EDITORIA L

A well thought out epistle in the last Digest came from the pen of les French with many relevant and forthright points. Obviously the first half must receive more than my blessing as he backs up the points in my first Editorial.

But where do we start to say that players may represent the City and and when they may not. Do we bar them from Hong Kong and Taiwan, ruling out Paul Tsang? Outside England John McNee, Mark Thomas, Mark Byles, Gregg Powell? Outside Merseyside Tony Clayton?, outside Liverpool? If we do, where do we start and finish. In my book a player who registers and opts for Liverpool is a Liverpool Player and the higher the standard of these players the better it is for all players particularly the young ones, and all these players have to do is play better than the best. Having said that perhaps on team selection there must be points of contention. Do you pick your strongest available team or do you pick your team that is available all the time even if it includes your 3-7 and 12 ranked players.

Although my last point brings in a personal note (club wise) I would make the point regardless and it does apply in some degree to many other players. A player who opted for Liverpool was born in Liverpool, schooled in Liverpool, has been a 101% clubman in Liverpool for about seven years and has fallen in line with every whim of the selectors and still you label him - Clive Strettle - an outsider. So if a player lives outside the City when or how does he become a Liverpool player according to your reckoning?

Thanks for your effort Les, it is nice to have someone else shooting off instead of me, particularly with so much thought going into your script.

How deplorable that a few of our leading players failed to enter our Closed Champion-ships. I feel that they owe it to the organisers, the league, the younger players and the spectators to make this our outstanding competition and social event of the season, they failed us all miserably. A few had good reasons, the Welsh players for instance were committed to a Welsh tournament but for most of the others no excuse and black marks.

In Manchester we had Hankeys, Schofield, Darcy, Donlon, Bowen and England ranked number six John Hilton, the ladies were lead by England International Susan Lisle also Janet Deakin, Di Schofield, Marie Leigh - what a difference in attitudes.

DIVISION ONE "HARRY"

Wavertree Labour's massive lead at the top of the table has crushed interest at that end except for runners up positions. Dave Roberts is now amply filling in Greg Powell's place so that most of the points lost are now from substitutes. Wayne Percival, who has so far only lost two at the time of writing, has missed a number of matches. Standing in for him Mick Tierney dropped the only singles point to Alec Sill of English Electric 'A', 18-21 in the third set. Keith Fitzimmons came in to complete 10-0 thrashing of Y. M. C. A. "A" and Phil Luxon lost the only point against Trinity A going down to Mike Keane who also just missed out against Roy Smith 21-23 in the third set.

Running for second place are Palmerston, Rafters and Y. M. C. A. and it now looks to be finishing in that order. Rafters have strengthened their team by cajoling Greg Powell from Wavertree Labour and they demonstrated this in beating Palmerston 7-3. Trevor Manning beat Ron Brotherton and Alec Bryce and linked with Greg to win their doubles. Gordon Exell lived dangerously beating Brian Davey in the third set then Alec Bryce 25-23 in the third. Keith Williams replied for Rafters beating John Fennah and Greg Powell comfortably. Rafters turned out a weaker team against Trinity in a match where Eric Hardman played hard to get by dropping to number three position where he beat Gordon Exell and Neil Roberts. John Fennah helped Rafters to a 6-4 win beating Steve Williams and Ricky Brown. Y. M C.A. have been struggling to turn out their strongest team all season and subsequently have slipped badly against weaker opposition. This was illustrated by a 2-8 defeat at the hands of their A team. In this match Alan Pickering beat Peter Turtle and Francis Lay beat Malcolm Pu. Against Trinity, Y.M C.A. struggled to a 6-4 win with Ricky Brown beating Peter Tuttle and Francis Lay 21-19 in the third set. This was not Peter's night as he went down 22-24 in the third to Eric Hardman.

A bunch of teams next in the table include English Electric, Wavertree Labour A, English Electric A and Trinity. Mark Byles continues his fine first season in Liverpool beating Keith Fitzimmons and Mick Tierney of Labour A in a 6-4 win for Electric. Clive Strettle also took two singles wins over Keith and Phil Luxon. Electric'c best result is a 6-4 win over Palmerston with Mark Byles beating Keith Williams and Brian Davey and Graeme Black beating Ron Brotherton 21-18 in the third set and Brian Davey also 21-18 in the third. Without Mark they struggled to draw with Trinity with Clive Strettle going down to Eric Hardman 21-19, 18-21. 22-24. Keith Fitzimmons, who must play in more leagues than anyone in the country, has taken over from Dave Roberts in the Labour A team. He beat Eric Hardman 22-20 in the third set, but lost to Steve Williams. Ricky Brown saw Trinity to a 6-4 win beating Malcolm McEvoy and Mick Tiemey 23-21 in the third set. Labour A lost 4-6 to Y.M.C.A. with

Phil Luxon beating MalcolmPu and Peter Lee 25-23 in the third set. English Electric A fought out a drawn match with Labour A thanks to Fred Pheysey beating Malcolm McEvoy and Mike Tiemey. Fred also easily beat Francis Lay and Steve Farr in a 7-3 win over Y. M. C. A. Harry Johnson seems to be turning out fairly regularly now for Y. M. C. A. "A" and he beat Rod McPherson, but went down narrowly 19-21 in the third to Alec Sill.

Just keeping out of relegation trouble are Trinity A and Bath Street. Trinity A lost 4-6 to Electric A with Alec Sill beating Alan Chase 21-19 in the third set and Mike Keane. Against Palmerston they tumed out with only half a team and managed to snatch a point through Alan Chase beating Brian Davey. Alan led Trinity to a 7-3 win against Colonsay with a 19-21, 21-19, 21-18 win over Phil Thomson and to a draw against Y. M. C. A. A by beating Francis Lay and Steve Farr. Bath Street are still ably led by Dave Butterworth. Although losing 4-6 to Y. M. C. A. Dave beat Peter Turtle and George Smith. Against Rafters he beat John Fennah and Gordon Exell with a further point from S. Chen beating Alan Timewell. Chen picked up the only singles win for Bath Street against Palmerston by beating Brian Davey and he led Bath Street to a 8-2 win over Colonsay by beating Phil Thomson 15-21, 21-19, 22-20.

Lastly we come to the three teams who are more involved in fighting off relegation. Beauclair, unlike Y. M. C. A. "A" of the promoted teams from Division II have continued with the same side and with a better show of resolution and adaption to the higher standard have achieved better results since Christmas e.g. 8-2 over Jewish and 7-3 against Trinity A. Their good teamwork support has shown in better doubles results illustrated against Trinity, where two doubles wins and singles from Ted Birch against Mike Trueman in expedite and myself against Ricky Brown saw Beauclair pick up four valuable points. Colonsay's problems in turning out a regular team has been aggravated by the loss of Dave Williams for a number of matches, through a bereavement. Against English Electric A with only three players Phil Thomson beat Mark Byles 16-21, 24-22, 21-18 but lost to Clive Strettle 19-21, 21-23. Against Jewish they drew in a match which avoided many issues with Jewish reversing their order. Sue Alexander avenged a previous defeat against Julian Quirk whilst John Henshaw had a good win over Phil Thomson. Against Palmerston Eddy Clein assumed a more correct position at number one to beat Brian Davey and Keith Williams and taking the doubles with Julian Quirk. However, a 2-8 defeat at the hands of Beauclair with a disgruntled Eddy Clein losing to Mick Allen and Frank Murphy in expedite has just about finished Jewish's chances of staying in the division.

DIVISION TWO

It appears that the Palmerston youngsters have the league sewn up with the challenge coming from Palmerston "A", Kirkby and Rafters "A" for 2nd place.

DIVISION 3A

At the time of writing these notes the final promotion and relegation places remain

undecided, but just a few teams are in contention for honours or "the wooden spoon". The champion place is probably between Old Swan and Linacre, the latter having the edge at the moment.

Linacre, the team that constantly bobs between the second and third divisions, have great strength in depth, losing only a few games all season. Harry Reeve at number one has proved to be the division's top player, but Linacres strength is such that they could call upon equally proficient players on the rare occasion that Harry was unavailable. Messrs. Lacey, Ainsworth, Davidson and Davidson have notched up a series of good wins and together make a very worthy championship team.

The other team trying to make a speedy return to the second division is Old Swan Boys Club, who have been hot on the heels of Linacre all season and just as consistent. Pete McAdam and Pete Dobbs have both had an excellent season and Ken Linforth and Bill Richardson have continued improving all season.

Despite a whirlwind start to the season Cadwa have slipped away during the second half and it now appears unlikely that they will make second division status. So once more Trevor and Co. fall at the final hurdle. However, this must not detract from some good individual performances within the team. Robin Brackley has improved with every game, recently beating Wally Sill and Ro Craddock in Cadwa's 6-4 victory over English Electric.

English Electric have maintained good form through-out the season and Kevin, Wally, Ro and Brian have only missed a handful of games between them. In a recent meeting with Trinity, the East Lancs team emerged with a very commendable 10-0 victory, but their present form may have come too late to make an impact on the top places.

Liverpool Y. M. C. A. was another team that started the season with a flourish but have fallen back in recent weeks. Kenny Roscoe can usually be relied upon to win both his singles, with good wins over A. Wood and R. McMas ters (Police) and G. Hughes and M. Green (Dutch's), though Mal Green went to 21/19 in the third before losing. Y. M. C. A. 's other young player, Jos Yau, shows great potential and will soon be a force to be reckoned with should his current rate of improvement be maintained.

The middle of the table is occupied by several teams of equal strength, with little to chose between Police 'A'. Harding, Dutch's and Bath St. 'C'. The Police team always prove to be good opponents in victory or defeat; Merseyside Police Chamption, George Wright, has had a good season, winning both his games in the 5-5 draw with Harding, (must be that devastating back-hand ???). Alan Wood (Police) became one of the few players to beat Kevin Parker (English Electric), when he took the game 14/21, 21/16, 21/15.

Despite their excellent cup run, Bath St. 'C' have levelled out in the middle of the table, but an enjoyable and sporting match is always guaranteed against this team. Dave Cunningham had a nail-biting 20/22, 21/19, 19/21 victory over Ken Dutch. In the same match Alan Spencer and Ken Foulkes won all their games, again illustrating their good form; Brian Cunningham makes up the fourth member of the team and a quick check through the score cards would appear to show that none of the team have missed a match this season.

Newcomers to the division Harding and Dutch's have displayed their determination to retain their places with a series of good results. Dutch's are another very settled team and seldom have to call upon reserves. Mal Green was man-of-the-match in Dutch's game against Linacre, when he got Dutch's only two points beating Frank Lacey 21/19, 21/17 and A Davidson 21/10, 21/11.

Bill Hargreaves (Harding) has regularly taken both his singles and teamed up with Dave Williams to form a formidable partnership in the doubles. In a recent game against Maghull's Eric Taylor, Dave Williams and Eric had a rally of 143 shots duration (full marks to Mike Elson as the long-suffering umpire). This sounds like some sort of record, unless, of course, you know differently.

At the bottom end of the table, there are three teams battling to clear the "danger zone": Liverpool Jewish waited a long time for their first win of the season, but now they have found new form as their recent 9-1 victory over Cadwa 'A' will testify.

L. Rosenbloom beat A. Gamett and R. McMasters (Police) to take 2 of the 3 points in Jewish's 7-3 defeat by Police.

Cadwa 'A' are also struggling, but in a relegation battle with Liverpool Jewish they only managed to collect one point, thanks to Ian Fletcher, who beat Lee Soon 21/13, 20/22, 21/18,

Although this is my first as Div. 3A correspondent, it could also be my last, as my own team, Maghull, are in a rather unenviable position at the moment. Chris Roberts and Andy Howarth have been forced to miss a few games recently through illness and injury, but we wish them a speedy return. In the meantime, Eric Taylor and Alan Amethurst have both won some good games. Eric was inspired in beating Pete McAdam (Old Swan) 24/22, 22/20 and Alan registered a close win over Trevor Hughes (Cadwa) 18/21, 21/15, 21/23.

I don't know if it is a sign of approaching old age, but it seems to me that this season is passing more quickly than any other I can remember, and suddenly there are only five weeks left to the end of the season. Five weeks which will be the most decisive of the season for some teams, those involved in the promotion and relegation battles.

I am now firmly convinced that Kirkby 'B' will be divisional champions, which with my record for tipping is probably akin to the kiss of death, but as the team that has been on top right from the start, I feel they deserve the title, and I am sure they will more than hold their own in the Third Division. DIVISION 5A LES FRENCH

As Plessey, Vernon Sangster and Longreach have swept aside all opposition for promotion, the only real interest left is the fight to avoid the second relegation spot. lewish 'E', with 19 sets from 16 games are way behind and it seems a fight between Way, Lab. 'E' and Eng. Elec. 'H' to avoid the other place, with Bath St. 'G', Maghull 'E' and Barker & Dobson on the fringe. Elec. 'H' gave their chances a shot in the arm by beating Way. Lab 'E' 6-4, with Andy Byme and Nigel Conquest each getting two for Electric, and Amy Bell two for Wav. Lab. 'E'. A gritty performance by Nigel, beating W. Stanley -17, 22-20, 22-20 and Monica O Donnell 22-20, -16, 21-15. In the Elec. v Maghull 'E' match, Nigel lost 21-23, 25-27 to Reg Coxsey but his side managed a draw, thanks to another double from Andy and one each from Jack Lambert and Paul Cleary, who beat R. Gordon 29-27, 15. Reg Coxsey won his two for Maghull. Bath St. 'G' beat Elec. 6-4 with Ted Jane and Andy Armstrong winning two each and John Wright taking one and the doubles with Andy. Bath St. 'G' beat Jewish 'E' 9-1 with Raymond Polak saving the whitewash. Wav. Iab. 'E's chances were reduced by an 8-2 defeat by Barker & Dobson. Only Monica O'Donnell managed a singles win. Peter Greaves did well to beat Milly Harris and Monica in this match. Barker & Dobson beat Bath St. 'G' 7-3 (Greaves 2). A good win for Mike Nelson over Fred O'Sullivan 16 in the third and a great performance by Any Armstrong to beat Les Travis 19 in the third.

Maghull 'E' gave their chances a boost with a great draw against Courtaulds. Reg Coxsey won two and his doubles, with Les Jones beating Les Higham, and R. Gordon beating Gibson. Vemon Sangster turned out their 'B' team from division 6 against Maghull and won 10-0 convincingly, with only Les Jones going close against the Bennions, Roger and Adam. This result shows the strength of division 6, with Vemon Sangster 'B' currently third. Jewish 'E' did well to get three sets off Boh's 'B' and it could easily have been a draw, John McKim losing 22-24 in the third to A. Jones, and Stuart Polak 19 in the third to Jones. Stuart made amends by beating C. Johnson 22-20 in the third and John beat the promising C. Quilliam 15 in the third. John had a great win over Peter Overend of Plessey 22-20 in the third for Jewish's only set. Bath St. 'G' had a great 6-4 win over Moor Park with John Wright, Ted Jane & Andy Armstrong each taking two singles. The score could easily have been reversed with Wright scraping home 22-20, 26-24 against J. Jones and Andy winning 23-21 in the third against Mark West Jones.

In mid-table Boh's 'B' did well to take 3 sets off Longreach. Lots of high scores in this match, including two narrow wins by Frankie Fogg. He beat V. Carroll 12, 20-22, 21-19 and C. Quilliam, who is proving hard to beat, 17, 24-22. Richie Heath-rington had a strange night. After beating Hutchinson 19 in the first, he lost 21-3 and then 22-20 in the third. Then, against C. Quilliam, he lost 21-9, recovered to win 21-19 in the second but lost 18 in the third.

Barker & Dobson did well to hold Elec. Supply 'B' to a draw. Les Travis had a great win over Charlie Blackburn 24-22, 21-13. Fred O'Sullivan beat Eddie Cameron 16, 22-20 and Peter Greaves beat R. Conley. Barkers took both doubles for a fine result.

Geoff Blackburn won two for Elec. Supply 'B'.

I can now give you a few averages (from the cards I've received to date). (Min. sets 20). Trevor Owens is still undefeated, winning 20, losing O. Les French 43-1, Bill Harris 40-1, Fred Price 27-1, Les Griffin 23-3, Stan Harvey 19-3, Paula French 36-8, Tony Mulhally 29-7, Pete Jackson 26-8, Bob Edwards 24-7, Geoff Blackburn 18-4, Alan Leigh 21-6, Kevin Davies 18-5, Frankie Fogg 26-10, Richie Heatherington 23-11, Paul Adams 13-7, Eddie Cameron 15-8.

Our two teams, Vemon Sangster & Courtaulds did make it to the Stamp Cup final, after a struggle. V.S. defeated 5B champions-elect St. Francis deSales on games after two draws, whilst Courtaulds saw off Rafters C from div. 6. Rafters C are about 7th in div. 6, further underlining the strength of that division. Vemon Sangster went on to win the final 9-1, the same score as the league encounter.

In addition to averages, it is often interesting to find out which players have won most sets for their teams, i.e. turning out and winning regularly. Quilliam for BohsB, Williams & Hudson for Moor Park, Travis & O'Sullivan for Barker & Dobson, Byrne for E.E.H. Monica O'Donnell for W.L.E. Ted Jane for B.S.G, Reg Coxsey for Maghull and finally John McKim for Jewish.

DIVISION 5B KEN ARMS ON

As we have known all season St. Francis and V. Sangs. 'A' have got this division sewn up, but the few sets they have lost to the clubs battling it out for 3rd place could well decide who gets there, so close are they running each other.

At the time of writing Way. Lab. 'F' are in 3rd place with 118; with Wat. Pk. 'C' and Aigburth 'A' on 113 all from 19 played. Obviously this will have changed when you read these notes, it may well even be settled.

Nevertheless these three teams are all aware of the situation and striving for those extra sets and finding that the going is not always as easy as it looks. The position is made more difficult as none of them appears able to turn out a regular settled team. This has cost sets all round.

Wat. Pk. 'C' and Aiburth 'A' suffered a setback when they faced Police 'D' with Wat. Pk. being soundly beaten 8-2 and Aigburth only managing a draw. George Wilde (Police) winning all six of his sets. Aigburth also dropped 4 sets to Wat. Pk. 'B' intent on helping their fellow clubmates.

Wav. Lab. 'F' also had their setbacks, only managing a draw with Action Comm. and a draw with Wat. Pk. 'B'; but doing better against Police with a 7-3 win. Against Wat. Pk. 'B' the Meyer brothers again caused them problems winning a singles each and then combining in the doubles to take a third. Their doubles record is one of the best in this division.

All three teams have an interesting run in with Wav. Iab. being on their two blank weeks then finishing with Wat. Pk. 'C' and Maghull 'D'. Wat. Pk. 'C' have a hard finish which I think will put them right out of the running, with fixtures against St. Francis, Maghull 'D': Wav. Iab. 'F' and V. Sangs. 'A'. A formidable list and if they get enough sets from that lot they will be well worthy of the 3rd place. To compensate for this hard run-in they have received 10/0 w/overs from Police 'D' and Halewood with Colonsay 'D' only turning up with two players. Even their own 'B' team played short against them. Aigburth 'A' have to face Action Comm. and Police 'D', but also have Colonsay 'D' and Halewood to look forward to and are the best placed of the three for a strong finish.

What of Action Comm? At present in 7th place and a thorn in the side of all three named contenders they are in deep trouble with the Management Committee, having again been reported for playing a player who had previously played for them under another name. I understand the Management Committee accepted their explanation of the first incident and took into account the very worthwhile task being performed by Action Committee in providing recreation facilities for these youngsters. This latest incident, which is the third, puts this offence in a different light. Can we afford to accept a club who seem intent on breaking the rules whenever it suits them. It also raises the query as to how many other occasions have they played players under an assumed name. One thing appears certain, if they are expelled and I, personally, can see no other alternative, it could affect the promotion issue as they have had varying results against the three teams involved. We shall also lose some very promising players and a fairly strong team.

Maghull 'D' and Police 'D' will take the next two places, both being good teams but lacking that little extra to get in front. Maghulls' problem is weakness in the tail. Harry McGanity and Alan Rycroft are winning regularly with some good support from R. Cockcroft at No. 3. but the No. 4. spot is very weak.

Police have shared their sets with Frank Greaney, George Wilde and Jim Conroy performing well, but the best performances have come from Ken McLaren. They too have had a hand in deciding who will finish 3rd.

At the bottom Vags. 'B' have no chance to avoid being the very bottom team in the league, but in Dave Rooney they have one of the best players in the division. Since his regular appearance at the halfway stage he has taken sets, frequently two, from all the top teams and crowned this with a singles win against St. Francis beating J. Armstrong, 17 in the 3rd. He may not have had winning support from his team mates, but he has had regular support. I would sooner have a player who turns up every week and never wins, than one who wins regularly, but plays only when it suits him. They have blotted their record only once by conceding a 10/0 w/over to Wat. Pk. 'B'. This raises an interesting point. Does the fact that the two Wat. Pk. teams have both collected two 10/0 w/overs have any connection with their late change in venues and match nights or is it because no-one likes travelling to Trinity? As Trinity is nearer than Wat. Pk. I am inclined to the view that it is the change in venue and matchnights which is the cause as their 'A' in div. 4A have also received a 10/0 w/over, and this from a very reliable team from Rafters.

Colonsay 'D' and Halewood have stretched the gap with Vags, with Halewood being the better of the two teams. Their clash left things undecided as Colonsay were one short, but still managed to win four of the seven sets played. We will have to wait until the final match to see who will come out best in terms of a result against each other.

DIVISION 6. LES FRENCH

YMCA 'D' and Police 'F are having a private battle for the championship. I fancy YM might win it now that Denis Corkery has taken over from George Lee. Had this move been made earlier. I think that YM would have had a clear lead by now. Police 'F' depend so much on the great form of Peter Kavanagh and Eric Ferguson. What a great season Eric's having for someone with artificial hip joints.

These two are being hotly pursued by the fast-improving Vernon Sangster 'B side, who, under the able captaincy of Roger Bennion, have opened up a clear gap in third place, but have no real chance of catching the other two. Courtaulds 'A' seem to have 4th place sewn up, but what a scrap after that. With gaps in higher divisions, it seems that seven teams go up. The remaining three places are being hotly contested by five teams, so two will be unlucky. If I have to stick my neck out, I'll predict that Vernon Sangster 'C' will finish 5th, followed by Longreach 'A', Police 'E', Bootle A & Rafters 'C'. I think that Rafters will miss out because, although they have a well-balanced side, they lack a strong number 1. Bootle, on the other hand, lack a bit of experience at 3 & 4, although Mal Dixon seems to be doing better recently. In addition Bootle have lost their No.1. Dave Burton, who has been replaced by Mark Tsang.

The Vernon Sangster 'C' team has been settled recently and produced good 6-4 wins over Police 'E' & Longreach 'A' and held Courtaulds 'A' to a draw. They followed these with a 10-0 win over Maghull, a feat achieved by only YM & Courtaulds, previously. V.S.C's progress has coincided with the rapid development of John Greene & the skills of newcomer Peter Davies. Chris Ford has settled down nicely and has been winning consistently and with Mark Reed producing some sparkling form recently, its easy to see why they're doing so well. Longreach A, after showing some early promise, have slipped a little, losing 7-3 to VSB, 6-4 to VSC and in a disastrous fortnight, lost 9-1 to Police F & 10.0 to YMCA. They still look good enough for 6th place.

Police E are totally unpredictable due to the unsettled nature of their team. I think that they are in a false position, aided by the numerous appearances of Eric Ferguson and to a lesser extent, Peter Kavanagh. With these two the team is formidable, but without them it is considerably weaker. I still expect them to keep ahead of Bootle & Rafters.

Courtaulds 'A forced a draw with YMCA due to two great individual performances from John Tilley & Albert Rivers. John scored what is probably the best pair of wins to date, when he beat both David Ng and Billy Wardle, who are both in great form. Albert also won his two singles, beating Dominic Tai & George Lee. Frank Watt also beat Lee, but YM saved the day by winning both doubles. Courtaulds also drew with

Longreach A, with Tilley again starring, with wins over Fairclough and Windle. The promising Graham Leatherbarrow was the star for Longreach with a good double over Rivers and Watt. Courtaulds came unstuck against Rafters C, who beat them 7-3. Jean Reynolds & Pauline Lawrenson both beat Tilley, who must have been overawed by all the feminine charm. Jean won by an amazing 7,10 scoreline but John had the narrowest of defeats by Pauline, who won 15-21, 23-21, 23-21. Jean also beat the tenacious Jim Geddes 20-22, 21-16, 21-19. Jim made amends by beating Janet Davies 4, 19. Then Janet replied, beating Nick Ryan 18, 15. Pauline also won two, adding Frank Watt to her list of 'scalps.' Not to be outdone. Sue Smith also beat Watt, and Ryan, for a great team performance from Rafters. Courtaulds won both doubles to save a rout. Rafters had a good tussle with Bootle before going down 6-4. This time it was Janet Davies' turn to star, with wins over George Wilson 22-24, 21-18, 21-19 and Jackie Wilson 13, 7. Pauline beat Mal Dixon 15, 22-20 but Dave Burton was in great form for Bootle, beating Jean & Pauline.

Sue Smith took the honours against the "big two", with wins over John Gregory of Police F & Denis Corkery of YM. for Rafters only sets in these matches. Jean Reynolds had bad luck against YM, losing 17 in the 3rd to Ng and 18 in the 3rd to Wardle.

In Bootles 7-3 defeat by Police F. Dave Burton had the distrinction of being one of the few people to beat Eric Ferguson, after narrowly surviving in the second game. Scores were 11-21, 23-21, 21-11. George Wilson beat Steve Streets & Mal Dixon had a good win over John Gregory. Mark Tsang did well for Bootle against YMCA, beating Ng 21-15, 24-22 and then losing 22-24 in the third to Billy Wardle. Then, partnered by Jackie Wilson, took the doubles against Wardle & Tsai.

Vernon Sangster 'B' go from strength to strength, mainly due to the improvement of Roger and Adam Bennion. Adam, who is only 11, is now getting more power into his game to add to his consistency, and is now a much better match player. Basil Townsend, as reliable as ever, is a pillar of strength, and with Dave Aimson able to rise to the occasion, this team is well worth their third place. Basil & Roger starred in the 7-3 defeat of Longreach and then it was Adam & Basil's turn against Bootle, inspiring a great 8-2 win. Adam & Basil did it again against Rafters C in a most entertaining match. Pauline Lawrenson & Sue Smith both beat Peter Davies and Janet Davies did well to beat Roger. The most entertaining set was between Adam & Janet, with plenty of long rallies, some excellent retrieving by Janet, reminding me of play as a junior (a couple of years ago!!). Adam eventually won narrowly in the third, with the lead continually changing hands. Great stuff to watch.

Police E, without F team assistance, were trounced 10-0 by YMCA and then held to 6-4 by Maghull F, so they seem to be slipping.
