new table. If, of course, your club has twenty players the sum to pay each week is only 12½p. The more players the cheaper it becomes. One other method is to raise the subscriptions by a set amount, but this usually takes much longer to raise the money, probably a few seasons in fact. The main problem is to get the money out of the players, one way would be for the team captain to collect the money at each match. There are, of course, other ways of raising money, such as having a jumble sale or some form of social event, and although they take a great deal of organising they are usually well worth it in the long run.

At some clubs poor lighting is a problem, although in some cases this is not the fault of the clubs themselves. I remember one incident a few seasons ago when I visited a club with poor lighting, only to find on closer inspection they were using light bulbs that were too small. On this being pointed out their faces turned various shades of red, but at least the next visitors to that club had good lighting to play under. Twice in the last few weeks I have played at clubs where one of the bulbs had broken. The first club had plenty of spares, but all much too small, although fortunately their lighting is very good and fitting a smaller bulb did not make very much difference. The second was in the Rumjahn Cup Final and here the club concerned had no spare bulbs at all and in the end had to take one from the changing room. How many clubs, I wonder, do carry spare bulbs? Not many, I'll bet. Next time you visit your club check the size of the bulbs and see if there are any spares, you never know, you might find your light bulbs are too small.

How many clubs have you been to where every so often the door opens, a head pokes round, has a quick look around the room and disappears? After this has happened two or three times it gets very annoying. There is not much a club can do, although they can try notices on the door and word of mouth. It may have some effect. If not, you could always try what is politely termed a punch up the bracket.

Do any of the problems mentioned apply to your club? If so, why not see if there is anything you can do to help make table-tennis a little more pleasant. It's difficult enough just playing the game without having to put up with poor conditions as well, so see if there is something you can do, every little helps
