In this issue you will find a resume of these events from our new Secretary, also a letter from Stan Clarke and one from from Tony Harris. Distressing though these events may have been, the League is bigger than all its members and must now be everyone's first priority. At our AGM changes to the Rule governing a player who has played six or more matches for a higher team were agreed, the onus for action has now moved to club secretaries with penalties for failure to comply. This, along with the need for teams to ensure they play in 'ranked' order should be addressed by all clubs. Every player has a responsibility when playing for a team other than their own to ensure that team captain is aware of their 'ranked' position. They should also ensure their club secretary is informed when they play up. If in doubt, your secretary should always be contacted. Most breaches of League Rules stem from ignorance, costly mistakes being avoided by seeking advice. A telephone call is less costly than missed promotion etc due to avoidable point deduction. Try it, it really does makes sense.

Don Davies was elected Chairman, I, as a reluctant Secretary. I can only add how sad it was to see two very respected members, who I also consider my friends, fall out with each other over a game of table tennis. Things do get to us from time to time and there are times when we all need a break. I would ask you to remember your M.C. perform their tasks for the love of our sport and your enjoyment. I have derived no pleasure from the events which took place and only hope things settle down and we get back on an even keel. I also hope, most sincerely, that Tony and Stan sort out their differences, not just for the good of the game, but for themselves. Life is too short, made up of giving and getting, forgiving and forgetting **LETTER RECEIVED FROM TONY HARRIS:** Dear Ken. Having resigned as Organising Secretary in May, I would like to thank everyone for the support I received over the last five years.

LETTER FROM STAN CLARKE:

Dear Ken.

I wish to place on record the events which led to my resignation as League Chairman, as members are not aware of why I resigned. I joined the M.C. some 25 years back and some years ago was persuaded to allow myself to be nominated as Vice Chair. In 1998 I achieved a long held ambition when elected as Chairman. Throughout those 25 years I treated all matters discussed in a manner which I felt was to the benefit of this league. At no time did I attempt to use my position for the benefit of the club I was currently playing for.

During last season an obvious error was noted on a scorecard which I processed, the team concerned being from my own club. I acvised the F.S. of this, the matter being raised at the next M.C. meeting. To ensure the office of Chairman be seen as totally impartial I left the meeting whilst this matter was discussed. After a decision had been reached I rejoined the meeting and was advised of their decision; one that I had no argument with, or held any view on. However, on receiving my copy of the Minutes I was extremely concerned as too the reasons quoted in support of this decision, reasons which in my view were not supported by our Rules. I voiced my concern and my opinion that if any appeal was lodged the decision of the M.C. would almost certainly be overturned by an Appeals Board.

The club concerned did appeal and this matter rumbled on for some months as it was not possible to assemble an Appeals Board. At each meeting at which discussion on it took place, I withdrew from the meeting, the V.C. taking the chair. The M.C. took more decisions on this against which the club concerned also appealed. I wrote to the M.C. expressing my concerns and outlining the breaches of rule their decisions involved. I requested my letter be read to the meeting and withdrew whilst this took place. On rejoining the meeting, I was advised only the Secretary had read letter and as in his opinion the contents were sub judice it was agreed my letter would not be read out. To the best of my knowledge no other M.C. member has seen its content.

My copy of the Minutes of that meeting was accompanied by a letter of resignation from the Secretary. In view of its contents I had no option but to resign. I advised the President and V.C. in writing, also the secretary, at the same time urgently requesting he reconsider. I also offered to meet him to talk through any problems. To date I have not received a reply to any of my letters.

The M.C. decided to mediate by setting up a meeting between the President, V.C. Tony and myself. I rejected this, but offered to meet him alone if this could be arranged. I heard nothing more. At no time did any M.C. member contact me to ask me to reconsider. So much for any alleged cliques. Faced with similar circumstances, no one with any pride or honour would change their decision.

In conclusion, I totally refute the views expressed and consider my many years of service to be an expression of my commitment to the League. I wish the Clubs and members well and thank them for the support, friendship and trust shown me over the years.

EDITOR: We need to go forward, those concerned having now explained their side of these unfortunate happenings, this issue is now closed so far as I, as Editor, am concerned.

Our representative teams confirmed we were the top League in the region by winning an unprecedented haul of four major trophies. In a nutshell, the Men's and Ladies teams retained their respective titles, adding the Norman Cook Memorial Trophy for a record 6th time in ten years. After losing in the inaugural "Dennis Smith Memorial Trophy" final a year ago, the Veterans team, conceding four points in every game, overcame Salford and Farnworth in the final. Whilst we are proud of these achievements we have to endeavour to continue these standards, past glories should not be dwelt upon. However, for the time being we can enjoy the fruits of our players efforts. Well done, everyone concerned.

MEN; The Men's team made hard work of retaining their title after a shock draw with the then, bottom placed, Mid-Cheshire. This left us needing to gain maximum points in the remaining fixtures, including a victory over Wirral, who, at the halfway stage, boasted a 100% record. In the penultimate match, Wirral were the visitors, and needed to avoid defeat to win the title for the first time. The original fixture having been postponed at just 48 hours notice, when they were unable to field any of their first string. Bernie Wentworth, Rob Bevan and Chris Dunne never expecting that when it was played, they would be on the receiving end of a 9-1 drubbing. But that is what Adam Robertson, Keith Williams and John Rankin handed out. With a superior sets aggregate we only needed to avoid defeat against Salford and Farnworth in the last match for the title. In what was a disappointing finale, the 1998 Division 1 runners-up conceded this match. They had turned down six dates, the reason being that the team did not want to play us! The title remaining in our possession for the fourth season in a row. The season also marked the return of John Rankin after a lapse of twelve years. He collected his first city honours, helping secure the Norman Cooke Memorial Trophy and the Division One title. Adam Robertson completing his 3rd season in the Men's team, the 15 year old maintaining his 100% record for Liverpool. Ranked in the top 10 Men in England and the No.1 Junior, you should make an effort to see him in action if he plays for us again this season.

LADIES: Having won this title for the past three years, Brenda Buoey, Paula French and Delyth Davies, faced a couple of difficult matches if they were to retain their title. With Paula unavailable for the away fixture to Wirral, former three times Liverpool Closed Champion and former Colonsay player, Sue Burgess, was selected. She duly won her 4 sets in a 9-1 victory. However, as she subsequently did not play six Liverpool League matches by end of 1998, her L&C registration was cancelled and the result amended to 5-5. This left the girls having to beat title favourites, Oldham, to hold on to the crown. Oldham having a 100% record and a sets aggregate of 46 - 4 when the two teams met. But with the pressure on. Brenda. Paula and Delyth produced a magnificent 8-2 victory to claim the title for a fourth year in a row, and the tenth since 1987. Once again, well done, ladies.

doom and gloom. Their only win in the last 7 matches being agst WSM 'B' 6-4. Mark Miles won his 3 and took the doubles with Paul Faulkner. Roy Adams unusually lost his 3, albeit two of them were deuce in the 3rd. Peter Holmes played exceptionally well beating Roy 17 & 16. W'loo managed draws agst J.C. and B St 'B', lost to Cadwa 'B' 6-4; Ray Parkinson

winning his 3, and lost 7-3 to M'web, GPT 'B' and Fords.

Cadwa 'B' will be a bit aggrieved that Ian Wensley had to attend a school meeting on the night he was due to play agst his own 'B' team. No reserve being available the 'A' played short gifting 3 pts to their 'B' team who then finished just 2 pts above Cadwa 'B'. Ray Lavin bt Frank McCann, Trevor scraping through agst Peter Wass. They also took the doubles deuce in the 3rd to make it 6-4 for the 'B' team. They also beat WSM 'B' 6-4, Trevor getting a hat-trick; B. St 'B', J.C. and W'loo 'A' 7-3. Achieved draws agst M'web and JC 'A' and lost to Cadwa 'B' when without Trevor. After winning only one match in the 1st half they finished with 7 wins all told. Ouite a turn around.

WSM 'B' should have finished higher up the table and I'm a bit surprised they didn't. They suffered heavy defeats agst Cadwa 'A' 9-1; B St. 'B' 8-2 and lost 6-4 to GPT 'B'. W'loo and GPT 'A' (Steve Jones having an excellent win, 19 & 15 agst Ian). They bt Cadwa 'B' and M'web 6-4 and conceded a 10/0 w/over to JC 'A'. For most of the season Mark Miles was the mainstay of the team and should finish high in the averages with Roy Adams not far behind. Fords saved their season in their final match btg a full strength M'web team 8-2. As expected Police 'A' ran away with the C'ship. I don't know what the record points haul is for div 3, but they must have come close. 185 pts from 22 matches is outstanding form, especially when their best four did not play every match. The team was strengthened towards the end by the inclusion of Steve Gittins, a touch of overkill, or what? They finished 39 pts clear and capped a brilliant season by also winning the Hyde Cup.

M'web 'A' finished 2nd and I apologise to them for suggesting earlier that they appeared to have settled for a mid table spot. No more prophesies from me. The determination of the team to succeed was typified in their draw with Police 'A', with Alan Biggs btg Paula 19 in the 3rd, and Jon Dyson. Congratulations to thera, I wish them all the luck in the 2nd div. In 3rd place came my team, Police 'B'. I don't like to say too much about my own team, but we were considerably strengthened for the run-in by the inclusion of Jon Dyson and Dave Crispin. The importance of this to the team is shown by only 6 pts between us and 4th place. M'hull 'A' were 4th having battled hard throughout the season, but a "contested" 10/0 w/ over agst us cost them dear. They also conceded a w/over to Police 'A' in their cup semi final. These being the only 2 w/overs conceded. They had a strong line-up and should really have been contesting seriously with M'web 'A'. When they did play Police 'B' it was 6-4 to Police withTony Harris winning two, Police taking both doubles. I must admit that considering what had happened between the teams, the match was keenly contested and played in a friendly atmosphere.

Boo YM finished 5th, ten behind Police 'B'. a good team who, with a littl more luck, could easily have been contesting for promotion. At this point I would like to apologise to John Higham for an incident which occurred at our club. I was scoring a game between John and Tony and early in the game called a "let serve" which John did not hear. It was only later that he realised he was a couple of points down instead of, as he thought, the other way round. When Tony won this game, John walked away looking very angry. It was only later when enquiring of his team that I realised he was hard of hearing. I would now say, "SORRY, JOHN".

W'loo 'B' finished joint 6th and are my nomination for "hosts of the season." I will miss playing against this team. They started slowly before turning up the heat. Perhaps this

time they might start from match 1 and give everyone a shock. They could easily have taken M'web 'A's position, but maybe that was all part of their plan.

With them in 6th place were Cadwa 'C', a not toally unexpected result for them. They have used a total of 9 players which must have affected their consistency. They did show their pedigree by reaching the Hyde cup final having easily defeated my team in the semi. If they can acquire a settled four this time they should climb the table, who knows how high they might get.

Bath St 'C' finished 8th and, depending on who has been promoted, could find themselves battling agst relegation. I feel they may need to strengthen the team for this new season. It was noticed when they played agst us that there was some anger between them over a game selection by the captain. I used this knowledge when we played them again and this again seemed to invoke tension. Maybe they need to talk to each other and get it sorted out.

WSM 'E' have done the first job of a promoted team, to consolidate into the higher div. It is, in the main, the same team which won promotion, so they have done well. They could have done better had Bob Owen been available more often. When a teams' No.1 doesn't play it puts more pressure on the others, all playing up one position.

Their 'D' team finished just above them and should really have done a lot better. They have not been able to play their strongest team regularly and at times the team is un-recognisable from that expected. It is not for me to advise any club on team selection, but WSM could have put out a team to challenge for honours from their players in this div. It is sad to see three teams from one club occupying 3 of the bottom 4 places in the division.

Which brings me to WSM 'C', relegated with 63 points. This team is one which could expect to challenge strongly in div 4, but some unsolicited advice from me, you will have to start well and continue for the full season to win promotion back to this div. I believe they can do it, but am not convinced that they will want to.

Congratulations to M'hull 'B' our champions, along with a Cup, trophies and a tin of brasso. The top team of Tom Downing, George Frost, Harry McGanity and Bill Salter finally coasting home as their overall performance indicated they would. In their final 3 matches they dropped a mere 5 points. A characteristic comeback after a run of bad results which saw them lose 16 pts from 30. A draw agst rivals B St 'D' with 6 sets going to 3, Dave Cunningham btg Bill and George. The MOTM award going to Tom for his determined win over John McCann 19 -18 24. Without the services of Tom they had a narrow 6-4 win agst a Linacre team fighting to stay up. Reserve Alan Jones won his two, as did Harry Reeve for Linacre. A heavy 7-3 defeat by late challengers YM 'B'. Strong performances from Tim Ternent btg their 1&2 and Russell the 3&4.

Becoming champions isn't just about winning, it's equally about taking apart the opposition! As witnessed by the statistic that M'hull, Bath St and YM all tied in that they each only lost twice. But M'hull had fewest draws and most wins. Yep, M'hull 'B' are definitely a team with the right attitude for a higher div.

Runners-up YM 'B' developed their attitude much later on and Bath St 'D' looked favourites for 2nd place. However, YM 'B' had the best run-in of the contenders, finishing with an amazing 39 points from 40. Their 14th match, a draw, saw Harry and Bill on top form for Linacre. Then six straight wins. Accelerating from two 7-3's (Linacre and Bath St 'E') through a 9-1 agst Aigburth and into a nose bleeding three 10-nils (Boo YM 'A'. Cadwa 'D', M'web 'B'). Captain Russell infusing his team with confidence and correctly predicting promotion and cup success. PETER TAYLOR (CADWA TT CLUB)

His decision to retire gifting Cadwa two points which turned the result. George Crowley playing in the 8-2 win agst M'web. A 7-3 win agst A'burth, a 9-1 agst M'hull 'C' as they tried to also assist their stable mates cause. I think the boys of A'burth, Graham, Ray, Dave and Derek, saw the writing on the wall way back. Their match agst M'web provided an opportunity to turn things round, but the 3-7 result included 5 sets going to 3, M'web winning 4. An 8-2 defeat away to Cadwa followed and the dye was cast. Heavy defeats agst title contenders not balanced by pts from fellow strugglers. Agst H.H. they lost 10-0, Ray Jones possibly feeling more peeved at losing 19 in the 3rd to Mike Poole, than Dave Evans, who lost to Dave Cohen after taking the 2nd 23/21. The main question at the lower end has been who will go down with them. My own team. Cadwa 'D', had fits and starts, never quite able to get enough of a run to get out of the quagmire, but then again, never a pushover. There's always a danger that a div. writer will criticise himself and his team more than other teams, but I think it is true to say we can look back on a season of missed opportunities and failure to live up to expectations, than highlights. The highlight of the last part of the season was their 8-2 defeat of M'hull 'C' when Bert and Kathy were undefeated. Kathy, no doubt, gracious after close wins agst Steve McGanity and Brian Gregory (27/25 in 3rd). They were on the wrong end of an 8-2 when despite the return of Chris they came up agst H.H. with Jonathon Ash in top form.

The fight at the bottom end was just as exciting as that at the top so I've saved it til last...... Linacre managed to pull out of a 1st half downward spiral, not only because of the impressive efforts of Harry Reeve and Billy(I've heard good things about you)Clayton, but also because of Jack, Ken, Frank and Norman poaching points wherever they could. You will already have put the lawnmower away and replaced it with your bat. Doesn't time fly? So how did you fare last season? We may be the lowest div - to some, unimportant, but the fight for promotion was as intense as that of higher div's. Not finally settled until WSM 'F' forced their 'G' team into a playoff. LONG-PIMPLED RUBBER

It was agreed at the ETTA Annual meeting that the ITTF changes to long pimpled rubbers effective from 1st July 1999, will not apply to ETTA Approved Laws. As there has been no change in ITTF Laws under which "long pimples" are legal, they remain legal under ETTA Approved Laws. Play in Local Leagues' league competitions being governed by ETTA Approved Laws.

However, as a result of the 1998 ITTF Council decision, some types of racket covering material will no longer be authorised for play in competitions for which the use of authorised racket coverings is mandatory. These include, British League, County Championships and Open tournaments. Anyone playing in such competitions will need to ensure when doing so they use only ITTF authorised coverings as shown in ITTF List No.20 of Authorised Coverings.

If further changes are implemented after the 2000 Olympics, the ETTA will examine those with a view to amending ETTA Laws at that time, rather than piecemeal fashion now.

After 30 years at Elledge House Linacre had to find a new venue, the building having been put up for sale. They are now settled in at a nearby Methodist Church hall. For another thirty years, they hope. Same match night, Friday.

Two clubs, Bath St. and Linacre, have celebrated their 50th year as a T.T. Club.

Keith Williams recently gained more laurels in his role as a Veteran, winning a Banded Event and the Mixed Doubles at the popular York Veteran Tournament held recently. A good start to his season.

Our 'Closed' moved from Everton S.C. to the L'pool Tennis Centre enabling us to make use of our own equipment with a considerable financial saving. We also had a new hand at the helm, namely myself, following the standing down of Brian Leeson after many years as League Referee. The order of play was amended to commence with the VS, and follow this with the Over 55s to try and eliminate inevitable hold ups when players are involved in two events being played at the same time. We still experienced delay, there being a knock on effect to the Divisional Singles event. This problem, as I explained to the Management Committee, relates to competitors being able to enter both the Over 40 and Over 55 events. As in past years it was not possible to run these two events side by side, or to run any other event alongside either of them with the exception of a Jnr event. The entry figures were Vets - 38, O55 - 18 Even with 100% support from competitors an entry of 38 would require a minimum of 2 hrs to complete. Add a further 90-min to play off the 055 and introduce Div. Singles groups takes us up to 12.30. You can then add another 2 hours for that event with the possible introduction of the Men's Singles at 14.30. This is exactly what happened and we started most MS groups some 90-min later than scheduled. We did pick up some time during the afternoon and were able to start introducing Doubles matches around 5pm. Play was concluded by 7.30pm, and would have finished earlier had it not been for a series of protracted matches in the closing stages. The area was cleared and everyone away by 8pm. It is important to note that two players went through to the knockout from all Group play.

There are two possible answers to the scheduling and finishing time. Allow competitors entry to only one of the two Veteran events, or accept a later finishing time. Option one would enable an acceptable finishing time of around 18.00hrs. Option two would eliminate clashes by extending the playing schedule and giving a finishing time of around 8pm. Competitors do take exception to going straight back on, especially at an early stage of play, but our present practice of permitting entry to both Veteran events makes this unavoidable unless we accept a much later finishing time. I have no problem with either solution. When I go to a tournament, I do so with the expectation of being there until it is concluded. Most, if notjall, competitors want to get away a.s.a.p. when they have been eliminated. What no tournament ever gets is the 100% committed support of competitors and many delays can be traced back to individuals. A decision is needed that will give maximum possible play and the preparation of a schedule that can be adhered to. Let's have your views. I believe the format was right and my decision-to give maximum match play was also correct. The stumbling block was attempting an earlier finish than was realistically possible. This put pressure on competitors and officials. Not that the pressure bothered me. We had a mostly new team all round and I would thank Stan Clarke, Steve Perry, Frank Lacey, Alex Gould, Arthur Upton and George Smith for their considerable input and workload. Our thanks, also to Arthur Gamett for the loan of his PA. equipment. Without their help we could not have run what I believe was an excellent tournament. . I enjoyed the long awaited fulfilment of a personal ambition. Final Night saw an evening of first class play from the finalists and a new record set by Keith Williams when he won both the Men's and Veteran titles. A great final set by Keith and Kevin Dolder in the MS final made it a night to remember for everyone, especially Keith.
