EDITORIAL

From time to time and quoted many times, Jimmy Grieves reckons football is a funny old game. May I suggest that he comes and has a look at Table Tennis - not the game but the set up.

Ken Armson brings up my favourite - a good player plays in certain or top crunch games

and misses others. This happens so often.

Jimmy Geddes looks forward to a new season and finds he is short of his top team (I know the feeling). However, 10 out of 10 to Roly, Jim, Les, Eddie and the rest of the stalwarts

for soldiering on. It affects the whole Club.

There are a lot of Jim Geddes in the League who make it all happen. He deserves his new room at Bootle Y.M. for resurrecting the Club from the old Brenka Club. Dave Cohen, founder member and backbone of the Liverpool Jewish (H. H.) Club. Ken Armson took over from Ron McEvoy and kept the Club at the top of the class. Alex Gould survived and kept the Bath Street flag flying (despite Billy Clayton).

George Smith, Paula French and Stan Harvey all came back or took over, but all have one object in mind, the furtherance and survival of Table Tennis. The same applies to Bill Leeming, Ken Nelson, Bill Proffit, who are all long serving and dedicated. In the admin. seats, but not for so long, the Graham "Twins", Mike Power, Mal McEvoy, Rod Bulmer, Arthur Garnett, Viv Smallwood and B. Leverington. All those mentioned take the stick when things go wrong, but without them we would be lost. Did I miss one? Oh yes! that elderly gent from Linacre, Jack Davidson, who with Alex together with his small Club have represented all the best in Table Tennis for over forty years.

I don't feel very strongly about the latest controversy. The flat hand throw it up rule was introduced to stop the then trend of imparting vicious finger spin. Now more spin is imparted by fancy rubbers. Most players serve as the ball arrives in their hand - palm,

fingers, hand and throw it up - so?

Eureka! a letter from an irate 'fan' non other than Fred Pheysey's 'Minder' and our worthy Editor to boot. This must surely be akin to winning a Pulitzer Prize. Perhaps I should remind Fred's 'Minder' of his own editorial in that same issue. "What are we going to do about 'walkovers' etc. I rest my case.

Back to the division. At present Y.M. and Wav Lab. are neck and neck in the title race and this looked likely to be the situation right up to the last match. A wrist injury to Dave Roberts now looks certain to affect Wav. Lab's bid to retain their title in the face of the strongest opposition for some years. With 4th squad member, Steve Green, not regularly available they now have to show they have the will to ride out this set back and maintain a strong challenge. Dave is due back in action first week in February but will be out of practice. Coincidentally, Y.M. suffered an identical set back last season when an arm injury to Mike Mahony ended their bid for honours. I feel this may also happen to Wav. Lab. for Dave is such a great asset to the team that his absence will be noticeable in their results. It goes almost without saying that I hope they prove me wrong.

For Y.M. the pace has not slackened and they recently recorded a 10.0 against Bath St. which was no mean achievement and a clear sign of championship form and effort. Obviously wins against them become more notable and Andy Clark made his mark in a 7-3 defeat for his team by winning his three singles. This loss being Y.M.'s only serious one the others being the odd set, or sometimes two. Kevin Dolder also hit the headlines with a lone 2 straight win over Peter Lee. Alan Chase doing like-wise for Eng. Elec. but in 3. For Elec. 'A' Natasha Williams followed up her debut wins by taking two sets off Y.M. beating Peter Lee and Mike. They also have had their share of luck which always accompanies great effort when Cadwa turned out a 1st team of reserves to give a further fillip to their title bid.

Colonsay have improved their turn-out and their results and climbed into 3rd place. They took 4 sets off Wav. Lab's. strongest team with two for Chris Ford and two for Stuart Richards. They disposed of GPT 7-3 with Paul Hutchings doing his usual taking the three. Against Wav. Lab. 'A' they lost 4 sets with Gary Watson recording another good win against Stuart Richards and taking another off Rob Lowe. It would be nice to believe they have continued to turn out a full strength team regularly, but the indications are that they continue to fall by the wayside. If they had, they would have been in with a strong chance of overtaking Wav. Lab. if the expected fall in their results occurs.

Bootle J.C. have also improved on their results after a hesitant start and moved up to 4th position and should hold this comfortably. They achieved a draw against Wav Lab. and a 9-1 win against Eng. Elec. Nick Miller being a lone loser to Ted Birch. They also got a draw against GPT for whom Paul Hutchings recorded his usual 3. I hear G.P.T. have signed a German player of a very high standard who is alternating with Paul to ensure at least one of them plays each week. I commend their attention to this important aspect which ensures no advantage is given to any one team. Pity other clubs do not do likewise for there is no doubt that the important championship and relegation issues are all too often affected by easy wins or heavy defeats arising from teams not honouring their full commitment to the division. Perhaps I should substitute 'players' for 'teams' as it is they, and not the team, which are at fault.

The biggest offender, Cadwa, continue to be unsure just who plays for which team and I doubt they know themselves just what their correct teams are. Surprisingly, with a fairly

strong team, they dropped four sets to Elec. 'A' with Ken Hartley losing his three and Neil Gravener probably wishing he had given the night his usual miss when 15yr. old Natasha Williams disposed of him in 2 straight 20 & 9. Yes, nine. I spoke to Natasha about this excellent win and she commented that having watched Neil she was a little apprehensive about playing him, but found he posed her no problems. Obviously not one of Neil's better performances and one he will be wanting to forget.

The position at the bottom has now resolved itself and it now looks certain that Eng. Elec. and Elec. 'B' will stay up with Cadwa 'A' and Elec. 'A' going down. GPT are hanging around the danger zone but the regular 3 games a match from Paul or his relief will be sufficient to keep them well clear, and that is without the sets being gained by their teammates.

Elec. 'B' have continued to demonstrate their right to their hard won promotion with draws v their own 1st team and a very noteworthy one against Bootle. J.C. Against their 1st team Ricky Brown and Frank Brady got two each and against Bootle J.C. Frank got two more with Ricky and Keith Miller getting one each. On each occasion they took the doubles for a draw. Against Lab. 'A' they got 3 more and Frank achieved a great win over Gary Watons who has been in great form and has victories over Keith Williams and Stuart Richards to show for his efforts and wins against Dave Roberts and Alan Timewell making his mark in the title battle. These wins making Frank's all the more noteworthy.

Cadwa 'A' have tried to maintain a settled team and although finding the going hard and having to accept that their time in this division will be restricted to one season, they have recorded some good individual wins. Ian Miller won his 3 against Eng. Elec. with a 2 straight over Alan (quicksilver) Chase and a 2 straight over Ted (never say die) Birch. Against Bath St. he was a lone winner taking a set off Mike Keane and in a recent match v Wav. Lab. he got his double against Alan Timewell when beating him for the second time this season with another lone effort.

Elec. 'A' are doomed, but might have avoided their inevitable fate had Natasha Williams been with them from the outset. Her successes may have given Fred and Harry the necessary lift to fight just that little bit harder for Fred, whatever little digs I may make, is a fighter. They both took a set off Ken Hartley in the 6-4 defeat by Cadwa to supplement Natasha's two. In another 6-4 defeat, Natasha got three and Harry chipped in with No. 4. In a recent match against Lab. 'A' they got a great fillip when a complete reserve team arrived and they got a 9-1 win, Bob Owen being a lone winner for Wav. Lab. 'C' playing under the banner of Lab 'A'.

On the cup front, Lab 'A' disposed of Elec 'A' 6-1 to move into the semi's and Y.M. recorded a 6-0 win against title rivals Wav. Lab. to take their place in the semi's. In what should have been the match of the Round Wav. Lab. struggled to field a team due to injury and sickness and when their 1st call, Steve Green v Peter Lee went down – Steve being 15-7 up in the 3rd only to lose -16 – Y.M. responded to this and achieved a tremendous win which will give a great fillip to their League and Cup challenge and possibly push Wav. Lab. right out of the frame. A comment on Dave Robert's injury, this was the result of playing Tennis, yes, tennis, in winter. What, I asked myself, was a table tennis player who won't play table tennis during the tennis season, doing playing tennis during the table tennis season? The mind boggles. Phil Luxon reckons he fell off his wallet. He did offer another possible reason which is unprintable.

On the service Law and the comments made by Stan Clarke in his divisional notes. As our top players you should be setting an example to the rest of the League, but I see many dubious serves and many which are clearly based on a Law of the player and bear little

relation to the official version. If you expect points won in accordance with the Laws of the game to be awarded to you, then you should also serve in accordance with those same Laws and not your own particular version of them. A protest as to the legality of your opponent's service being pointless unless your own are above reproach. Think about it, it makes sense and avoids the embarrassment of being called.

DIVISION 2 STAN CLARKE

Congratulations; out of the latest batch of cards to reach me not a single walk-over conceded, I only hope the trend will continue until the end of the season.

At the time of writing Liverpool Y.M.C.A."A" are sitting proudly at the top of the division with a 4 point lead over Electric Supply, both teams having played 12 matches. The first half match between the two resulted in a draw with Y.M.C.A. at full strength but Supply turning out only Mal McEvoy from their strongest line up. What's the betting that in the return fixture Supply turn out their strongest possible team? I venture to suggest that the inclusion of Peter Flint, Rob Bevan and Ken Connor may well produce a somewhat different result. I don't know about the rest of you but I find it a little unfair that a club should turn out an extremely strong team against one team but not do so consistently, from the records available to me I can only find one occasion where Supply have turned out their strongest team and that was against Colonsay "B", no sour grapes on my part I assure you.

Currently in 3rd place are Bootle J.C. "A" with 71 points from 12 matches ahead of G.P.T."A" who have 63 points from 11 matches, it will be interesting to watch the outcome of that particular battle, if pushed I would plump for G.P.T. to finish up in 3rd spot not because I don't rate the lads from Bootle J.C. but because G.P.T. are such an awkward combination, very difficult to beat with widely differing styles of play from the attacking flair of Trevor Owens to the formidable defensive skills of Ian Wensley. Job Centre by comparison are a little more straight forward, top spin players they allow their opponents to play a more open type of game and it is mainly a question of wether you have the ability to take them on at their own game.

Colonsay "B" are in fifth place with 53 points from 13 matches and can expect to drop a couple of places when teams below them catch up on outstanding matches. Both Colonsay teams have suffered from having to conceed sets which have not been completed before 11pm when they must vacate their premises, particularly frustrating if the reason is a late start because opponents failed to turn up at the correct starting time.

Bootle Y.M.C.A. have dropped two places since my last notes but like Colonsay I feel sure they will be pleased to survive the season outside the relegation zone considering the players they have lost. In my opinion they have done very well considering so many of their players have been thrown in at the deep end and are playing at a level they are unaccustomed to.

English Electric "C" obviously took my remark in the last Digest to heart and appear to have ensured they will not take part in the relegation battle with 52 points from 12 matches.

Bath Street"A" continue to confound me having played 11 matches to date but only collected 48 points, I feel they are capable of much better. Police have 48 points from 12 and are still not safe from the relegation battle, they need to turn out their strongest team at every opportunity to ensure their safety.

Colonsay "A" have 45 points from 12 matches and are currently next to bottom, they do have a squad which should see them comfortably in mid table with Colin Rourke, Bill Harris, Dave Ferguson the improving Martin Hunter and Harry Nelson. They have the ability to do better, but like other teams they have difficulty turning out their strongest team consistently.

Last but not least come Harold House with 36 points from 12 matches, they really do have a battle on their hands to avoid the drop. It's a pity that their home venue does not really suit some of their players, it's not easy to defend in such a small room as I am sure Eddie Clein and John Kenwright would confirm. One wonders if their canny secretary Dave Cohen can produce one of his famous timely signings to help the situation.

I have 5 cards with scores of 9/1 the following players saving their respective teams from a whitewash: Dave Ferguson Colonsay "A" beat John Henshaw L'Pool Y.M.C.A. "A", Roly Wright Bootle Y.M.C.A. beat Alan Evans Electric Supply. Tom Purcell Police beat John Moore Electric Supply, John Kenwright Harold House beat Peter Scarisbrick Bootle J.C. "A" and finally Frank McCann and Brian Crolley Eng Elec. "C" beat Dave Tagg and Peter Taylor L'Pool Y.M.C.A.

Talking point for this issue is should we now be considering making all divisions 3 a side in line with the super stars of the 1st division? Many of the original objections no longer apply, membership of the league has fallen to an all time low, many clubs are struggling to turn out 4 players for each match as witnessed by the number of walkovers conceded each season. Very few clubs have large numbers of teams, the notable exception being English Electric and they are regrettably about to loose their premises, so the problem of match nights is not the problem it once was. So what are the advantages? The 3 man team ensures each player of at least 3 sets per match with a doubles for the two more energetic members, hopefully the extra players can form extra teams ensuring full divisions and the possibility of a 6th division. Surely if it's good enough for the super stars it's good enough for the rest of us. Your comments would be welcome.

DIVISION 3

The Division seems to be sorting it's self out into three distinct groups. At the top are GPT "B" with 85 points from 12 games followed by Fords with 76 from 12 games.

There then follows a group of 7 teams with only 13 points separating them; leading this group are Police A 66 from 13, Cadwa 65 from 12, Waterloo 62 from 11, English Electric E 60 from 11, Electric Supply A 58 from 11, English Electric D 55 from 10 and Linacre 53 from 13.

The bottom two places are occupied by Maghull 35 from 11 and Bootle YMCA 19 from 11.

What conclusions can we draw from this:-

- (i) GPT are going to be very hard to catch especially now they seem to have a settled side.
- (ii) If Fords had a settled side maybe they could mount a promotion push.
- (iii) For 7 teams their season is over, to far behind to catch the leaders and to far ahead to be caught by those teams in the relegation zone.
- (iv) The loss of Stuart Fay has really affected Maghull.
- (v) Bootle are the victims of their club losing a team.

The Cadwa side are somewhat of an enigma, with the ability to put out an extremely talented team but not doing it often enough. Ian Miller has a 100% record and in Kevin

Dolder, Phil Musgrove and Emma Fletcher they possess talented young players, lets hope they continue to hold onto them. Looking at the available score cards I see that George Higham is again picking up good wins taking Dave Crispin and George Wright of Police, John Moore of Electric Supply and Alan Cameron of GPT but to name four. Interestingly George has played in all positions bar Number 1 (that's table tennis I'm referring to). Of Cadwa's juniors I have only seen Kevin play, this season, and he looked a very good modern style player able to play the awkward Number 3 and 4 in the Division as well as the more orthodox players. Wins over Wilf Gibson, Arthur Harrison, Alf Southall, Peter Holmes and Trevor Hughes in the small number of matches played.

One good aspect of being the writer of the Divisional notes is that you can feature your own team without much fear of being either edited or sacked. The loss of Stuart Fay changed the team from promotion hopefuls to relegation fighters. The hoped for replacement didn't materialise and the use of reserves each week is not conducive to team spirit. One good aspect of having so few points is that it makes easier to feature the wins. Good start to the season beating GPT 6-4, though they did get their revenge in the return winning 10-0. A hard fought draw against English Electric "D" saw Chris Roberts beat Julie Prince 21/17, 30/28 in a tremendous battle with Chris's "never say die" attitude winning the day. Yours truly has recorded a double over Ritchie Craggs a first after more years than I care to remember. Pleasing to see the way Andy McCourt has accepted his position in the team and is using the season as a learning experience. We are waiting for the talented Steve Woods to get his game together, I am sure that when he does not many will get the better of him. Good wins by all our reserves Harry McGanity over Rob Conley, Wilf Gibson beating Ken Nelson and Rob Davies during the season.

It is nice to see that we have been joined by our old friends Linacre, who have been described as the YO-YO's of the division, but I think this season will see them stay with us a little longer. The return of Harry Reeve will improve their position and keep them away from the relegation zone.

Some other good wins to report; Bert Rivers 14/21 21/16 21/18 against Ken Ainsworth, Frank Lacey 17/21 21/18 24/22 against Ray Hibbs, Tommy Downing 21/11 20/22 21/17 against Mal Cray, John Moore 21/19 21/17 against Bill Proffitt, Jim Gedes 21/13 22/20 against Alf Southall, George Wright 15/21 21/10 21/13 against Alan Cameron and finally Eddie Preston 11/21 21/10 21/13 against Alan Reid.

To finish on I would like to express my support for a change to the strict order of ranking system for teams and a return to the days of the team captain being able to change his order. This I feel will bring some variation back into this division as at the moment you can play the same players each season for quite a number of years. Your views on the subject would be appreciated.

No takers so far for the guaranteed print-space for any victories over Alan Biggs or Peter Carney. So, I'll 'up the anti' with a guaranteed capital letter first line entry in the end of season notes. So far, Mike Ashton (Labour D) has come closest, only losing deuce in the 3rd against Peter, whilst Andrew Sefia (TAG A) lost 15 in the 3rd against the same player. Of course, I'm talking about Electric Supply who now call upon the talents of Ian Turner and R Conley, with Neil Jennings apparently not able to get a place. Only joking.

So, why are Wavertree Labour D and Waterloo still on the coat tails of such exulted company, especially after Labour have lost 2-8 and 1-9 to them? The answer can be traced to a bonfire night fixture between Supply and Waterloo, when the former were lighting the blue touch-paper elsewhere, so conceding a 10-nil walkover" Supply are still favourites for the championship, Labour and Waterloo have a glimmer of hope.

Eric is playing very well, blocking his way to numerous victories, including a 13 in the 3rd against myself, and a 21 in the 3rd against fast improving, hard hitting, Reza Mirdamadi of Labour E. And with Ted now playing very consistently, it's not surprising that Harold House B are steadily climbing. Notable games for Mike include a perilously close 24-22 victory in the 3rd against TAG A's Andrew Sefia, and a 2 straight defeat to the net-hugging, no margin for error, flat hitting of Ken Miller (Harold House B). John Reynolds recent 2 straight double over Aigburth's Bill Leeming and Billy Holmes showed that his confidence and concentration is currently high, playing at No. 1. Although Sandie's form has slightly dipped.

But, Waterloo continue their run of victories, their only recent hiccup being a 5-5 draw against Aigburth. Their best team of Fraser, Bill, Eugene and John Forest is fairly formidable with John clearly taking the honours with only one defeat so far. Bill is difficult to beat and shaded Aigburth's Bill Leeming 18 in the 3rd, whilst Fraser at number 1 has performed extremely well at times, especially in routing Vivien Smallwood, of LIHE, in 2 straight, and just shading Ted Cramsie in the 3rd. A. Hayden makes up the quintet, and recorded a 2 straight win over Aigburth's Jim Conroy, before falling 15 and 15 to Eric Woods of the hard-bat-brigade in the 5-5 draw mentioned above.

Aigburth are shaping to finish 4th, sometimes fielding an all hard bat team of the 2 Bills, Eric and Charlie Gallantry. I suspect this is unique in the league. Not surprisingly, this team is hard to beat and the following results bear this out. Eric's 2 close defeats, 17 and 22 both in the 3rd against Supply's R. Conley and Neil Jennings. This is easily the closest Neil has been taken, whilst Bill Leeming recorded an excellent victory over John Forest, inflicting John's only loss so far, and a close run 17 in the 3rd triumph over Bath Street's Dave Aimson. Charlie outfoxed the cunning Jack Letch in the same match and only just lost out to Labour D's Sandie 19 in the 3rd whilst Billy Holmes is as unorthodox as you can get, recording a 3rd game victory against the flamboyant Edmund Hung of LIHE. However, Billy did lose out narrowly to Labour E's Captain, Ken Armson, who is building an impressive array of scalps. His 19 in the 3rd triumph over Gerry O'Keefe was a first time ever for Ken.

Despite Ken's victories, Labour E are struggling in their efforts to achieve mid-table respectability. But Reza is learning how to win in this, his first, season and perhaps his 17-18 route of Ritchie Blackburn was his best to date. Ken Ray, at Number 1, knows all about winning, though just ask John Reynolds and Vivien Smallwood!

Behind Aigburth, I expect TAG A will be fighting with CADWA for 5th position, the last top half place. There is clear daylight between these teams and the rest of the division below. Peter Roberts for CADWA, is recording his usual win quota, with a 19 in the 3rd win against Ken Ray being about his closest. Russell Thornton had an excellent 2 straight win over Jack Letch who has been impressive for much of the season, for Bath Street. Jack Power, Dave Power and Steve Perry continue to play and score regularly for CADWA, with Dave's 12 and 16 triumph over TAG's

David Rudd, particularly taking the eye.

TAG A finished 2nd from bottom last season, and whilst they aren't yet threatening to emulate Rodney Youth's and MYCA's recent achievements (sadly both now defunct), they are clearly much improved and ambitious newcomers. Ray and Andrew Sefia, combine with Myles Joel and Eddie Mosheshe to play most games, with Ray, particularly, impressive in forcing a 2 straight victory double against Aigburth's Bill Leeming and Eric Wood. In the 8-2 derby victory over TAG, Eddie triumphed over David Rudd 12-14 and Andrew Bird 9-19, whilst Andrew Sefia fell to both the determined Jamie McCafferty and the sometimes erratic hard hitting of David Rudd. Against Harold House B, Myles shaded Ritchie Blackburn - 24, 8, 15 in a game of swinging fortunes.

Harold House C will finish bottom, not helped by at least one walk-over conceded. But keep going lads, it'll get better. Ask TAG and TAG A. TAG continue to improve from last season's bottom position. Above them, Harold House B, LIHE, Labour E and Bath Street, will be battling to secure mid-table berths. LIHE are strong at Number 1 and 2, with Edmund and Vivien winning most of their games. Edmund narrowly phased both Fraser and Bill in LIHE's 2-8 reversal to Waterloo, whilst against Aigburth, Vivien easily defeated Billy Holmes who then outblasted Edmund in 3. Eric Chum penholder, plays regularly for LIHE and has chipped in with some useful victories, notably a 14 in the 3rd triumph over Labour E's Reza. Bath Street too are fairly strong at 1 and 2 with Jack Letch recording a fine double over Labour D's John Gratton and Sandie. R. Georgerson, Richard Wooley and Don Gibson play regularly.

Anyway, so to bed again. Remember the challenge 'US LOT' against Supply's Pete, Alan and Neil, if he plays. Good luck!
