DIVISION ONE

Predicting team positions has proved again to be similar to predicting the outcome of national elections. Results in the first few matches give a clear indication of what will be the performances over the season. Hence Wavertree Labour have pulled further clear of their challengers and even when their top players are not available, the reserve strength proves to be formidable. They crushed their two closest rivals Paimerston and Rafters 8-2. Palmerston's only singles win came from Les Molyneaux who beat Greg Powell. Rafters wins came from Greg losing again to Alan Timewell and Roy Smith losing against Gordon Exell. Roy Smith's consistent flat hitting from defence has proved to be one of the cornerstones of Wavertree's success with Roy enjoying one of his best years so far in this his 20th season in Liverpool.

Palmerston, Rafters and Y. M. C. A. are left to fight for second place. The Y. M. C. A. Palmerston match ended predictably with most games going to form. John McNee won his usual two singles against Keith Williams and Alec Bryce. The tightest match proved to be Peter Turtles win against Ron Brotherton 21-19 in the third. Palmerston's best result is perhaps a 9-1 win against Wavertree Labour A with Keith Williams beating Dave Roberts and Mick Tierney. Y. M. C. A. perhaps have some weakness in doubles as their two doubles defeats against Rafters saw them go down 4-6.

English Electric and Trinity have slumped to mid-table positions. English Electric slipped badly against Wavertree Labour A losting 2-8, with Labour s Dave Roberts easily dispensing of Clive Strettle and Graeme Black. They have often struggled against lower teams as they showed in drawing with Bath Street. Mike Moran had his best match of the season beating Mark Byles and Graeme Black. For Trinity Eric Hardman's fast reflexes have earned him a good season so far, but consistent support from other players has perhaps been absent when the going has been tough. However, their top three players all won to see them through with a good 8-2 result against Y. M. C. A. "A" with G. Taylor losing to Alan Pickering and Steve Farr. With G. Taylor, also losing to Alan Chase and Mike Keane from their second team, one begins to doubt Trinity's ranking system. With Trinity "A" not being able to field a consistent team they have slipped towards the lower end of the league. Against Bath Street they drew with S. Chen having a good night for Bath Street, beating Alan Chase and Ian Trueman.

Wavertree Labour "A" have had perhaps their best ever season. They beat Rafters 7-3 with Mick Tierney beating Trevor Manning and Alan Timewell and Malcolm McEvoy beating Alan Timewell and Neil Roberts. Rafters also ran into trouble against English Electric "A". Singles wins by Alec Sill and Brian Crolley against Gordon Exell, and Rod McPherson beating John Fennah were complemented by Electric's two strong doubles combinations to earn a draw. In the cup English Electric "A" went one better winning after a replay. Gordon Exell returned to form beating Rod McPherson twice and Brian Crolley and Alec Sill in the two matches. The result finally hinged on Neil Roberts withdrawing half way through. Fred Pheysey's experience and awkward blocking style proved too difficult for John Fennah who lost to Fred on each occasion. Y. M. C. A. "A" with their enormous pool of players have had mixed fortunes. They lost only 4-6 to Wavertree Labour "A" with Mark Walmsley celebrating being home on leave, with wins over Phil Luxon and Paul Morgan.

At the time of writing Bath Street, although only winning once, are reasonably comfortably placed thanks to anumber of draws. A hard fought match against Trinity with seven matches going to three sets, saw Dave Butterworth lose 18-21 in the third to Eric Hardman and then reserve this with a 21-17 final set against Ricky Brown. Nailbiter of the night proved to be Alan Walton's win over Alan Chase 23-21 in the third set. Colonsay are still in with a chance of staying in the division thanks to their talented young player Phil Tomson. Phil regularly takes points off the strongest teams. Perhaps his best night came with Colonia y taking two points from Wavertree Labour with Phil beating Wayne Percival taking Mark Thomas to three sets and then linking up with Dave Williams to beat Roy Smith and Wayne Percival. Despite having no wins to their credit Liverpool Jewish too are still in with a chance of avoiding relegation. They took three points off Y. M. C. A. thanks to Eddy Cein beating Peter Lee and Julian Quirk beating Peter Turtle. Their best result is perhaps a draw with English Electric "A" with John Henshaw playing well to beat Rod McPherson. Propping up the bottom of the league yet having won four out of fourteen matches are Beauclair who have beaten all their closest rivals. Beauclair have perhaps a stronger all round team than other relegation threatened teams, but have suffered more from heavy defeats at the hands of the strongest teams. Much may depend on the rapidly improving form of Ted Birch illustrated lately by him taking the only point off Wavertree Labour by beating Dave Roberts and also giving Wayn Percival a very hard fight. It seems probable that the two relegated teams will come from Beauclair, Colonsay or Jewish with Trinity "A" and Bath Street as possible outsiders, but at the half way stage I wouldn't like to bet on the two unlucky ones.

As we have now reached the half-way point in the season there is a clearer indication of the contenders for the promotion/relegation places in the division. At the moment, there would appear to be four teams battling for the top two places. Old Swan and Linacre are trying to bounce back into the second division, but Y. M. C. A. 'C' and Cadwa have different ideas.

Harry Reeve (Linacre) has registered a series of good wins, taking two of Linacres 3 points in their 7-3 defeat by Cadwa. Linacre are a team strength in depth and constantly yo-yo between the second and third divisions.

Cadwa have had a few set-backs in recent weeks, dropping points to teams lower in the division, which has countered their excellent start to the season. However, their only defeat to date was suffered at the hands of Y. M. C. A. "C", another team challenging for honours, when they went down 6-4. Ken Roscoe (Y. M. C. A.) had convincing wins over Trevor Hughes and Rob Davies (Cadwa) and teamed up with Paul Reed Clayton to take the doubles. This closely-fought match, with 6 of the 10 games going to three sets, could have considerable bearing on the final position as the top teams are separated by so few points.

The other team up with the leaders is Old Swan, who have maintained a strong position in the division despite occasional difficulties in fielding their full team. Pete McAdam is their top player, adding the scalps of Harry Reeve (Linacre), Trevor Hughes (Cadwa) and Bill Hargreaves (Harding) to his already impressive collection.

English Electric "D" must rank as a good outside bet for promotion, following their recent 10-0 win over Dutchs they remain hot on the beels of the leaders. However, their match against Linacre resulted in a 7-3 defeat for the East Lancs team. despite good individual performances by Kevin Parker in beating Harry Reeve 21/14, 18/21, 21/12 and a nail-biting victory to Ro Craddock over Frank Lacey 20/22, 22/20, 25/23.

Dutchs and Harding, the two newly-promoted teams, appear to have secured their third division places as they seem likely to remain in the middle of the table. Both teams have had some good wins, but their recent confrontation went in Harding favour with a narrow 6-4 victory. Bill Hargreaves (Harding) took his customary two singles and teamed up with Dave Williams to beat Mal Green and George Files (Dutchs) in the doubles, and Phil Stenson also took his two singles for Harding in this match.

Further down the table there are a number of evenly-matched teams which has resulted in some very closely-fought games. Bath St. versus Trinity was one of the many matches where the points were equally shared. Mark Royden playing for Trinity is having a fine season and has underlined his good form with a convincing win over Alan Spencer (Bath St.) 21/16, 21/14.

Although my own team Maghull are in a somewhat unenviable position at the moment, there have been some good individual performances that deserve a mention. Andy Howarth at number one beat Ken Dutch 21/15, 21/10 and G. Hughes 21/5, 11/21, 21/14 and Alan Smethurst beat G. Hughes to give us 3 points in our 7-3 defeat. Eric Taylor was our star against Trinity, when he beat Steve Royden 21/11, 19/21, 21/19 and joined with Chris Roberts in the doubles to give us our only two points of the evening.

Cadwa "A" and Police "A" are another two teams occupying places in the middle of the table. When the teams met recently, the Police were the eventual victors with a 6-4 scoreline; Alan Wood took both his singles for the Police after close matches against Guy Garton and Ian Fletcher (Cadwa). Ian Fletcher has also recorded some good wins, his most impressive being the victories over Brian Cullen and Ro Craddock (English Electric) to account for Cadwa's only two points of that meeting.

Liverpool Jewish "B" have yet to finish on the winning side, despite draws against Dutchs and English Electric. L. Rosenbloom can usually be relyed upon to win both his singles, but Jewish have been unable to field their strongest side for every match and have therefore lost their recent matches.

All of a sudden it seems, we are well into the second leg of the season and almost into the really decisive matches which will finally settle the promotion and relegation issues once and for all.

The situation at the top of the division seems to have developed into a two horse race between Kirkby "A" and Wavertree Labour "D". Kirkby "A" seem determined to prove my original forecast wrong, and have opened up a very useful lead over Wavertree Labour and Waterloo Park who are currently second and third. Kirkby and Labour are

currently the only undefeated teams in the division and the final champions position could well be decided by the outcome of their match at Wavertree next week.

Waterloo Park "A" would appear to have blown their chances of promotion, unless they can put together a run of maximum point wins. Their drop from the top place is due, not so much as having lost one match, but rather to not taking the opportunity of collecting maximum points from the lower clubs, for instance they managed only minimum 6/4 wins over both Cadwa "B" and Bohemians, and that really is not good enough to gain promotion.

Trinity "G" are currently in 4th. place and are showing the way to their, on ranking at least, superiors Trinity "F". English Electric "F" have dropped from 4th to 5th. place, and I think this is largely due to the absence of Stan Draper through illness, although in father's absence young Jeff Draper has been turning in some very useful performances to keep the family flag flying.

At the other end of the division four teams are still fighting out the relegation battle. Vagabonds "A" have pulled themselves off the bottom, leaving Cadwa "B" in 13th. place, a feat I would not have thought possible a few weeks ago, however, the inclusion of Mike Gallagher at No. I seems to have strengthened the whole team. I am a little at a loss to explain why Cadwa "B" and Jewish "D" are struggling so badly, both teams contain useful and experienced players and I can only put their position down to loss of individual form.

WIE also drew with Maghull "E" with KEN ARMSON THE STAR! beat Reg Coxsey 16 in the third and Les Jones 8 & 13. Incredible! Seriously I'd like to put in pring my regard for Ken due to his devotion to our game and his unswerving loyalty to the club he helped to create and make into the big name it is in local table-tennis these days. You don't have to be a great player to make real contributions to the game. Well done, Ken.

Alongside this great Armson feat, all else seems insignificant. However R. Gordon also won two for Maghull, who played one short. Maghull had a good match with Bobs B, with 6 sets going to three. Coxsey & Gordon both beat Johnson and then combined to beat Johnson & Hutchinson but Bobs won 7-3. Eng ElecH put up a good fight against Moor Park before going down 9-1, with 5 sets going to three. Andy Byrne was the lone winner, but Nigel Conquest came close, losing 18-21 26-24 19-21 to M. West-Jones. The Bath St G v Eng Elec H match ended up 7-3 for Bath St after a great struggle, with seven sets having deuce games or 19. Heroes for Bath St were Mike Nelson & Erika Williams, with two singles each and the doubles together. Les Travis was Barker & Dobson's only winner against Moor Park with a good win over D. Hudson.

With Plessey not entering, it has been left to Vemon Sangster and Courtaulds to carry our banner to the semi-finals of the Stamp Cup. Vemon Sangster play the 5B champions - elect St. Francis de Sales and Courtaulds take on Rafters "C" from division 6. With a bith of luck it will be an all 5A final, with Vemon Sangster the strong favourites after their decisive league victory.

DIVISION 5B KEN ARMSON

Pride of place this issue must go to St. Francis, consistent as always I wrote them off as an ordinary team fortunate to be in a weak division. Now I have to once again eat my words after their magnificent display against V. Sangs. In the Stamp Cub semifinal. They lost after two drawn matches by the margin of four games. A fine display against a team who probably anticipated another easy victory and who were forced in the replay to resort to the now familiar tactic spreading to most clubs of bringing in a stronger player from a supposedly lower team. So much for ranking lists, as no doubt Old Swan are aware having had the same thing happen to them.

In both matches they won both doubles, which was no mean feat, and in the replay D. Tagg gained revenge with a two straight win over les French in reply to his two straight defeat by the same player in the first match. A great all round team effort which deserved a better reward.

In the league we have now reached the crucial stage when mistakes can prove costly and difficult to retrieve as Way. Lab. "F" are finding out to their cost. After defeating V. Sang "A" 7-3 the met Wat. Pk. "B" and Aighurth "A" and could only manage two draws. They followed this with a re-match against Maghull who had previously conceded a 10-0 walkover. Their generous gesture blew up in their face when their No. 1 failed to turn up and although a reserve was available precious sets were squandered. The price for remembering that we are here to play table tennis and not to claim w/overs could well be a coslty one, so if you see a head rolling down Picton Road, take care, for it might well be mine. Ideals can be hard to live with!!

Wat. Pk. "B" have also had weak moments and came a cropper against Maghull "D" losing 6-4. This all helps Aighurth "A" who have now emerged as the most likely contenders for that precious 3rd place. They proved this with a 7-3 victory over Wat. Pk. "B" away. They have shown themselves to be more consistent than their rivals and this is what will count most.

The table willprobably read St. Francis, V. Sang. "A"; Aigburth "A"; Wat. Pk. "B"; Wav. lab. "F" and Maghull "D" with the rest trailing along behind.

In spite of their defeat by Wav. Lab. "F"; V. Sang. "A" have no problems. They cannot overtake St. Francis having lost to them twice, and are themselves in no danger of being overtaken. This is mainly due to the fact that none of the other contenders are strong enough to pose any threat, and are far too busy cutting each others throats.

It is interesting to note that Paul Gittins who is a regular member of this team is the player dropped by V. Sangs. in the cup replay against St. Francis. One could well ask why a player ranked in the 2nd team is dropped for a player ranked in the 4th team but capable of winning two of the five sets won by the 1st team. One could well ask if the real V. Sangs 1st team player would please stand up.? Or is win at all costs even for players of repute playing in lower divisions now becoming the accepted thing. I wonder what the late Bill Stamp would have made of this?

Down at the bottom nothing has changed much and it still looks like Colonsay "D"; Vags. "B" or Halewood for relegation. This, incidentally, will be the first time we

have had any relegation from the 5th divs. and as we have a full division two teams will go down, always assuming there will be a 6th div. left for them to go into.

For Vags. the best performances have come from Dave Rooney, and for Colonsay it is Mike Harford. Twice he has won a lone set to avoid another 10-0 defeat and against Wat. Pk. "C" he was the only player to turn up and only narrowly lost in the 3rd. in one of his sets. W'loo Pks. team arrangements were rather confusing and this could account for the walkovers their teams have received. For Halewood P. Bretherton seems to be their best sets winners.

The Police continue to encounter fluctuating fortunes accompanied by team changes. Ken McClaren, Jim Conroy and Frank Greaney figure prominently all sharing in the sets won. Their best performance was against Wat. Pk. "B" when they won 6-4 helped by a treble for G. Wilde.

DIVISION 6 LES FRENCH

Police "F" and Y. M. C. A. "D" continue to dominate this division. Neither could gain the upper hand when they played each other. Y. M. C. A. established a 4-0 lead only for Police to fight back and gain a draw. Hero was captain Eric Ferguson with wins over David Ng and Billy Wardle. Surprise was the double defeat of Peter Kavanagh by Ng and Dominic Tai, who also beat Albert Baker for a great double. Police saved the day by winning both doubles. As expected Vernon Sangster "B" have gradually overhauled Courtaulds "A" and should finish third. Basil Townsend was their mainstay when they beat Y. M. C. A. 6-4. YM's only defeat to date. Vernon Sangster "B" lost by the same score to Police "F" with Peter Kavanagh in great form although he was severely tested by Dave Aimson, who lost 27/25 in the third. The return match ended in a draw, with V. S. leading 5-4 and Basil to play Eric Ferguson. Eric saved the day for Police to avenge an earlier defeat by Basil and preserve his sides unbeaten

record. Roger Bennion was Vernon Sangster's mainstay with two singles wins and the doubles with Basil. Young Adam Bennion had an extremely good win over Albert Baker. Their first match will probably be the hardest contested match all season, with NINE sets going to three and the other having a deuce game. Beat. that. Courtaulds "A" suffered a set-back when hammered 8-2 by Police "F" with only John Tilley winning a singles, beating Steve Streets. The only serious opposition came from Frank Watt (he should play for the Police with a name like that) who lost 22-20 in the third to Steve and from Mike Hughes, who lost 22-24 20-22 to Eric Ferguson. Police "E" must think its Christmas with Longreach "A" presenting them with a 10-0 walkover as did Courtaulds "A" earlier on. These scores against promotion contenders have given Police "E" a higher position than they might have expected and have seriously reduced the other sides chances, as, of course, they deserve for failing to turn up. Longreach "A" have a useful side, looked after by Robert Fairclough, who's a useful player. Graham Leatherbarrow has a good record and should go far but there seems a lack of real committment from some of the other team members. Pat Harrison is a useful player who showed her talents when holding Dominic Tai to 19 in the third in Longreach's 7-3 defeat by YM "D". Graham Leatherbarrow & Tony Windle both beat George Lee and combined to beat Lee & Wardle in the doubles. Longreach were lucky to get Maghull to agree to replay a match after conceding another walkover. They won 7-3, with stiff resistance from Crompton (2) and Leece (1). They Lost 7-3 to Vernon Sangster "B", Townsend 2, Roger Bennion 2, and then fell 6-4 to Vemon Sangster "C" for whom Peter Davies and Chris Ford both won two singles. These results virtually put them out of the race for honours. Police "F" have a useful side, even without those walkovers. Albert Baker had a good double against Rafters "C", including a good win over Jean Reynolds, who gained revenge by beating Steve Redrobe 16, 3. Steve made amends by beating Pauline Lawrenson 13 in the third. Its a funny game. Tich John Harris won two for Police.

Bootle "A" have a good side but were unlucky to find Kavanagh (2) and Streets (1) in the Police "E" team, going down 6-4. John Moore also won two for Police. Mal Dixon was Bootle's star with two singles, including a good 21/19; 17/21; 23/21 win over fast-improving Steve Streets. Bootle also lost 6-4 to Vernon Sangster "B", with Adam Bennion starring for VSB with singles wins over Mal Dixon (22-20 in the third) and Jackie Wilson (19 in the third) George Wilson got two for Bootle with Dave Burton recording a great win over Basil Townsend. Adam also saved the day for VSB when they turned out a weakened side against Rafters "C" and lost 6-4, earlier in the season. Adam showed his talent to overcome the slow but consistent Janet Davies and then the quick hitting of Sue Smith.

Vernon Sangster "C", at their strongest, are as good as anyone in this division, with rising star Peter Davies an adequate replacement for Basil Townsend. They beat Police "E" 6-4, even though they included Eric Ferguson & Marie Lupton, with double wins for Peter and the rapidly improving John Greene, who looks to be a first division player of the future. Mike Delahunty won a singles and the doubles with John for a good team effort. VSC lost 7-3 to Police "F", but had a weaker team out. John and the likeable Barry Mounsey, who must be the greatest 'character' in the division, both had good wins over John Gregory.

Rafters "C" had a good match with Longreach "A", before going down 7-3. NINE of the games went to duece or 19. Graham Leatherbarrow beat Sue Smith 25/23; 22/20 and Pauline Lawrenson 21/14; 24/22 for good measure. Eileen Mansell put in a rare appearance for Rafters and had two good wins over Bob Fairclough and Pat Harrison, whom she beat 19 in the third.

At the lower end of the table Barker & Dobson "A" willbe wooden spoonists but are pleasant, friendly opponents. They managed a draw with Maghull "F" with two singles wins for J. Jones and one each for John Brannigan and Marlow. Crompton & Leece won two each for Maghull and took the doubles. BDA lost 10-0 to Longreach, but five sets went to three, with Brannigan losing only 19 in the third to Windle.

Aigburth "B" should finish next to bottom. They took a creditable three sets from Police "F", with P.Knight getting wins over Lyons & Ironside. He seems their best player and was the only one to put up a fight against Vernon Sangster "C" before losing 16/21; 28/26; 17/21 to the promising Mark Reed.

The Young Action "A" side had a great 7-3 victory over Maghull "F". E. Harrison won two singles, including a victory over Leece and was well-supported by T. Dixon who also won 2. E. Harrison won their only set against Rafters "C" with a great win over Jean Reynolds, who is never easy to beat. For Wav. Lab. "G", Dolan & Feerick seem to be picking up sets regularly. Feerick had a good double against VSC, beating Steve Jones 23/21; 26/24 and Marty Finnigan 17, 8. Chris Ford had a good double over Dolan and that great star of division 5A, Ken Armson.

In closing I'd like to say that I think its a pity that the league didn't create THREE FIFTH DIVISIONS instead of a sixth. The standard of play of the top EIGHT teams is better than a large proportion of those in 5A & 5B and, after all, the fifth & sixth divisions were chosen arbitrarily, in effect. It is soul—destroying to think that the talent in the leading sides in this division will have earned FIFTH division table-tennis next season for all their hard work.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

There are two topics that I'd like to raise with the league authorities.

- 1. Composition of our representative teams.
- 2. Vacancies in divisions other than the lowest one.
- Speaking as a coach of ten years experience and most of that with junior players. I
 am very concerned at the present trends in team selection for the Liverpool sides in
 the Lancashire & Cheshire League.

As anyone involved with young players knows, the first aim of all youngsters who take their table-tennis seriously is to try to obtain a place in the Liverpool Junior side. This is one of the chief motivations for a lot of hard work and dedication. Of course, their are others, but with travelling expenses being what they are, it isn't possible, except for a few, to travel to too many tournaments.

What do we find at present? TWO out of THREE players in the Junior team are from outside the city, leaving our young hopefuls, who attended the trials and just missed out, on the sidelines with only an outside chance of achieving their ambitions. One of the players also plays for our senior teams, too, further reducing the chances of our local players. I have nothing against the individuals involved, who are extremely good players, but I think we are selling our own players short. Do we really want RHYL to win the Lancashire & Cheshire League? The Mens "A" team is in the same position, with two out of three outsiders init. To give an individual case, what about the position of Phil Thompson of Colonsay, Last season, Phil worked very hard indeed on his game, which developed so much that he was a match for anyone in the league, including wins over our imported stars. He played for the Mens "A" team against Barrow, winning all three sets, whereas Clive Strettle of Wigan only managed two, as did Peter Lee. For the next match Phil is dropped in favour of a Rhyl player. I know the dissapointment this was for Phil after he had earned his place and I think it is wrong. Furthermore the players involved are young enough to keep our own youngsters out of representative games for some years to come. In my opinion it is too big a price to pay for an extra bit of success. GIVE OUR OWN YOUNGSTERS A CHANCE.

My other grouch is about the empty places in the lower divisions of the league. There is one vacancy in 3A, one in 4A, one in 4B, one in 5A, two in 5B and a FULL SIXTH division. Rule 22 states that the committee have the power, when a vacancy exists, to promote a team into a high division. Everybody knows that the Plessey & Vernon Sangster sides in division 5A are out of their class. Its no fun for powerful teams entering the league to thrash inexperienced players every week. This will happen until they reach the correct division and their presence lower down just spoils everyone's enjoyment. The argument is put forward that it might upset other teams if one or two are allowed to leapfrog a couple of divisions. After due regard to the playing strengths of such teams IT IS IN EVERYONE'S INTEREST TO PROMOTE THEM IF IN THE COMMITTEE'S OPINION THEY MERIT A PLACE HIGHER UP. If there are other teams of comparable standard, let the committee make a decision as to which team or teams are the most deserving case. I'm sure that all clubs would be willing to stand by their decisions. I know that with new clubs it is hard to assess

their strength, but if this is known, particularly if registrations are produced, they should be considered for a higher division IF THERE IS A VACANCY.

What I'd like to see is an amendment to Rule 22 to the effect that the Committee SHOULD fill up vacancies in divisions. I know that it can be difficult with keying in fixtures, but it is preferable for a club secretary to reorganise their match nights etc. to try to avoid these empty places. While we are at it, lets put an end to the practice of teams dropping out AT THE LEAGUE MEETING. This is a perennial headache for Eddie & John, who do a great job, and it is totally unnecessary. There is no reason why clubs should not inform the league at least a week before the handbook meeting. If so, their own organisation needs looking into.

IMPOSE HEFTY FINES ON CLUBS WHO DROP OUT AT THE LAST MINUTE. Their lack of courtesy to the rest of us is what causes vacancies in divisions. Would the Committee care to consider what league rules would need to be amended to bring about changes such as this?

assess whether or not any teams qualify to fill any vacancies which have occurred. I'M convinced that if Rule 22 was used in this way, as a policy, that it would improve our league set-up. What do you think?

Finally, one or two other points for your consideration. I'm not happy at the creation of a SIXTH division, which further retards the progress of new teams. This year, I have seen nearly all the teams in 5A, 5B & div. 6 and it is tough luck on many of the div. 6 sides to win their division for the glittering prize of promotion to the <u>fifth</u> division. Eight of the div. 6 teams have a chance of promotion and most of these are considerably better teams than the bottom half-dozen in each of the fifth divisions. It would have been better to create another fifth division, of equal status, although I appreciate that it might have needed a change in league rules. Could it be changed for future years?

My last point concerns promotion and relegation. The league rules state clearly that the bottom two teams (except div. 2) will be relegated. I can think of occasions in the past when, if a team drops out, creating a vacancy, only ONE team has been relegated, treating the absent team as relegation candidates. In my view this is wrong and two teams should ALWAYS be relegated. After all, the purpose of promotion & relegation is to make it possible for teams to reach the correct standard of play. In only very rare cases would we find that the next to bottom side of a third or fourth division is as good as the top few of the next division lower down. The bottom two teams were all relegated last season but this has not always been the case. e.g. Three seasons ago, in 4A, Bath St. "G" finished 12th out of 13 (I vacancy) and retained their 4th division status. Police "C", who finished bottom, ended up in 4B. Explain that one. The following season, Bath St. "G" finished 13th again and WERE relegated this time. Obviously they were more suited to the lower division and should have been relegated first time, not to mention that a better team would have taken their 4th division place.

Could we make it obligatory for TWO teams ALWAYS to be relegated. It seems to me that the rules already state this and yet it isn't always done. Anyone care to comment?
