Dear Jack, - The Modus Operandi or Orrell's Farewell to 3B

This may sound a dreary heading but read on and you may, at the end, be wiser.

You may remember Orrell teams saying that they were not very sure of having their

clubroom for the 1977/1978 season, well, unfortunately this came to pass. At first the Action Committee were confident of finding alternative premises but hope gradually turned to despair until a fairy godmother in the shape of Waterloo Park brightened all our faces by saying "Why not join the Orrell Club to Waterloo?". Tables were duly transported, Waterloo Park even held a 'Meet the Members' social evening and all were convinced that a new and stronger club had emerged. As 3B teams know, both Waterloo Park and Orrell had teams in 3B. However, the merger of the two clubs did'nt seem to affect any other team and obviously both teams would want to stay the same. A look at the Liverpool regulations revealed no problems, of course we would have to let the League know what had happened, so a letter was sent with the registrations explaining and saying both teams wanted to stay the same and Waterloo

Park would therefore be grateful if League positions could be retained. No news is good news and off we went on summer holidays.

The news received on handbook night that we had fortfeited rights to the league positions previously held by Orrell was greeted with disbelief. Within 24 hours an appeal was lodged with the Lancashire Table Tennis Association and a fortnight later the appeal was considered by the committee.

The decision was that although the Appeals Committee had considerable sympathy with the way the old Orrell teams had been treated, they found that the Liverpool League had operated in accordance with its accepted Modus Operandi. I understand a Modus Operandi requires only one established precedent. When the Liverpool League were asked what this was, they quoted a 'Bedford' club joining Beauclair and having to start again at the bottom. In which League the 'Bedford' club had played previously was not revealed. As to which year a club last fortfeited its league positions by merging with another club, the Liverpool League could not say.

Since then we have spoken to people who say the Liverpool League came to this decision years ago to prevent some fiddling which was happening. We have met others who say a team called University went straight into Divisision 3 when they had a Huddersfield town player. Others think that there was once a rule. Everyone can now tell us how we should have worked it to have kept our league position. The aspect which seems unsatisfactory, however, is that an obscure precedent was used to punish unnecessarily a perfectly fair club.

The Committee rightly act in a similar way to the police in that they administer the laws, spot offenders and punish them. The police, however, act differently with an innocent person heading for trouble than when a villain is about to to commit a crime. They might let the latter incriminate himself so that they can put him away for a while. If however, they saw a blind man heading for the edge of the pier they would certainly stop him from falling off.

The League knew the outcome of what Orrell were doing and yet did not even warn them. They allowed us to carry forward our guarantee fees and Lancashire returned our appeal

fee. They could have had these five times over for a timely warning.

So its farewell Wally and all the rest of you lads and lasses. We can either leave Waterloo in the lurch or try to stick it out until 1979/1980, the earliest we can hope to get back.

To Jewish who were given our place - 'It's an ill wind....... To our other readers beware of all Modus. Operandi.

By the time you read this 'Digest' happy Christmas and New Year. With so few cards to start with I am going to concentrate this article on the playing performances of a few players.

Keith Williams our Singles champion has started his season well, he has beaten all the one's and two's who have faced him. These include such names as John McNee. Ricki Brown and Eddie Clein. His two losses have been against Pete Turtle and Francis Lay. Frances has had some remarkable wins this season, apart from his win over Keith, he has beaten Brian Davey, Wayne Percival and Tony O'Connor. Frances beat Tony 21-11 in the third and with these performances must come into the city team reckening. John McNee was also a victim of Ronnie Brotherton, going down two straight 21-16; 21-16. However in the same game Ronnie lost to Peter Lee 21-23 in the third. Mike Truman is still a force to be reckoned with, beat the improving Thomson of Colonsay, 21-15; 21-18, and Dave Williams in three. However, Eddie Clein was not so In what was a slow start Dave lost the first game 16-21, but by this time the expedite rule was in force and Dave then ran away the following two games 21-7; 21-12. Although playing as reserve, Alan Pickering did well in beating Paul Morgan and narrowly losing to Phil Moon in the bottom of the table clash between L.Y. 'A' and Wav. Lab.'A'. Staying with the high riding Wavertree Club, the consistency of Dave Butterworth provided the only thorn in Wavertree's win at Bath St. Dave won the only point by beating Dave Roberts two straight 21-18; 21-19.

The closest Wavertree have come to being beaten this season is against Colonsay. At one stage in the game Nicky Cray had only to win his third game against Roy Smith to earn Colonsay a draw. After the shock of Percival and Smith losing to O'Commor and Nicky Cray, Wavertree swept into a 3-I lead. Wins for Dave Roberts over Thompson and Wayne Percival in a tremendous game with Tony O'Connor, and the first doubles put Wavertree into this position. However, Colonsay were not ready to give up. Nicky Cray was sent back to do battle with Mike Tierney, Nicky won two straight 21-18; 21-16, Roy Smith now came into the action by defeating Dave Williams convincingly. came back again. Tony O'Connor still troubled from his earlier defeat lost the first game to Dave Roberts 21-19. He took the second 21-13, and in a tremendous third game won 21-19. Wayne Percival went back on to increase Wavertree lead again, however, it took him three games to dispose of Dave Williams. Colonsay however, were still Phil Thomson went on to beat Mick determined to obtain a result from this match. Tierney 23-21 in the fifth-three-gamer of the night. The score to recap is now 5-4 to Wavertree. The newly promoted Colonsay had young Nicky Cray to play the Liverpool singles finalist Roy Smith to put a halt to Wavertree 1007 record. Nicky won the first game 21-11 and Roy took advantage of his experience to take the following two games -21-14; 21-12.

With just less than half the season gone, Wavertree Labour have opened up a seven point lead over Y.M.C.A and with Marshall playing again must surely close this gap. By the half way stage I expect Way. Lab. to be on top by only a couple of points. My tip for the championship is still Wav. Lab. as they are the settled side of the two. Palmerston 'A' suffering from a lack of Wigan players like my own club Eng. Elec. look good candidates for relegation. Y.M.C.A. 'A' I think are as good as relegated. All the best.

Y.M.C.A. 'B' resemble the Y.M.C.A. 'A' team promoted two years ago and three of the promoted teams return after only one season in the third, so that division has a 1975 look about it.

This season brings few changes, but although most of the old faces are getting a little older, their play itself shows a timeless quality.

Towards the foot of the table three of the promoted teams are in the same position as they were two years ago. Colonsay 'B' look in a hopeless position with Old Swan. When these two teams met the result was a draw thanks to L. Fennah, who follows the typical Colonsay tactic of playing in a number of teams (she also turns out in the Pete Dobss won two for Old Swan in reply. Bath St. are better placed thanks to Clive Shislett tonning their averages. Best results to date are a draw with Linacre and four points from the Police where Jack Letch did well in beating Linacre are a little higher and look as if they will be fighting it Dave Crispin. out with Palmerston to avoid relegation for the rest of the season. Linacre would be in their present position if they turned out their strongest team Any four from seven players are likely to turn out. However, Harry Reeve is in salendid form, showing this in beating Frank Murphy and Mick Allen in a hard fought match against Beauclair when they narrowly went down 4-6. Palmerston 'B' are short of players and regularly turn out different players. C. Parr making a rare appearance against Rafters brat Ron Rumjahn and Don Davies, but could not prevent a 3-7 defeat.

Towards the middle of the table are Vagabonds and Colonsay 'A'. Although Ted Barnes beat Harry Reeve and Jack Davidson, Frank Lacey's wins over Bobbie Owens and Doug Ridgeway saw Vagabonds go down 4-6 to Linacre. Colonsay 'A' with new signing Sue Alexander would be in a much higher position if they could manage to get their ladies county player to turn out more regularly. Without Sue they went down to a heavy 2-8 defeat to Rafters 'A' with Peter Coyle and Harry Nelson winning the only singles against Dave Ferguson and Don Davies respectively. The point was emphasised in a narrow 4-6 defeat against Y.M.C.A. 'B' when Sue beat Harry Johnston and Ken Roscoe. In a large group with an outside chance of promotion are Maghull, Path St. 'A', Police and English Electric 'B'. Maghull fought out a long drawn match with Colonsay 'A'. Dave Piper "sweated out" to a 30-28 win in the third set against Ian Blore and Colonsay hung on again with Harry Nelson beating Ken Jones 22-20 in the third. Although Gordon Brownlee beat Ted Mandaluff 21-19 in the third they went down heavily 2-8 to Y.M.C.A. 'B'. However, against another leading team Rafters 'A' they gained In the same match a draw, thanks to Ken Jones and Gordon Brownlee beating Don Davies. Gordon lost 19. 21 in the third to Dave Ferguson. Bath St. 'A' looked in contention to return to the first division until they lost heavily 3-7 to Beauclair. striking play was shown by Mick Allen in his most amazing form to thrash Val Franco. There followed a 0-10 thrashing by Y.M.C.A. 'B' but the score marks the close nature of much of the play. Their best result was a 7-3 win over English Electric 'B' with John Pritchard beating George Cheng and Bill Ellard. English Electric have lost Phil Thomson who was replaced by George Cheng. George helped English Electric to a 7-3 win over Linacre by beating Harry Reeve and Norman Appleby. Police are missing Barry McLeoud, but achieved a good draw against Rafters 'A' with Gareth Jones beating Ron Rumjahn and Clive Roberts. Bill Crafter replied with two singles wins for Rafters. His steady play has been a regular feature of Rafters challenge to regain their first division status.

Rafters and Beauclair look favourites to achieve runners up position. Just one point separated the teams until they met in a hard fought match which saw Beauclair run out 6-4 winners. Ted Birch's steadily improving play with a more orthodox bat has lead Beauclair to their familiar position as the season reaches its half way stage and in this match he achieved two comfortable singles wins over Dave Ferguson and Ron Rumjahn Don Davies replied with wins over Frank Murphy and Mick Allen.

Lastly, Y.M.C.A. 'B' (or should it be 'A'?) have established a clear lead at the top and look as if they will repeat their 1975 success. Harry Johnson is a more awkward competitor than ever and he was the main inspiration in their very narrow 6-4 victory over Beauclair when he won both singles comfortably. Y.M.C.A. however, only scraped home in the end by two closely fought doubles wins.

Kirkby and Cadwa, both new teams to the division are currently leading the division with Trinity 'D' and Fire Service close on their heels, and I think the eventual champions will come from among these four teams.

Coming through the 5th and 4th divisions in successive seasons, have now established themselves at the top of 3A. I think most people will agree that the division is currently stronger than for some years, and you only have to look at the teams languishing in the relegation zone to realise just how high the standards of the top team are.

The bottom five teams have managed only four wins between them and five draws. Rafters 'B', Division 2, last year, are third from bottom with eight successive defeats which must prove something.

An interesting statistic is the number of 10-0 wins, 9 so far, and six at 9-1, that is over 25% of games so far and compares with only eight draws, and eight wins by 6 to 4, six of the last being games concerning the top four clubs, all of which would seem to indicate that the gap between the top four and the rest could be very large indeed by the end of the season. One thing that is very noticeable is the number of players that have been used so far, especially amongst the lower teams, which must present problems, particularly in the doubles, my own team is a good example, having played seven different players in only eight matches.

There have been some very tight and interesting matches. The first week Trinity 'D' lost 4-6 to Kirkby, six sets going to three, Trinity's hero was Dave Wilson who beat N.Chaloner and P.Brown in the singles, then combined with T.Downing to beat Brown and Monaghan in the doubles. Kirkby then lost 4-6 to Cadwa. Mike Bower and Ken Hartley winning their singles to ensure victory. Not to be outdone Trinity then beat Cadwa 6-4 Dave Wilson again winning two singles, but matched by Trevor Hughes who beat John McLoughlin and Alan Gillespie, then combined with Chris Roberts to beat Wilson and Downing in the doubles. Kirkby showed that they can be disturbed by beating lowly Maghull by the smallest margin, when they must have expected better, Andy Howarth was the man of the night for Maghull with wins over Mark Monaghan and John Rankin. In contrast Bath St. 'C' thrashed Maghull 8-2 then visited Kirkby and lost 10-0 and failed even to win one game, the heaviest defeat of any team this season and rather strange with players of the calibre of Alan Spencer and the brothers Cunningham. However, I hear Bath St. have taken stens to strengthen both teams, and I see my old friend Cyril Smith has joined the 'D' team, just to prove that it is possible to hit the net every other shot, but so far even Cyril has nt been able to inspire his colleagues to their first victory. Liverpool Jewish have an interesting line-up with David and Tony Cohen, Anne Carline and Cathy Gore, a combination of experience and youthful exuberance, or beauty and the beast, desending on your outlook.
