# World Championships - Fund Raising

#### AN APPEAL FROM THE CHAIRMAN TO ALL MEMBERS

As you are possibly already aware from the advance publicity through other channels, the staging of the World Table Tennis Championships in 1977 has been entrusted to the English Table Tennis Association, and although on paper this may appear to be some considerable time away, the Association is duty bound, particularly in view of the tremendous financial involvement, to put plans into operation immediately in order to achieve the target which must be reached to enable this mammoth event to be successfully staged.

These plans include the organising of a National Raffle on a gigantic scale with dual benefits to both the Association and to the participating League, the latter receiving 25% of all monies received from tickets sold. It will be one of the biggest raffles ever held in the Country, with a first prize of a Morris Marina 1.8 T.C. Four Door Saloon Car, (today's value £1,300) and with numerous other worthwhile prizes including Colour Television Sets, Holidays in Majorca, Washing Machines, Radio Sets, etc., (100 prizes in all—a total of £7,500 in value).

In this latter connection, I understand that the League Treasurer, Don Cameron, has already forwarded a limited supply of books of tickets (priced at 10p per ticket, in books of 10 tickets) to Club Secretaries for sale by you, the League Members. If this is not already the case, please ensure that your Secretary obtains a supply, and/or alternatively, if your Club has exhausted the quantity already distributed, do not hesitate to approach Don Cameron for a further consignment. Remember the League benefits to the extent of 25% of all sales, and if we should reach the happy position of selling more than the quota allocated, we then benefit to the extent of 50% on all additional sales.

In addition to the financial benefits to be derived by our League from active participation in this scheme, and these in themselves are of major importance, I am naturally concerned in my capacity as National Councillor for Lancashire, and as a newly elected member of the English Table Tennis Association's Management Committee, that the status of my own League shall be enhanced by the results of its efforts associated with this project. I therefore make this urgent appeal to you one and all to making this a 100% Liverpool effort.

Dear Sir,

You will no doubt have noticed that in recent Merseyside Open Tournaments the Mixed Doubles Event has been omitted. This Event has, in the past, caused more delays and has upset more time-schedules than any other. Bringing together four players, usually scratch pairings anyway, to play a round, has extra difficulties, especially when one player or more is still involved in other events. Leaving out the Mixed, therefore, has without doubt ensured the smoother running of the Tournaments and also enabled more competitors to enter the other events.

I am seriously considering leaving out the Mixed Doubles Event from the Liverpool Closed Tournament in future as this, once again, is the event which causes more delays and frustrating hold-ups than any other, especially when we are always so short of time. At New Heys, the venue for the Closed, we are supposed to be CLEAR OF THE PREMISES at 10-30 p.m., which is why I must insist on a 6 p.m. start to fit in all the necessary games. Even so, many players have great difficulty in arriving before 6-45 p.m., which does not help to ensure prompt finishes.

I would like, however, to introduce a new singles event into our Tournament, namely a Youths' Singles Event. This would be open to Liverpool and District players under the age of 21, both male and female. Singles events produce less problems than doubles, and I believe an extra competition for our younger players would be more beneficial and would stimulate greater interest.

I would be most interested to hear your readers' opinions of my outlined suggestions. My preparations for our Liverpool Tournament begin in January/February, so it is very important that any points of view are brought to my notice as soon as possible. Otherwise I must assume that my new recommendations are acceptable to everyone and I will endeavour to implement them in the New Year,

# The Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Liverpool League was held at the Y.M.C.A. on Friday, 25th May, 1973, an unfortunate selection in two respects first of all, it was the eve of the Spring weekend an unpopular night by any standard and secondly, Bill Shankly and the lads were doing their tour of the city.

These few points may be of interest apart from those which have already received magazine comment. We have a shortage of non-playing captains for city teams and have one less team this season on that count. It is important to let Eddie Cameron know if a game is postponed. Eric Caird ex-Rafters and St. Simon and St. Jude was elected a Vice-President of the League.

Wavertree Labour proposed an amendment to Rule 20 whereby if a specific team gave away two walk-overs (as opposed to the present three by a club) that that particular team should be expelled and not the bottom team in the club as the present rule states. Bedford House tried a similar tack—just two walk-overs per club and out—instead of three. This amendment did not receive a seconder so both amendments were lost. From the vicinity of Ernie Sturgess (Bedford House) came cries of "You rotten lot", etc.

APH Linnets proposed that runners-up medals should be presented as for cup winners. This too went by the wayside on the lines that (a) we cannot afford them and (b) who wants a runners-up medal anyway.

Major items of expenditure include the Digest £220; English and Lancs. affiliation fees £117; match expenses £98; handbook £83; phone bills £104. A loss on the Liverpool Closed of £42 but a profit on the Merseyside Open of £105.

I know that secretaries are aware of these facts, but how many of the other lads and lasses are?

# Umpiring, etc. . .

The team you are playing, plays in a large canteen and the ball has rolled down to the far end. One might think that the time to give the score would be when the ball has been retrieved and the contestants ready to play the next point **NOT SO.** The score should be called as soon as you can be heard. Which means in a normal league game at the moment the point has been won or lost.

The ball is served hits the net and falls in your opponents court 'a let'—you agree? The ball is served hits the net and goes out of play **NOT** touching your opponents court. A point away to the player receiving the service—agreed?

The ball is served, hits the net and is going out of play as in the previous instance but the receiver catches it with his bat! We have the server serving off, the receiver vollying and the umpire in a hell of a mess. Until he decides to regard the receivers bat as the table (use your imagination!) and calls the correct decision 'A LET'

A player may receive advice from anyone during any authorised interval or suspension of a game.

A player may not receive advice from anyone during a game (Dad's please note) such as a pause for towelling or a change of ends in the last possible game of a match.

Before reviewing early form and match results, I am sure you would wish me to extend a hearty welcome to the newly promoted clubs—Second Division Champions, Sefton and their runners-up, Waterloo Park.

Setting the early pace for this seasons honours are last years runners-up—the Liverpool Y.M.C.A. tcam of Ted Mandaluff, George Smith, Paul Tsang and Peter Turtle. In the leadership stakes sets lost are most relevant pointers to championship form and Y.M. have started their campaign well.

Last years double winners, English Electric have not fared as successfully. Three sets dropped to Rafters (John Marshall's 24/22; 14/21; 17/21 win over Gordon Birch, a highlight here). Two sets to Sefton (thanks to a fine double by J. Doncaster over Eddie Clein 27/25, 23/25; 21/9! and Eric Youd 21/17; 14/21; 21/15) and dropping both doubles sets against The Dave Williams/Sue Colonsay. Manning 'Combo' proving too much for Clein and Allanson, who suffered a 14/21; 21/18, 21/14 defeat. In the other doubles a walkover was claimed. As all team members seemed to have participated in the rest of the matchwould anyone care to explain the circumstances in which the set was claimed (injury perhaps?)

Lying in second spot at this time is a newlook Wavertree Labour first team; John McNee and Dave Roberts of last years team being supplemented by Mick Tierney and Ronnie Burke, Trevor Owens and Alart Tolson joining Roy Smith and Ted Gilmor in a Labour 'A' team many clubs would envy.

The Labour first team have been dropping one set per match, so let's have a few more 10-nil lads and then you'll really show 'em! (My newly acquired Labour bias for once getting the better of me!!).

As last year, Trinity (lying third), have made a superb start. With a five man pool—B. Bagot. R. Brown, E. Hardman, B. Harris and M. Truman—they have achieved victories over Labour 'B' (9—1). Bath St. (7—3), English Electric 'A' (8—2) and Palmerston (7—3). No doubt they will give the top three some tough encounters before the league is decided.

Wavertree Labour 'A'. Rafters and Bath St. occupy the upper middle positions with Liverpool Y.M.C.A. 'A', Sefton, Colonsay and English Electric 'A' bringing up the rear. Of the last four named, Electric 'A' (my former team mates) are struggling a little at present, but under the astute captaincy of Fred Pheysey should soon fight their way out of trouble. Two new members of this 'A' team pool are Vic Chesham (recently returned from abroad) and Alec Sill (congratulations on your Youth Team selection Alec!).

Also, it's nice to see Ron Bretherton (even though he does talk funny) back in the swing after his recent serious illness.

Three teams who I think will be involved in the tenacious struggle to avoid the drop are Sefton, Waterloo Park and my own team Wavertree Labour 'B'. Sefton and Park have both suffered a fierce baptism in the division—Sefton losing to Y.M. First Team (10—0) and Electric First Team (8—2) in their first two matches; while poor Waterloo Park have lost to Labour First (9—1) a fine win by D. Olsen over Dave Roberts 22/24; 17/21 to save the single Y.M. First (10—0) Electric First (10—0) and Rafters (9—1).

Labour 'B' have made a shaky start to say the least—but there is enough ability in the team to stay up with the proviso that a lot of 'Gutsy' performances are forthcoming (naturally I do not exclude myself here). Here again, as with Sefton and Waterloo Park, meeting the top clubs in early fixtures has contributed to a low set yield.

Welcome to the new season, and many thanks to Ken Armson for keeping the seat warm and writing the notes last season while I was away. Mind you, his notes weren't much good but he did his best.

The usual start is to work out the candidates for promotion. I can only see five — Trinity 'A', Crawfords Rafters 'A', Bath Street 'A' and Beauclair. Already this season Trinity 'A' have beaten Rafters 'A' 8-2 and drawn with Crawfords. The Rafters result was a very good one for Trinity with double wins for Alan Chasem, Alf Southall and John Higham. Crawfords have won all their matches so far. apart from the draw with Trinity 'A', and must consider their chances very good. Although they don't get many 10-0 results, they rarely lose and their victories so far include 7-3 against Bath Street 'A' and 8-2 against Beauclair both promotion contenders. Bath Street and Beauclair must have a chance but a lot will depend on their results against the lower teams. A few 10-0 results will keep them in touch. My own impression is that they are a good bet for 4th and 5th in the League order.

How about relegation? There seems to be a wide choice from the carly results. Police 'A' appear to be certainties but for the rest you can take your pick of who goes down with them. Down there at the moment are Police, Colonsay 'A', Old Swan, Linacre and Liverpool Y.M.C.A. 'B'. It is however, early days yet and I will not commit myself to giving any predictions.

Vagabonds, Trinity 'B' and Colonsay 'B' are the only three left and I see them in the middle of the table

without any worries of relegation or promotion. Vagabonds look a little like the old Sparta with George Saunders and Ted Barnes in the team,

Trinity 'B' include Dave Newton and they have enough useful players in the club to keep the team well up in the division. Colonsay 'B' have Ron Evans and Harry Nelson and I do not see any danger for them. They beat their own 'A' team 7—3 in the first match of the season. Still there's nothing unusual about that, or is there? They do it every season.

I have a few results from the Rumjahn Cup none of which produced any surprises, Beauclair, Trinity 'A', Crawfords, Rafters 'A' and Colonsay 'B' all winning through to the next round.

The division has settled into the usual pattern with several teams making the running and it is already possible to pick out the probables who will be leading the battle for promotion. Eng. Elec. 'B' are the team making the early running. The results of possible challengers such as Knotty Ash, Liv. Jewish and possibly Beauclair 'A' and Maghull do not indicate their being strong enough to make a real challenge for the top spot. Plenty of surprises probably lie ahead but I fancy Elec. 'B' for champions with the runners-up being either Knotty Ash or Jewish. With my renowned record for usually being completely wrong this forecast is best ignored and all other teams can take

heart for all is not yet lost.

The trend of results also indicate a fairly compact middle group with little to choose between them Cadwa 'A', Bath St. 'C', Rafters 'B' and Y.M. 'D' will probably be in this group with the remainder of the teams hovering in or around the relegation zone, Even here it looks as if Polytech and Giro are in the most danger as Elec. 'D', Wav. Lab. 'C' and Bedford House all look strong enough to stay well ahead of these two and could easily finish higher than some teams already mentioned

Of the promoted teams Bedford are finding the going a bit hard at the moment although to be fair I don't suppose they expected, or for that matter even wanted, to be promoted. Giro are finding the going hardest and have complicated matters by conceding a w/over to Y.M. 'D'. Don't know what happened here but so early in the season it is only to be regretted. I expect the results of Bedford to show a gradual improvement and would not be surprised to find them on level terms with the middle group.

Elec. 'D' are also finding the going a little tougher than the 4th div. but they are getting the sets and with no apparent relegation problems are capable of improving their position at the expense of others. Those of you who suffer the indignity of being beaten by young Julie Black may get the opportunity to salvage some pride by beating the cause of their trouble namely her father who at present appears to be bottom of the averages in the Black family. What I suppose you could call a 'black outlook'. Sorry, couldn't resist that.

Bath St. 'C' promise to be a real writer's headache for they have beaten Beauclair 'A' and Maghuli '7-3-only to go down to Cadwa 'A' 6-4. I strongly suspect that having 'retired' as divisional writer Brian Cunningham has decided it is his duty to make forecasting as difficult as possible for his successor.

Liv. Y.M. 'D' finished grd last season but with a changed team prospects do not look as good this season. The team has a couple of youngsters who show promise of making their mark in the future. When playing them away you can expect to take refreshments alone, even to the extent of pouring you own tea as they have

not yet discovered that there is more to a match than just playing your sets. A top half position should be theirs and I anticipate them causing a few upsets later in the season.

Polytech started their season a couple of weeks after the rest but their early results indicate that another battle to avoid relegation lies ahead of them and having lost 9—1 to promoted Elec. 'D' their chances cannot be considered good. Still these are early days and they have plenty of time to climb to safety.

One team left to mention, my own, Wav. Lab. 'C' surely the pick of the bunch. When playing us you can expect pathos, seriousness, extreme changes of temperament, comedy and the ultimate in T.T. luxury—dried milk. Anything can happen, and usually does and in between we even include a bit of T.T. at no extra charge. I don't suppose Y.M. 'D' will agree with all of the above as our two matches with them just didn't go according to our usual system. There always has to be an exception and unfortunately they happened to be it. We do sometimes try to be serious but with such a mixture it is not always possible only when I am in the team is there any semblance of dignity coupled with intelligent and skilful T.T. 1 1 Mind you with John Hoban as chief wit and Rob Hamilton as our temperamental captain serious table tennis just has to take a back seat. Our one claim to fame in the Labour club is that we are the only team with a bit of glamour around in the shape (very shapely at that) of Alan Cameron's wife. Firstly, a belated welcome to another season. May I start by welcoming the newcomers, Y.M.C.A. "C" from the second division and Rafters "C", Maghull "A", Trinity "C" and English Electric "E" from the fourth division.

The one team missing from last season (Promotions apart) is Hilltop and it is unfortunate that this popular club has had to disband. I hope to find that Rob Lock and the rest of his team have signed on to continue playing for another club, if so, best wishes to them

This report is based on early games, so I hope you will bear with me if my news is slightly out-of-date.

From these early results the two teams making the early running are Bath St. 'B' and Y.M.C.A. 'C'.

Bath Street are strong throughout and really play to win They suffered their only defeat at the hands of Cadwa 4-6 with all 8 players winning at least one and I Blore winning three.

Y.M.C.A. 'C' are unbeaten so far and with Brown's perserverance Fagin's loop, Donnelly's incessant chop and Alam's speed of shot they will be in the running at the seasons end.

Cadwa held Y.M.C.A, to a draw and would appear to have played mostly strong teams so far so they too might well figure in the tilt for the title. Orrell will again be prominent in this division, they have a very strong team headed by exBusiness House star Cyril Callaghan and not only win most matches but enjoy their table tennis and make visiting teams most welcome.

The 'C' Teams of Trinity, Colonsay, Rafters and English Electric all have players capable of upsetting the top teams and will win more matches than they lose

The bottom five teams are headed at the moment by Maghull 'A' but this position could alter and it will be an interesting fight to avoid relegation.

Maghull have Alan Edwards at No. 1, he has lost only one to date but has yet to play the big names.

For the past four years we have had the pleasure of the company of Tony Clayton of Hull, Yorkshire and England on our Liverpool scene. When I was asked if we were interested in an England ranked player signing for English Electric, my pulse rate did not increase a great deal, Tony was ranked No. 11 at the time and his name only just registered.

However, we signed the up and coming youngster and under the diligent guidance and coaching of Sill, Parker and Lambert he eventually reached the England number 2 spot!

No sooner had he signed and played a couple of games than we found ourselves visiting him in the Royal Infirmary for three to four weeks. On the Monday after his discharge he was on the table playing a league match and losing the first game—but eventually beating Alan Tolson (Wav.Lab.) (I think) in three. He lost two sets in the Liverpool league during his four year stay both to H.R.H. The Duke of Mount Pleasant—The Right Honourable Ted Mandaluff. These games were gems of sportsmanship as one might have expected. In fairness to Clayton in the first game he played Ted, D'Arcy and Birch (His coaches!)

With his help the English Electric club twice reached the semi-finals of the English Club Championships being beaten each time by the fabulous Ormesby Club from Middlesborough led by Dennis Neale.

During his stay here he played regularly for the Liverpool team, sometimes travelling the length of the country to play a game. He won numerous local doubles titles, including the Merseyside Mens with Laurie Landry. He felt strongly about the closed singles being won by a local.

He was runner-up in the Merseyside Open Singles losing to Trevor Taylor and runner-up in the English Closed Singles losing to Dennis Neale. It would be difficult to enumerate his International appearances and tournament wins, but we were all at Belle Vue to see him play against China.

One afternoon I received a 'phone call and Tony apologised saying that he would have to scratch from the club tournament as he had just been told he was going to Singapore that night!

He played there in half of the Commonwealth championships for England, carried on to Japan and played in the world championships and then followed it up with the big break through when with the England team he was invited to China and became world famous front page news in all the national papers as the 'Ping Pong' diplomats, European championships, English University champion, European University championships etc., all followed.

Whilst I constantly bemoan the lack of coaching facilities locally for the average youngster—Tony and I had one thing in common we were NEVER coached. So don't look at me—remember Tony and play and play and you may go one better than he and become England's number one WITHOUT A COACH.

Tony eventually told me that he had his degree and there was only a 50/50 chance of his playing this season. One 50 being he would happy to obtain a job here and play. However, a little girl with a heart and a couple of arrows came along from Bristol and that was it—love is the sweetest thing—cupid had won again, our loss is Bristol's gain.

One regret perhaps with major table tennis commitments and studies his local league appearances were limited, but what we saw were great. He was vulnerable—he was the first to admit this, but his hitting and the power of his hitting was a joy and so exciting to watch.

I quote John Wren an ex-editor:—"Not only is he an exceptional player but he also has his head screwed on the right way, which is more than you can say for a lot of other players of less ability and a higher opinion of themselves"—John Wren, November, 1970.

It has been a pleasure to have him with us and wherever he is playing we will be rooting for a great player and a charming chap on and off the table—Good luck Tony, see you around we hope.
