

Editorial

A wind of change is creeping through our sphere at the top—Palmerston beat English Electric, but with great resilience the East Lancashire Road side took 87 of the next 90 points and the first division title, but they lost the Readman Cup to Wavertree Labour who in turn had lost to Rafters side which had been re-grouped and had an average age of about 18½ (I sense John Marshall's influence here). With rumours of changes in all the top teams we have had a season of movement which could make next season a season of real change.

John McNee has come through clearly as our leading player, John Marshall can come again if he varies his stereotyped game a little and amongst many new players Neil Roberts, "News of the World" and Closed Champion, Keith Williams and Clive Strettle must be players who just want a touch to big time. They all have a long way to go to match the dedication of Allanson and D'Arcy both of whom have had an excellent season inside and outside league warfare. So at last we have the old and new meeting on equal terms, a nice situation which means we have had a good season as all the players below with ambition must strive to reach this top group. Which is why I will always be an advocate of a 10-team 3-man Premier Division as this must create a higher standard for the others to reach for.

To all our correspondents, even those who have kept us waiting—thank you, I daren't mention names as my two star mentions last season immediately dropped out. To our advertisers—thank you for your help, Wallace & Son, our printers, Eddie Cameron (I never missed a mag.) and Ken Armson (The Wavertree Wizard) great stuff; we are only as good (or bad) as you make us.

Cheshire third team included Dave Roberts and John McNee (Wavertree Lab.) and Pete D'Arcy; they won their division of the Northern League.

Requiring a five-all draw to win their division, the ladies' team lost 6-4 to Manchester, despite a magnificent win by Susan Manning over Susan Lisle. Barbara Kirkham and Brenda Williams, all of Colonsay, were the team that finished runners-up. The ladies' 'A' team finished fourth, making a change from being champions.

The men's team finished with a 7-3 win over relegated Bolton. You might be interested in a couple of points here—Bolton went down because Stockport (Champions) arrived over the 30 minutes limit late at Blackburn, the latter claiming a 10-0 walkover as per rule and avoided relegation. Earlier in the season Bolton had arrived at Stockport for an inter-city game and by sheer chance a Stockport City player arrived to play in a local league match; he immediately (and fortunately) rounded the city team up and they beat Bolton! Stockport won the league and Bolton were relegated.

On a more personal note our youth team finished second to Blackpool despite a ten nil (20 sets to nil thrashing of Blackpool 'A'). Our chaps lost 6-4 to Blackpool when, despite appeals from our city and county officials, Blackpool refused to offer another date although most of our squad were tied up on other official table tennis duties on the date down to play. The Blackpool captain eventually had the last word and refused an alternative date.

The junior team of Keith Williams, Neil Roberts (Liverpool Y.M.C.A.) and Peter Rutherford (Colonsay) gave a good account of themselves but found this division the toughest for years. The 'A' team squad was varied during the season with Paul Tsang and George Smith (Liverpool Y.M.C.A.) the mainstays.

At Stoke, on March 17th, Childwall Valley High School girls (Colonsay) became the All England Under-13 Champions, Stephanie Lawes, Julie O'Malley, Michelle Entwistle and Elizabeth Faragher beating Maiden Erlegh School, Berks., 7-1.

Alex Davidson has now withdrawn from the scene as Match Fixture Sec. He has had some tough nuts to crack over the past five years and deserves the thanks of the players of the many city teams during this period. May he enjoy his visit to Scotland and England win.

Dave Ferguson, Rafters' hero of the first game, continued his good work with a 21-12, 21-17 win over Colin Thompson. Alan Walton evened things with a 14 and 19 win over Peter Rumjahm and Alex Gould beat Pete Short 21-16, 13-21, 21-18. Mike Moran, the Bath Street strong man with six great wins, beat Reg Hetherington 16 and 15. Thompson and Gould lost to Rumjahm and Short 21-19, 12-21, 15-21; Walton and Moran beat Ferguson and Hetherington 11-21, 21-14, 21-18 and gave their side a 4-2 lead.

Amy Bell and Joyce Barton and the Palmerston club looked after what turned out to be the largest crowd at any final, during the interval. Short brought Rafters into the game with a 21-16, 8-21, 21-15 win over Thompson. Rumjahm lost the first to Moran 17 and in the second was 14-6 and 20-15 down. He came back superbly to 20-20 in an unsuccessful effort to same the game and match, losing 22-20. 5-3 ahead on sets and 5 games ahead, Bath Street had won a match that contained far more exciting tennis than the first. READMAN CUP

English Electric 5, Wavertree Labour 5.

The number one subject for the first few games at the Bath Street club was the slippy dance floor on which John McNee miraculously beat Wally Allanson 21-11, 14-21, after being 15-5 down in the third, won 21-18, tremendous stuff from both players. Mike Tierney lost to Pete D'Arcy 21-12, 17-21, 16-21. Dave Roberts beat Gordon Birch 15 and 13 and Ron Burke tactically beat Eddie Clein 15-21, 21-17, 21-17 on expedite. A 21-10, 15-21, 21-17 McNee win over D'Arcy put the Wavertree boys 4-1 up. Roberts lost 15 and 17 to Allanson, again on expedite, and Clein and Birch had a good win over McNee and Burke 24-22, 11-21, 21-14. But Roberts and Tierney made it a safe 5 for Labour with an 18 and 19 win over Allanson and D'Arcy. Clein and Tierney took a game each at 18 and Tierney 20-17 up in the 3rd—a little aggro from the side had brought Eddie's bristles out and Mike was 22-20 down. Burke then met Birch's old-time power with a 9 and 13 defeat and a 5-all scoreline at 12-20 a.m.

Replay

At the Palmerston Club this time, but McNee started in the same devastating way, beating D'Arcy 16 and 20; Birch beat Burke 21-8, 19-21, 21-6. Despite the scores in Tierney's 21-6, 21-13 win over Clein, the rallies were hard-fought, long—and, oh dear, pardon the yawn!! Roberts tactics in taking Allanson to expedite failed, as he lost 17 and 17. An 18 and 18 for McNee and Burke over Allanson and D'Arcy made it 3-2 for Wavertree and a welcome cuppa from Amy Bell and Millie Harris.

D'Arcy made it 3-all with a 19 and 19 win over Tierney. We then had the sheer joy of the two best sets of the series when McNee's attack beat Allanson's defence 19 and 19 (Wally was 14-2 up) and Roberts and Birch treated us to a tremendous all-round display of T.T., Dave winning 15 and 16. At 5-3 up and 5 games ahead, Wavertree had scored a great victory and broken Electric's stranglehold on honours. At 10-55 Electric conceded the last two games and the cup and medals were presented by Arthur

It was more like a "Love in" than a major crunch match as team captains Pete and Dave exchanged teams at the Readman replay. Ken Armson and I were nearly kidded. One answer to the complaint about venues would be a Finals Week at the end of the season—it has so many advantages and my club, for one, could be made available.

THE LIVERPOOL CLOSED TOURNAMENT

APRIL 1974

John McNee had little difficulty in claiming the Men's Singles title at the recent Liverpool Closed Championships. He had no trouble in winning any of his matches and thoroughly deserved to become Liverpool Champion. All his seven opponents were defeated convincingly in two straight games and the Final, against Wally Allanson, was always under his control.

Wally Allanson, the defending champion, had one moment of worry in an earlier round when Dave Butterworth took him to three games, but this apart until the Final, Wally had no real difficulty. John's accurate attack, however penetrated the usually reliable defence too often in the Final and ensured that a new name would appear on the Montague Burton Cup.

The Men's Doubles provided a surprise when an unseeded pair knocked out two seeded couples, both in two straight games. Peter Lee and Faul Tsang, unseeded, aisposed of Peter D'Arcy and Wally Allanson, the second seeds, and then added to their laurels by seeing off Dave Roberts and Mike Tierney. Even in the Final they gave the top seeds, John Marshall and John McNee, some moments of real anxiety before the two Johns took the title.

There was a most disappointing number of entries in the Women's events. It seems that several leading players either forgot or were unable to enter and so the two competitions, Women's Singles and Women's Doubles, merely provided gift prizes for Brenda Williams. Congratulations to Brenda for winning, of course, and also to Julie Black, who had the opportunity to show her potential and her undoubtedly improved play, but I still think it's a pity that other leading players, who have received such encouragement and acclaim from our League, can neglect to enter their own Tournament. Only nine couples entered the Doubles and this made me decide to complete this event before Finals night.

The two Junior events had an added interest this year. The Eric Caird Cup for Junior Boys and the Eric Caird Cup for Junior Girls were both being awarded for the first time. The Girls' Cup went, of course, to Brenda Williams, but the Boys' event provided a less clear-cut result. Keith Williams had been seeded number one, but he came unstuck in his Final against the second seed Neil Roberts. Neil claimed the new Cup after an entertaining and exciting win in three games.

It is always more difficult to seed players in the Restricted Singles than in the other events. This illustrates, of course, the equality of ability

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amongst the leading players in the Third Division and below—at least, that is my excuse. Arthur Land, seeded one, was knocked out almost immediately by Les Linforth, who progressed to the Quarters before losing to the eventual unseeded winner, George Bradley. B. Crolley, the second seed, lost to D. Harrison in Round 4, who then went out to J. Letch in the Quarters.

The other two seeds, Paul Morgan and Clive Strettle, reached the semi-final stage as expected, but here Strettle lost to Bradley, while Morgan overcame Letch to claim a Final place. Bradley, however, took the title with a good win in three games.

The Veteran Singles winner was George Smith once again, while the Consolation Events were won by John O'Sullivan and Mrs. I. Clark.

An appreciative audience witnessed some very fine matches during the Finals Night programme, and the prizes and cups were presented to the winners and runners-up by the Liverpool League Chairman, Mr. Arthur Upton.

I must record my sincere thanks to all those who helped in any way in the running of the Tournament.

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THE BENEFITS OF THE 'WORLDS'— REALITY OR PIPE DREAM? by K. Armson

The article by Tom Blunn designed to encourage players to believe that it really is a good idea for them to pay a levy of 75p left a lot of questions unanswered. It will merely serve to convince them that the Council is completely out of touch with players' views rather than convince them that basically it is a good idea.

The average player—that means most—couldn't care less if the championships took place at the North Pole or the Sahara Desert and would have some difficulty naming any recent world champion. He certainly knows that there will be no glory or acclaim for him wherever it takes place. He will also view with great scepticism the implied return of this money in the highly unlikely event of there being no loss, particularly when the levy is quoted as accounting for 20% of the estimated cost. He knows ruling bodies are like governments, once they get their hands on your money you'll never get it back.

Several questions were answered on why this money is required and the areas in which it will be spent. But Tom Blunn chose to ignore the questions most players will ask. Firstly, why is it necessary for players to pay a levy? It is just not good enough to quote costs as the reason. If it is such a prestigious affair then the money should not come from us. We are also entitled to ask whether players in other sports have to pay a levy to have a world championship staged in this country? Then there is sponsorship. Surely it is only right that those who reap the financial benefits should foot the cost? Assistance from the government in the form of a grant is mentioned almost as an afterthought. If, as the E.T.T.A. is at pains to point out, the championships are such a world-embracing affair of benefit to our export trade, then assistance from both the government and trades should be of sufficient magnitude to cover the costs without recourse to a levy?

Tom Blunn also speaks of the benefits of table tennis as a sport and even quotes it as a family game which just needs a spark to ignite it into a flame which would engulf the country. Is this really true? I think not. Table tennis as a sport today lacks spectator appeal. This lack of spectator appeal is evident at all levels of our sport from tournaments down to club matches. If anyone doubts this lack of spectator appeal let them go along to any social club when a snooker or darts match is taking place and they will find spectators in abundance. This lack of spectator appeal is very apparent when T.V. coverage is involved. The game comes over as lacking in interest and excitement and it is easy to get the impression that little effort is involved. T.V. coverage needs personalities who can put bite and excitement into a game and leave viewers eager to see more. Our type of T.V. coverage seems more like a commercial to take up tiddley-winks. Snooker is an example of how first class coverage of top personalities can convey to the viewer the drama and intenseness of the game and the skill required to play it. The Pot Black programme has $5\frac{1}{2}$ million viewers.

I am well aware that as snooker is a much slower game the camera can follow each shot from start to finish. The Council will have to study this aspect of T.V. in great detail, for if their hopes are to become a reality then it will be via T.V. presentation. Only the very best matches must be shown in a manner designed to give impact and stimulate a desire to learn more about our sport.

No one doubts the magnitude of the task that lies ahead of the Council and it will certainly be of great benefit to the game if the staging and presentation of 'The Worlds' were to put us back on the map as a sport. But we are going to have great difficulty in convincing most players that their 75p will really help change pipe-dreams into reality.

For myself, I am convinced that basically it is a good idea. Unfortunately when I vote on this at the A.G.M. it will be in accordance with the wishes of our club members. With so many questions left unanswered I have a good idea what their wishes will be and I can't help feeling that similar views will be expressed in a great many other clubs.

An exciting and hard-fought season is now at a close and English Electric, although not sweeping everything before them quite so much this season, have still retained their grip on the League championship. Wavertree Labour wrenched the other half of the coveted double, i.e., the Readman Cup with a fine victory over Electric in the final (after a replay).

It is debatable whether the best team won the league title, no doubt Jack Lambert and Co. will give voice and point to the facts but I am of the opinion (biased as it is) that Wavertree, when dropping seven sets to Rafters (albeit to a fine young team) virtually handed Electric the title on a platter. This result was a particularly weak one in view of Wavertree's fine overall performance throughout the season and surely the cup victory demonstrated Wavertree's superiority over the Electric club (shrieks of dissent can be heard echoing from the East Lancs!). Apart from that my congratulations to both clubs and their two fine secretaries-Messrs. Lambert and Armson.

One of the most exciting things to occur this season was the reemergence, as a first division force, of that well-established club, Rafters. Under John Marshall's leadership they have really made themselves felt this season and this augurs well, bearing in mind the youth of the side for future Liverpool table tennis.

Palmerston's good form throughout the season is worthy of mention, the only black mark being their concession of the Readman Cup semi-final to English Electric without a bat being raised. Trinity, Bath Street, Wavertree Labour 'A', Y.M. 'A', Colonsay, English Electric 'A', as well as Palmerston and Rafters, played their part in the usual "cut and thrust" of mid-table encounters. These teams, although honours rarely come their way, still turn out every week, give wholly of their best and make each game a usually well-fought struggle. My thanks to you for a highly enjoyable season.

My commiserations to the Y.M. first team for making the championship a "three horse affair" for so long; it was only in the latter stages that their efforts started to lose momentum.

Last, but by no means least, a word about the less successful teams this season. Sefton have managed to keep their newly-won first division status for another season—well done lads! Sadly to the relegated teams — Waterloo Park and Wavertree 'B'—your only consolation is that its probably only for a season and you will be back with the big guns the season after next.

One last individual performance of merit, which occurred in the Sefton-Waterloo Park match, Bill Crafter, 11-4 down in the third to Dave Olsen, ran out a 21-11 winner. I won't dwell on Dave's reaction to this reversal of fortune as it's pretty pointless (I can hear the groans already!).

In the replay it was the other way round and Bath Street 'A' were 5-3 up but this time wins for Dave Ferguson and Hetherington made it another draw.

Having played in a Rumjahn Cup final and lost by 1 set I know just how the Rafters team feel and I am sure Bath Street 'A' would much rather have taken the cup by winning the match. I have sounded off about the cup rules before and I will say again that they should be changed. I can quite see that it would be impracticable to go on having replays, so I would suggest that if the 1st match is a draw the replay should only include one doubles set which would make a result inevitable. No cup should be won or lost without a clear-cut match result. However, I do not want anybody to think I am getting at Bath Street 'A' for winning the cup in this manner. The cup rules are not their fault and they deserve everv congratulation for their success.

Back to the league—and joint 4th come Beauclair, who always looked as though they would finish in about that position, and Colonsay 'A' who, until the latter part of the season, did not. They came back very well after a bad start and deserve their high position. Next come the Y.M. 'B', another

team proving that a poor start is not the end of the world. They had only two regular players in J. Doherty and J. Brown and with a settled team could have done a lot better. I noticed, too, that they received a walk-over from Rafters 'A' for a match that should have been played at Rafters. I wonder what happened there?

Seventh come Crawfords and here I must send them my apologies for being unable to play in the second half of the season. I noticed they played short on a number of occasions and there is nothing worse than seeing your own team play short when there is nothing you can do about it. Next are Police, and here again another team that pulled up well. Following them are Colonsay 'B' and Trinity 'B', two teams who stayed in this division by the skin of their teeth. The last week's results made interesting reading. Colonsay 'B' took 4 sets off Trinity 'A' and Trinity 'B' drew with Colonsay 'A'. These sets kept both teams in the division. Now that's what I call keeping the interest going right to the end.

On now to the relegated teams and in 11th place are Linacre, which is a bit of a surprise to say the least. They are just about the last team I expected to go down and here again the last result of the season decided their fate, a 6-4 defeat, by of all teams, Crawfords. I expect to see them back the season after next. The other three places go as expected to Old Swan, who made a brave fight to avoid the drop and nearly made it, Vaga-bonds and Police 'A'. Vagabonds started quite well but after George Saunders stopped playing their results went from bad to worse. Police 'A' never had a chance and although they had three regular players in the side, they played a total of 15 different players in the team. I hope they have success in the 3rd Division.

Reflection: Well, as I have only played in 7 matches I have not got any, except for me which is more a reflection on the whole league. This season I have played in the following leagues:—Liverpool, Chester, Crewe, Warrington and East Flintshire. Out of all these leagues the Liverpool League is the only one in which matches do not

start by 7.45 p.m. and finish in time for a last pint. Think about it. Finally the notes you have been reading will be the last I will be able to write for the Digest for some time to come. Ken Armson at least will be sad as he will have nobody to skit at. I can honestly say that I have enjoyed writing the notes over the past few years and I hope some of you at least have found them interesting. Hope to see you sometime.

Congratulations to Elec. 'B' for a worthy and convincing double. They never took it easy even though the title was theirs some weeks ago. Second place looked to be booked by Liverpool Jewish, instead we had a sensational reverse from Rafters 'B' who, after a period of average results, suddenly woke up and showed their

true form with a really storming finish to pip Jewish for promotion. Their run-in included 10-0's v Bath Street 'C' and Maghull, which were the first 10-0's recorded against either team. As Jewish had already been given promotion by the "Echo," the news of Rafters' revival came as quite a shock to them. They can only blame themselves for this, particularly against Cadwa 'A' when, in spite of receiving 3 w/o's they could only manage a 6-4 win. They were without Roy Lussey and Dave Cohen for this match which should bring home to others that if you want to get promotion or avoid relegation you must turn out your strongest team regularly. In their other two final matches v. Bath Street and Beauclair, they could only manage a 6-4 and 7-3. So its commiserations to Jewish and congratulations to Rafters 'B'.

Beauclair failed to last the pace and fell away completely after conceding a 10-0 w/o to Cadwa. The chance was there but they never seemed to have the will needed to take it and finished in 4th place. I can't help feeling that they didn't really want promotion. Knotty Ash also dropped completely out of the race with a series of declining results. With a little more consistency next season they could well achieve their aim to return to the 2nd Division.

As expected Giro and Polytech go down and I can only say they deserve relegation. Polytech have conceded 4 10-0 w/o's, being unable to raise a team. This from a team which has used 12 players is ridiculous. Giro conceded two. Both clubs have shown little fight and have contributed to their own fate. Polytech could have made a better fight of it with the strength they had available. For Giro only Alan Nolan showed any real fight but received little or no support from his teammates.

Maghull managed to get a good placing but strangely conceded a 10-0 w/o to Cadwa 'A', which must have cost them a place or two. No doubt they are well satisfied with what, on the whole, could be considered a satisfactory season. Cadwa confirmed my remarks in the last issue and a continued gathering of sets, aided I must add, by 10-0's claimed against Beauclair

and Maghull, gave them a reasonably well-earned 6th place. Along with Bath Street they are our walkover specialists, having claimed three each.

Very little separated Bath Street 'C', Labour 'C' and Y.M. 'D' who all had a fair season. Bath Street may be a little bit disappointed as they, were obviously hoping for a much higher position, but on the whole theirs seems a reasonable position. Y.M. 'D' disappointed a little with fluctuating results due to team changes. They started to improve towards the end with draws v. Beauclair and K. Ash, a 6-4 win over Jewish and 7-3 against Bath Street. Wav. Labour are fairly satisfied with their placing, having been hampered by unnecessary shortages on several occasions.

Bedford House finally confirmed my faith in them by finishing above Elec. 'D' although there were times when I thought they were going to let me down. A poor season for Elec. 'D' but although 3rd from bottom they never really looked in danger of relegation, but they will have to watch out next season. English Electric 'C' had the singles star of the season in Clive Strettle, who had a 92% average and seems destined for a first division future.

Cadwa have had many strange results this season, one minute they're winning 10-0 and next they're losing 0-10. When they met Colonsay, Dave Piper and Ian Blore both beat Alan Guy, yet Colonsay won 6-4, John Read and Tony O'Connor winning 2 each and both doubles going to Colonsay.

Trinity finished the season poorly, losing to Waterloo, Old Swan, English Electric, Colonsay, Cadwa, Orrell and 0-10 to Y.M.C.A. They used 9 players in these 7 games, only Stan Smith playing in all and he only won 4 out of 14. That's not like Stan Smith.

In the match Rafters versus Orrell, Joe Lovelady and Jean Reynolds played a great set—Joe winning to great applause. In the same match Janet Rumjahn won a battle of tactics against Peter Wilson—21-9 in the third.

In the struggle against relegation, as I stated in the previous Digest, Old Swan and Waterloo, after being the bottom two for most of the season, decided to improve their position.
