A season which produced quality table tennis allied to high competitive endeavour and always looking likely to be a close run title battle, sadly collapsed to exit in an undignified and farcical manner. It also highlighted, yet again, the need to replay postponed fixtures within the laid down time scale. Also highlighted very forceably were the problems Representative matches can cause in this division. Some would say, unfair problems, in that it is restricted to matches involving those members representing our League.

As Week 20 approached the stage was set for a nail biting finish which faded into nothing when at the peak of the final run-in Liv. Y.M. failed to turn up against Wav. Lab. in a Week 21 match postponed because of a representative fixture. The reason for their failure still not being known to me. Personal views infiltrated an immediate replay, the absence of which could possibly have made Wav. Lab. champions by default. Cadwa, then the only other contenders, still had to play Liv. Y.M. in yet another postponed fixture. They needed 7 sets for a play-off with Wav. Lav., 8 for outright victory, having only played the Week 7 match against Y.M. three weeks earlier and winning 7-3. In this fixture they received a virtual 10.0 w/over in that Y.M. were without Keith Williams and Peter Lee. Natasha Williams taking the important eighth set against. They lost to Cadwa 6-4 and Manweb 6-4; results which lost them the title, but which earned them a worthy 2nd place. Never really fancied to retain the championship they kept going inspite of many setbacks and almost pulled it off. Not the way they have wanted it to end but I am certain they all learnt from these unfortunate events. So, well done, Dave, Bernie and Gary.

The confident hopes Manweb had of a League and Cup Double faded away inspite of their attempt to regain lost ground. They finished up with nothing having seen the Cup snatched from them by Colonsay. The Cup Final also being a somewhat unsayoury affair of late arrivals by an apparently disinterested Manweb team. Only Terry Turner had a justifiable reason for being late, having been involved in a road incident and arriving still bearing the visible results. I don't know the full facts about this, our premier Cup Final, but it appeared to have blighted the night. Other factors may have had a bearing. I don't know, what I do know is that Colonsay were comfortable and worthy winners and I congratulate them not only as winners of the Cup but also as winners in the behaviour stakes. Add the events of the Cup Final to the events of the title battle and you have first class shambles in our premier division for which fortunately no blame can be laid at the door of the two winners. In the title race Manweb can point to having had to meet W. Lab., Cadwa and Y.M. in the closing stages, matches which took the sting out of their challenge, for at that stage a big win was a must and would have done a double job. Instead they could only manage two draws and a 6-4 win.

Helped into 4th place by Y.M.'s hari kari decision, Colonsay remained to the end a team of unpredictable turn-outs and results. The return of Stuart Richards gave them the strength in depth they needed and their improved results helped propel them into 4th place. A little more effort and earlier consistency and they could have gained a comfortable 3rd place to add to their Cup win. Had they had the services of Stuart throughout we would have seen a more reliable turn-out of others and, I am certain, they and not Cadwa would have been champions.

In a repeat of other season our 'happiest' team, Bath St. again finished in the middle. Too good to fear relegation, not good enough to be championship material, but good enough to trouble every other team, theirs was yet another uncomplicated season. But they are not getting any younger and the in this division will not always be so cosy, or treat them so kindly without an injection of younger blood. After a disastrous start and some equally disastrous results, Lab. 'A'; ably captained by Roy Smith, steered themselves to safety by what seems a comfortable margin. However, the poor results of Mike Tierney and clown prince, Phil Luxon, will not give them much confidence for next season. They were virtually a 2 man team and survived on the results of Roy and Alan.

Bootle J.C. had an even more disastrous start escaping by only thirteen sets. Their escape being made possible by a 21 sets haul in the final 3 matches. They had to play

G.P.T.; Cadwa 'A' and Y.M. 'A' and after a season of mediocre, and at times, lack lustre performances, they came good at the right time beating G.P.T. and Y.M. 'A' 8-2 and drawing with Cadwa 'A'. Lucky, perhaps, to find themselves with such a run-in. They put much of their lack of form down to too much table tennis. But if that was the cause then it must apply to quite a few other players and could account for some unexpected results.

Cadwa 'A' survived by only six points and must be well pleased at having done so. Hampered by early season team problems, they declared their intention to survive. That they did so was due in the main to the consistency of Ken Hartley who won a third of their sets, and the odd appearances of Neil Gravener who in his four matches won 9 sets. For Y.M. 'A' and G.P.T. it will be 2nd div. play next season, and whilst G.P.T. never really looked like escaping relegation narrowly avoided last season they fought up to the end and had their moments. But this time there was no Paul Hutchings to snatch survival from the jaws of relegation, for just one player capable of regular wins might have turned the tide in their favour. Cadwa 'A' brought Neil Gravener in against them in the closing stages and Bob Edwards spoilt his night by beating him 2 straight. Although losing very narrowly to other relegation possibles they never won a match and it was this in ability to turn draws and 6-4 defeats into 6-4 wins which eventually put them down. Y.M. 'A's fate was probably sealed in their first matches when they had to face Cadwa, Liv. Y.M., Manweb and Wav. Lab. This hard start only brought them five sets and they had a second bad spell which brought only 12 sets. Only Peter Taylor maintained any consistency, Jeff Huntington started well and the hitting a bad patch. Ironically they achieved their best result in their final match beating Bath St. 6-4; three of their sets being taken from Ken Jackson and Mike Keane. I wish them well in the 2nd Div. and feel certain they won't stay there long. Might even be back in one season.

Finally, I have said it before, and will say it again. I have been writing the 1st Div. notes since the late Jim Green, one of our great characters, passed away. Some 20 odd years, some will say, 20 years too many. I don't mind the criticisms and comments – pity they are never to the Editor – but I truly would like to stand down. I feel I have done my bit for the League and our magazine these last 20 years. I seem to have plenty of critics, every player in the division, or it appears that way to me. So would one of those vociferous players like to use a per instead of mouth and give me a well earned rest? A cry, I assure you, from my heart. Yes, I have got one, I think.

DIVISION 3 MIKE POWER

Well, I told you so, Cadwa 'B' and Waterloo for promotion, Manweb 'A' Third. G.P.T. 'C' and Bath St. 'C' for relegation. It sounds like it was a foregone conclusion when you read it quickly, but now have a look at the league table.

The was in fact only one foregone conclusion and that, unfortunately was the demise of G.P.T. 'C'. They lost all their games bar one, a draw against Bath St. 'B', I am sure they will feel more at home in the 4th division.

Bath St. 'C' put up an 'end of season' spirited fight, four of their last five games ended in 6-4 defeats against Labour 'C', Manweb 'A', Bath St. 'B' and Cadwa 'B'. Their final game against Maghull 'A' gave them a 7-3 victory and they also managed a 6-4 win over Bootle Y.M.C.A. Had their early season form been as good they would not now be heading for the 4th division.

Apart from the top three teams, there was not a lot to choose between the remaining seven. Manweb 'B' finished third from bottom but were only 21 points behind fourth placed team Labour 'B' (I must ask Mr. Statistics Don Davies if this is a record). Their end of season form improved, as I had expected, but was partly due to the inclusion of Alan Evans for the final two games winning three singles and a doubles, the most notable being a 3 set win against Bobby Owen which ended 18/21, 21/19, 21/23.

Maghull 'A' slipped up towards the end of the season taking just 20 points from their final seven games. Included in those seven games were the top four teams who were each battling for every point, but I still think the Maghull players didn't do themselves justice in the end. having said that, Harry McGannity had an excellent win over Tony Kendall 21/16, 17/21, 21/18 and Steve Woods achieved another remarkable result beating Ricky Brown 21/17, 21/16.

Tony Randall made all the difference to Bath St. 'B's season. On his day he's an exceptional player and I would put him on my list of the Top Ten Players in Division Three. He never loses any silly games and remained consistent throughout. Bath Street's main problem was not being able to field a settled side. In their last eight games they used eight players and fifteen players all season. It must have been a nightmare for Karen Gibson, let someone else be Captain next season Karen, and you can put your feet up. The next time you go into a game needing only a draw, you better hope your not playing Labour 'C'. They have now gone two season without registering a draw. Bobby Owen has lead the team with only five defeats all season and enters my Top Ten list at number five. Fellow players John Gratton, Ken Roberts and Ken Ray make up a very sociable team and with Ken Ray's side-comments such as "BARLEY" whenever he clips the edge or gets a net, takes me back to my school days. According to Ken Roberts he has many more.

Getting near to the top, we have both Bootle Y.M.C.A. and Labour 'B'. I must admit I did forecast Y.M.C.A. for fourth place and had it not been for my own team, Cadwa 'B', would have done so. Our last two games were against both these sides and, unfortunately for Bootle Y.M.C.A., Ian Miller came home for what was scheduled as our final game. With Ian and Billy Hargreaves in the side along with myself and on this occasion Rob Davies, I would have put money on us beating any team in the division. Well, we ran out 10-0 winners and I must take my hat off to Rob for beating Danny Every and Roly Wright who had both beaten him earlier in the season. Ian and I also retained our 100% doubles record beating John Higham and Tom Killip 15/21, 21/16, 21/15. Four days later, in a rearranged game, we played Labour 'B', without Ian Miller, and knowing we only needed 2 points to win the division, and lost 6-4 with Billy Hargreaves getting a table.

It's a good job that neither Labour 'B' or Bootle Y.M. were playing either a promotion or relegation issue or I wouldn't be able to show my face for a couple of years. The result between Bootle Y.M. and Labour 'B' during the second half of the season was an 8-2 victory for Bootle which makes you realise what an impact Cadwa had on the situation.

I've now come up to the top three teams and I can assure you, because I was personally involved, that it was an enthralling scrap right to the end. It was the evening of the 8th March, Waterloo were at home to Labour 'B' and Manweb 'A' were away to G.P.T. 'C', both playing their final game. Waterloo needed 9 points to be sure of promotion and 8 points to be sure of at least a play-off. With respect G.P.T 'C' it was expected that Manweb would get 10 points and they were hoping Labour 'B' would do them a favour. I thought, for the benefit of my reader, (and also to spy on Labour 'B' who we were playing two days later) I would go and watch.

I arrived shortly after 9.00 p.m. to find Waterloo leading 6-0 and also to find Alan Reid with his head in his arms – bottle gone. The game on the table was a doubles, Ricky Brown and Ray Hibbs against Bill Stanley and John Reynolds and no sooner had I got there and Ricky and Ray were losing 20/17 in the third. They ended up saving seven game points and eventually ran out winners 28/26, 7-0. Next game Peter Frazer against Bill Stanley and once again losing 20/17 in the third. Peter then saves another three game points and wins 22/20, 8-0. One more needed for promotion. All's looking good for Waterloo. Next game's on, Ray Hibbs versus Roy Adams not so easy, Roy's a much improved player, Roy wins 21/19, 21/19. 8-1. Final game Alan Reid versus John Henshaw. Half way through the first game the telephone rings, it's 10.45 p.m., who else could it be but Trevor Hughes "Hello son, what's the score?" he enquires. "Tell his 9-1 someone shouts", "Tell him it's deuce in the third" someone else shouts "Go away, don't you know what time it is?" another voice crops up. Finally Trevor is told it's 8-1 and to go away. John is in superb form hitting both forehand and backhand with drop shots thrown in. The watching Ricky Brown, Peter

Frazer, Ray Hibbs and Ken Nelson wince as John wins 14/21, 10/21. Final score 8-2. Alan looks stunned. John looks apologetic. We gather round and wonder whether the boys from G.P.T. have been able to take a point off Manweb. We didn't have long to wait, the phone rings again, Ken Nelson says "Give that to me", he thinks it's Ian Turner on the other end, "How did you get on?" say the voice, "you first" says Ken, "OK, we won 10-0" say the voice, "Blast" replies Ken "We only managed 8-2, see you in the playoff." There are cheers from the other end and the line goes dead. Both teams are on 131 points and know that Cadwa only need two points from their final game to become Champions. I must say that through all the excitement Ken Nelson is the perfect host and although he never had any cider on draught he supplied me with free (yes, I said FREE) lager to calm my nerves.

Who would be in Manweb team? They could choose from seven or eight players, maybe even Trevor would be asked to play a part.

Two nights later Labour 'B" turned up at Cadwa and, as previously reported, we obtained the required two points to clinch the title and I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Ian Miller, Billy Hargreaves, George Higham and Rob Davies for not only helping me win a medal but for also being excellent team mates and great 'Butty Makers'. Back to the play-off, played at Bath St. Again for the benefit of you readers (and for any free cider that was on offer) I went to watch. The game finished before the bar closed, but only just. Denise Conroy (or should I now say McEyoy - Congratulations) picked a team which on paper looked very strong, but I can name two players who may have thought otherwise. John Moore and Ian Turner turned up having played more games for this team than anyone only to find themselves sidelined. At the end of the day Paul Kinsey and Steve Rowe took their places, but neither had the tenacity to beat Man of the match, Ricky Brown. He won this three in superb style. Peter Frazer also had a brilliant game against Alan Biggs winning 23/25, 22/20, 21/16 and he also partnered Alan Reid in the doubles to dispose of Paul and Denise 17/21, 21/19, 25/23. Both these games could have gone either way and reversed the scoreline but eventually Waterloo deservedly won 6-3 and clinched promotion.

As well as promotion, Waterloo should also be congratulated for lifting the Hyde Cup beating Bootle Y.M.C.A. in the final. Y.M. again failed to win a doubles and ended up with an average of only 33.33%. This, I'm afraid, was their downfall.

Police are unlucky. They struggled again through shiftwork etc. to field consistently strong team, yet still pushed hard to the end, only 5 points adrift of promotion. Tony

Harris with his controlled attack and Ritchie Winkle were models of consistency and deserve promotion. High points for this pair include a 19, 21 win (Tony) over Reg Edwards and a 16, 18 rout (Ritchie) against Dave Aimson in a super 8-2 end of season clash against a strong Bath St. side, which really emphasised Police's determination for promotion.

Alas, it wasn't to be for Police, but next season shouldn't be so tough in this unusually strong division. Waterloo, led by Peter Holmes and the exciting attack of Andy Armstrong flirted with promotion but fell away to finish 4th. Still, a fine achievement, with Bill Spencer, Fraser Farquarson and Austin Hayden all weighing in with no small measure of success.

Fraser played an ex-colleague (at Labour) Ken Armson twice in seven days, and it finished honours even in two close three setters. The crucial tactical point here was who could get in first with their strong forehand game. Let's hope that John Forrest's injury problems are over and that he is raring to go for September.

Linacre, too, flirted with promotion for much of the season and were just 17 points behind Police with a game in hand at the three-quarter stage. But one win and five defeats in their last six matches condemned them to seventh position. Never-the-less, Jack Davidson and Frank Lacy had commendable seasons. Jack never seems to be beaten easily, and his scalps include Bath Street's Reg Edwards, whilst Frank too shaded Reg and 'out penholded' Y.M.C.A.'s attacking John Lace. But really, Linacre missed Harry Reeves who didn't feature after Christmas.

Alex Gould too, enjoyed a successful season in helping Bath Street to mid-table after promotion. Against Frank, Alex just came through 20 in the third in the battle of the evergreen pen-holders. G. Lee, Dave Aimson, Reg and Dave Batty too contributed well to Bath Street's cause.

If dogged determination was enough, Labour 'E' would have avoided relegation, especially as Maghull underwent a late crisis in morale as their Better players couldn't turn out as regularly as Captain, Phil Christie, would have liked. Never-the-less, their best quartet of Phil, Bill Salter, Brian Gregory and Jimmy Gill turned out just enough times to accrue enough points and are thankful that only one team is relegated. This foursome was good enough to larrup Labour 'D' 6-4 and 8-2 in February and March, and so we at 'D' did our 'E' team compatriots no favours at all.

However, there were good performances in the Labour 'E' camp. Mark Miles at one consistently troubled the divisions best players and his scalps include doubles over Labour 'D's John Reynolds and Maghull's Phil Christie. Mark and Paul Faulkner combined brilliantly to shade University's Pat McCloughan and Andrew Johnson in the doubles, whilst Paul also impressed in his two straight victory over long pimples exponent Ken Ainsworth of Linacre. Steve Perry scored a fine 18, 21 win over Frank Lacey in the same match, which went 6-4 to Labour 'E' at a time when they were fighting for their 4th division lives.

No such excitement for Labour 'D' who reverted form being amongst the pre-season promotion favourites to actually worrying about relegation towards the end, finishing 4th from bottom. Mike Ashton was probably the pick of us though Sandie has been dogged by injury and will hope for a cleaner bill of health come September. John too will improve next time out and my money is on him to re-establish himself amongst the best players in the division.

One such player is Paul Morgan, yet Harold House still finished 3rd from bottom. Dave Cohen, Ian Burrows, Mike Poole and Graham Williams all appeared fairly regularly (or better). Pretty puzzling why Harold House struggled so much with this squad, but they did concede at least one walk-over and, as usual, had to rely on a pretty generous squad system.

Jack Highton is enjoying a fine spell for Cadwa whilst Peter Roberts too had his moments, especially in beating Jimmy Clewitt 18 and 16. Cadwa finished mid-table with Steve Graham, Jack Power and Trevor Dolder regularly featuring. Jack, less than usual though, Steve excelled at times, especially when shading both Phil Christie and Dave Aimson.

So, all in all an exciting and competitive season with promotion and relegation issues not being sorted 'til the very end.

Congratulations Bootle Y.M.C.A. 'A' champions of the division by a large margin, there can be little doubt that they have thoroughly deserved their success having led the division all season. Their winning margin would have been greater had their dispute with Harold House not resulted in Harold House claiming a walkover.

Runners up are Aigburth who came with a late run to finish just 4 points clear of Maghull 'C', it is a great shame that Bill Leeming will not be with us to help out his team next season. I am sure that many of you will have fond memories of Bill, one of the nicest men in the game, always cheerful and I cannot recall him ever speaking badly of another player. Bill will be sadly missed not only by the members of Aigburth but by his many friends throughout the league.

As I mentioned earlier Maghull 'C' finished in third spot, there is little doubt that the influx of players from English Electric and Police into the club has resulted in stronger players appearing in this division.

In fourth place were Harold House 'B', for so long the only team to pressurise Bootle Y.M.C.A., they would have finished in runners up spot except that they had 30 points deducted for playing ineligible players, it's a shame for the regular players in the team

but it is an easy trap to fall into when players ranked in lower teams regularly turn out for teams in higher divisions, having said that I am surprised that Harold House should be in this position given that they fell foul of the same rule last season.

Bath Street 'E' and Merseybus finished level on 130 points well above the next batch of teams led by Bootle Y.M.C.A. 'B' with 96 points there was very little to choose between Aigburth 'A', Police 'B' and Waterloo 'B', only 12 points separating the three. The final two places in the division were taken by Colonsay 'B' sixteen points clear of bottom team Harold House 'C'. The youngsters of Colonsay have successfully negotiated their first season and hopefully will improve their results next season when they have more experience of 'funny bats' and unusual tactics.

Having complimented you all on the fact that hardly any walkovers had been conceded I now find now less than six cards claiming walkovers in the batch in my possession, four of which concern the Harold House club, unbelievably the Stamp Cup semi final was claimed as a walkover by Bootle Y.M.C.A. 'A' against Harold House 'B' who than claimed a walkover against Bootle Y.M.C.A. 'A' in the league. I understand that clubs do on occasion have difficulty in raising teams but surely we are in the sport to play matches not to claim walkovers. I can honestly say that in my twenty odd years as a club secretary with up to eight teams in the league, I cannot recall having to claim more than a handful of matches, so come on folks, lets play matches whenever humanly possible, rather than take the easy option and claim walkovers.

Finally on a happier note yet another list of players who have saved their teams form a whitewash: D. Traynor, Aigburth 'A' beat Mal Clark, Waterloo 'B' 17 & 16; Stephen Simpson, Harold House 'C' beat S. Weldon, Waterloo 'B' 16, -2, 19; Austin Haydon, Waterloo 'B' beat Bill Leeming, Aigburth 8, -21, 14; Jim Geddes, Bootle Y.M.C.A. 'B' beat Sue Anderson, Maghull 'C' 19 & 16; Joe Harrison, Merseybus beat Eric Young, Harold House 'B' 17 & 15; Stan Clarke, Colonsay 'B' beat Jim Geddes, Bootle Y.M.C.A. 'B' -15, 16, 17; S. Simpson, Harold House 'C' beat Fraser Farquharson, Waterloo 'B' 12 &12; Eric Wood, Aigburth 'A' beat John Letch, Bath Street 'E', 15, -16, 18 and finally Lee Farley, Colonsay 'B' beat Billy Holmes, Aigburth 20 - 17.

It only remains for me to wish you all well over the closed season and hope that you will all return fighting fit ready for next season and to hope that during the summer months at least a few more youngsters and dare I mention it some new lady players, might appear on your squad list.

Dave managed to take the Doubles Title with his partner, Bernie Wentworth, recording fine wins over S. and P. Gittins, C. Ford and P. Hutchings, Kevin Dolder and Keith Williams, before disposing of Peter Flint and Ken Connor in the Final. However, Dave's progress in the Veterans' event was perhaps more testing. POSTSCRIPT ON BEHALF OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Following the conclusion of the Men's Singles Final at the League's Closed Championships held on 15th February, 1994, the conduct of Mr. Malcolm McEvoy resulted in interior structural damage being caused to the Merseyside Police Sports and Social Association's premises at Fairfield. The League was advised that the Association was seeking recompense to the value of £50 in respect of the damage and that Mr. McEvoy was banned for life from these premises.

As a subsequent Disciplinary Hearing the League Management Committee found that Mr. McEvoy was in breach of Rule 18 (misconduct likely to bring the League or the game of Table Tennis into disrepute) and decided:-

- (a) That Mr. McEvoy be required to repay the £50 claim for the damage. and
- (b) That he should be suspended from membership of the Liverpool and District Table Tennis League for the period from 14th March, 1994 until 31st August, 1996, both dates inclusive.

An appeal by Mr. McEvoy to the Lancashire County Table Tennis Association in respect of the length of the suspension was not upheld.

This year's Annual General Meeting will be remembered as an occasion of particular significance for it records the relinquishment by Eddie Cameron of the Office of the League's Hon. Registrar and Fixture Secretary, a post he has filled with distinction for the past 39 years.

During this exceptionally lengthy period of dedicated service and commitment to the League's members he has been responsible for the preparation of Team Fixtures, Players Registrations, compilation of League Tables, and as far as circumstances have permitted, ensuring conformity with the League's Rules and Regulations. His tact and dexterity were often called upon in achieving this aim. This has been no menial task for whilst there have been fluctuations in membership over this long period of time, peaking at 12 Divisions of 12 Teams with approximately 900 players, to the present day statistics of lesser numbers, it remains a time consuming exercise. He has performed these onerous duties in a quiet and cheerful manner and this has deservedly earned him the respect of countless people, whether they were Committee colleagues,

Club Secretaries, or rank and file members who have had occasion to seek his wise counsel. In addition to his formal duties as Hon. Registrar and Fixture Secretary he has made a valued contribution as a member of the Rules Committee. Annual General Meetings have also been enhanced by the humour he has been able to introduce during the course of his Annual Reports, which have been presented with an eloquence we have come to associate with him.

It has also to be borne in mind that for many years prior to undertaking the formidable role of Hon. Registrar and Fixture Secretary, and during the majority of the time that he has held the Office, Eddie was a playing member of a number of Clubs within the League and enjoyed particular successes at the Victoria Park and Crawfords Club.
