

Division 3 Peter Ross (Bath St.)

t the time of writing, we are approximately one third of the way through the programme and already ominous signs have appeared to suggest the likely candidates for promotion and relegation.



The other note of significance, regards the standard of play which I thought last season was impressively high for a third division. I would suggest that on the evidence so far, that it is even higher this time around with several new players arriving and the return of one or two stars from the past. The decision by the Management Committee to give direct entry to Fords appears to have been justified with a rapid rise to the top with a current unblemished record. They are a side full of able and experienced players, with at least half a dozen seasoned campaigners to call upon. I was pleased to see Graham Reid again after a few years (we go back a long way) and he seems to be sharing the top spots with Frank James and Rob Goldson, and with Bill Proffitt and Alf Perry anchoring the side, they are giving very little away and they will take some stopping. Fortunately they are also a pleasure to against and are a welcome presence in the division, albeit it may be a short visit.

I think the team most likely to push Fords will be Manweb 'B' and they have been helped enormously by the return of an old face in Les Molyneux after more than 10 years absence from the game. He seems to have lost very little from his game and certainly has retained the same pleasant personality and enthusiasm. Apart from a rare double defeat at Marconi at the hands of Ian Wensley and Peter Wass, Les should not lose too many at this level. Also back moving like a young gazelle is Neil Jennings after a successful operation for a new hip. Neil at number four is a solid bet, and with father and son pair from the Wirral, Rob and Mike Parker, they are currently holding onto second place.

The teams most likely to push these two seem to be Marconi, Bootle YMCA and Police. Marconi have a good squad with Ian and Peter joined by Frank and John McCann and Bobby Bell, although their biggest problem may be ensuring getting their strongest side out at the right times. Incidentally at the time of writing, Peter remains unbeaten.

Police may be another team unsure of their top four, having used nine players to date, however with Gareth, Paula, Tony Harris, Richie Winkle and PCDC, they have a formidable squad. Plus Lenny Dyson has returned this very week after recovering from a broken arm. Ask him how he managed that!

Bootle YMCA. Have the welcome addition of Matt Poerschke from Germany in their squad together with the usual three of John Higham, Roly Wright and Danny Every. Matt already has a win over Graham Black to his name and is obviously a major acquisition to the team in view of the prolonged absence of Tom Killip. The team opened up the season with a great 8-2 victory over Waterloo, and considering that they have played against the higher teams in the division, they should not repeat their anxiety of last season when one point kept them from relegation. Incidentally, another team with a good social reputation.

Waterloo obviously have not let that early reverse bother them as they have followed up with sound wins over Bath St. and Marconi, and are particularly strong at the top of their order with Graeme and Julie. The team looks set for a solid season in their renovated premises. I hope everyone likes bright paintwork.

A significant gap appears over the next 6 teams which suggests that these will be fighting to avoid relegation. These consist of the two Maghull teams, the two Wavertree Labour teams, Bath St. and somewhat surprisingly, Manweb 'A'. I suspect that this is a false position because the team consists of Alun and Paul Evans, Paul Jennings and Alan Cameron. Additionally they have the benefits of being able to call in members of their 'B' team when needed. and I am sure they will finish very respectably. Incidentally Paul Jennings has the distinction of the hardest fought win of the season to date at 21 / 15, 25 / 27, 24 / 22. I mention it mainly because it was against me. (nice one Peter ' Editor').


Both Maghuil teams seem to have a battle on their hands and looking at the few Page 8

cards that I have, there are quite a few familiar names missing. Whilst the 'A' team have picked up the bulk of their points against the two bottom teams, with Eddie Preston driving them on, I think they will stay up. Maybe not so fortunate will be Maghull 'B', who despite a good 5-5 against a weakened Police team, are firmly entrenched at the bottom and they have a major battle on their hands.

Similarly so, are the two Wavertree Labour teams, and I have some sympathy for Ken Roberts, Gordon Langshaw and John Gratton who battled away last season only to finish at the foot of the table. Instead of some sanctuary in the fourth division they find themselves back in the higher sphere and I hope that they have better luck this time around. Wavertree 'C' are fairing a little better and have started with a couple of good wins under their belts, including a 7-3 against Bath St.. Tony Connor, Mike Ashton (with a new bat ?), Colin Fyles and Dave Williams should keep the side up.

Last but not least is the struggling Bath St., who despite having Billy Clayton in good form, we have made an inauspicious start, but hopefully Eddie Williams in his first season is gaining confidence and along with Les Gee and new acquisition, Neil Prichett, I think things may get better.

I repeat my earlier comment about the level of play which I think has been of an excellent standard up to now, but more important has been the friendly and sporting manner that is prevalent, and long may this continue. I hope everyone has a happy Christmas, and let us all look forward to a good 2002.



Division 4 Doug Baker (Cadwa)

Let me start by saying that in this edition I will be concentrating on the fortunes of the new comers to the division. I know it'll up set the regulars, but at least you'll get a bit of insight into the unknown forces.



Due to a number of factors CADWA C are with us this year. It'll be a one year only visa, as they are determined & skilful enough to make it a short sojourn. They called upon the services of George 'lefty' Higham in their first game of the season when their regular number 4 Ian Burrows couldn't make it for the "away" game v CADWA 'D'. A 9-1 statement of intent was made to a team that were looking to finish better than last years 4th, but only Jack Highton proved himself up to the challenge. I'm sure there's many a No. 1 in this division who won't relish the prospect of playing the whippet like Alan Davies. And which No. 1 thinks they'll be saying, a tongue in cheek, "well played" to Bob 'Toes' Peverall! The other member of their team. Pete Roberts, is going to be finishing well up the averages. Thus far Alan & Rob have undented records. All in all a nicer bunch of young guns you couldn't wish to meet. That's 60 to 62 overall; you won't get such value for money when we go 11 up. Anthony Mitchell had a better night beating Jimmy Clewett and Francis Lay in 2. Dave Foulis & Stephanie Howard also do more than make up the numbers, as testified by their undefeated singles v Bath St 'E', and Stephanie even took the shine off CADWA C's win by humbling Peter & Ian. In that match Anthony was very unlucky against Peter, comfortably taking the 1st then 20-15 up in the 2nd to lose, allowing Peter to regroup in the 3rd.

Linacre are back and determined to put down stakes. They have been in this division often and long enough to know that although every point counts, a whitewash from a title contender can be shrugged off, whereas a narrow defeat from a rival hurts all the more. They will already know where the big games will be. and it is crucial for them to win those games. Despite these stresses they are always most welcoming and play open table tennis where the gauntlet is thrown down in the manner of "I'll show you what I can do", although I've heard poor opinions on the venue and table. Harry Reeve is the mainstay of the team putting in great performances, but they all pulled together to salvage a draw against Maghull 'C'. As Bill Slater beat Harry, then Jack Davidson beat Bill. You get things like that in table ten-Their season opener had them playing nis. host to a Way Lab 'D' without Ken Armson. The most surprising thing that night was that Harry lost his two and Linacre still won!! Harry succumbed to Paul & Stan, whilst Jack Davidson beat Paul & Rez. Ken Ainsworth & Frank Lacey win one a piece, and placed alongside both doubles, they clocked up a 6-4. Since then WL.'D' haven't

lost a game and Linacre haven't won.

Liverpool YMCA 'C' stormed the 5th last year, a 19 point cushion twixt them and 2nd place, and not a game lost. When we played them I didn't know who'd come through the door, some new hot shots? But no it was Jimmy Clewett, Russell Thornton, Francis Lay and Alvin Tso. They proved they were not retreads but rejuvenalised. They've already found this division tougher. In two matches alone 14 games have been decided in the third set. Home advantage told in each case. Home against Manweb 'C', they won the 3 gamers 5-2, leading to a 5 all draw. More round robin connections saw Rob Conley beating Jimmy Clewett, but losing to Alvin, who in turn lost to Peter Carney. Away to CADWA 'D' the score was a not very representative 8-2 CADWA D. The match was all the more remarkable as CAD-WAs loses were Steve Critchley to Jimmy and Trevor Dolder to Russell: games I would have bet money on Steve & Trevor winning. Such is the resolve in the LYM camp. But determination was not quite enough in the other games. Despite often winning the first game, they couldn't close it down in the 2nd, and suffered a turn round in the 3rd. Perhaps, this is what they will find the biggest difference between the 4th and 5th divisions. Players, especially on home territory able to accept a 1st game defeat, and resolute enough to change ends, tactics and styles, to affect the result. I don't see CADWA having such a good result at the return fixture. LYM C will find the away games to new opponents and new venues the hardest aspect. Russell's boys don't look like a team that will be worrying about a return to the 5th come the end of season.

Bath Street 'E' have had a few tough openers, 0-10 v CADWA C. Dave Stoddern 19/21 in 3rd v Pete Roberts the nearest thing to a point, although Dave Cunningham at 23/21, 21/23, 17/21 v Ian Burrows was the closest match on the night. New leader in the highest score stakes of 61-65. And the closest match of the season - thus far, 126 points, but watch this space! The two Dave's seem to be the double star centres in a very changeable solar system. In the first 4 games of the season Bath Street have used 9 planets/players. Chris Blackburn enjoyed running rings around CADWA D, blazing a trail by holding his own in a 4-6 Page 10

black hole, although Jack Highton and I thanked our lucky stars in close games with Dave Batty and Dave Cunningham respectively. They've also walked away from Manweb 'C' with a victory, in part due to a concession in the doubles at the end of the evening.

Manweb 'C', are another club with strength in depth. No.3, Peter Carney has overcome neigh all opponents thus far. Including memorable victories over No.2's: Ken Armson (21/18 in 3rd), Jack Davidson, Alvin Tso and Dave Cunningham. Only Bootle YM's Mike Hughes has blotted the copy book, each game closer than the last till Mike snatched it 24/22. There have been personal scores of note for the rest of the team. Rob Conley beating Jimmy Clewett, Arthur Harrison surprising Stan Clarke (at Sheil Rd), Alan Radcliffe btg Ken Ainsworth, and John Ashley btg both Bert Rivers & Mike Hughes (after losing the 1st game in each). It's also very good to see Alan Biggs back. turning out and contributing points with wins over Johnny Tsang and BYMs Jim Cannon.

Emotions ran high at Bootle YM, when Peter Williams made a welcome return to TT after a long layoff, in the match v CADWA 'D'. The old skill hadn't deserted him and he helped his mates gain a draw, as Arthur Garnett led the way. I can't help but think Bert Rivers had too much guile when he came from behind to beat yours truly 23/21 in the 3rd.

Aigburths Graham Rollinson & Carl Anderson will swear the same. BYM's first victory of the season came at home against Maghull 'C', with Bert & Arthur keeping clean sheets. My best piece of advice when playing at Bootle YM, is to make sure the sets end in 2 straight. That way you'll have more time in the bar after the match to replay the evening's events.



Harold House have " imported " ex Aigburth player Barry Meyer, making a return to the game after a few years lay off. But Richard Beilin and Richie Blackburn took no prisoners

in the local derby between their 'A' and 'B' sides, both defeating Barry in 2 straight, but Eddie, Mike and Dave saw them through 7-3. Can I remind teams, it would be of enormous help if the "PLAYED" record on the bottom of the match card was filled in, notable offenders being both Harold House' A' and 'B' and Greenbank. If you want up to-date League Tables, then make Paula's' job easier as Fixture Sec.

I only have one home card for Marconi, but they swept the newly formed Ladies of Bath St. 'H' away 10-0, no game going to three!, Getting up early to get the buses out must suit them!. They also gave the same treatment to Bath St. 'G' (one of the three Bath St. Teams in this Division), only reserve Barbara Alcock from the Ladies team losing in 3 to Kevin O'Hanlon and Leigh Dunn, putting up resistance. They seem to have adequate reserves at Marconi and will be up there with the top teams come seasons end.

Comments by the Professionals about the 11up scoring

Jan-Ove Waldner (Sweden)

"Playing to 11 points makes the game more interesting, it's more intense and you always have a chance. Previously when a player had a big lead, 15-5 for instance, the game was over and not interesting. Now we play far fewer ' irrelevant points ' and it doesn't effect my game. Changing to a larger ball and altering the the service rule affects the way you play, playing to eleven doesn't affect your techique".

Editor

I suppose you could say that the majority of points between 6 and 18 are irrelevant points, but how many times do you see the control of the game change during these points, and a player having a big lead at 19, but losing it after a nail biter finish

Petra Lovas (HUN)

" It's terrible. I hate it. You have only two services before you change, before you had five services and you could change your tactics. The big points come very quickly, you must concentrate much harder

Jorgen Persson (SWE.)

"It's good, it makes matches exciting. I'm in favour of the shorter game, but I would have liked to have kept the concept of 21 points. Perhaps by starting at 10-10 as we did in training. You have to concentrate from the first point and you cannot afford to make unforced errors.

Nicola Deaton (ENG.)

I'm a traditionalist but we have to move forward, and playing to 11 points is exciting for the spectators and we must consider what is best for the future of the sport.

Olga Nemes (GER.)

For the spectators it's fine but for me it's difficult; now you have no time to adjust, it's tough mentally. Playing to 11 is a different game.

Promotions and Relegations

Did you read the report of the "Appeal Board Hearing" in the last Digest (Vol 55 No.2), which referred to the issue of how many teams go down, after one of the teams in a division has dropped out after the start of the season, leaving that division one team short.

RULE 21 is quite clear on this, Paragraph 1 says "The bottom 2 teams of the division shall be relegated, and the top 2 teams of the lower division shall be promoted to the higher division, (para. 2 deals with teams finishing with equal points)

Paragraph 3 goes on to say that "The Committee shall have at their discretion, the power to promote a team, should a vacancy occur in a higher Division". there's more to this paragraph, but in this case I don't need to repeat it.

So I think in this case, the Appeal Boards decision to uphold the Committees decision last season (2 down, 3 up) was a right one, This problem arose in the 1st/2nd. Div. and the 3rd/4th. Div., mind you the situation in the 3rd/4th. Div. was slightly different, in as much that Fords wanted to enter a new team into the league, and as the strength of the new team was well known, the Committee decided to put this new team into the 3rd div. to fill the vacancy of the team who dropped out last season, (a decision vindicated by Fords 'A' now sitting on top of div.3), but has it weakened their 1st. team, because they are now sitting at the bottom of the 1st. div.

Anyway, a clear precedent has now been set, the bottom 2 clubs in that Division, who finish the season, go down.

With Merseyside Police 'A' dropping out of Div.1, and Wavertree Labour 'F' not getting started in Div. 4, we could have a repeat of the situation at the end of this season, so follow those League Tables closely.

DO YOU WANT NEW YOUNG **BLOOD?**

Ken Armson. **Coaching Secretary**

have repeatedly made reference to the need for players to get involved on the coaching and recruitment of young players to ensure a regular influx of younger players and the continued future of our league and at the risk of boring you I am saying it again. All too often previous requests have been ignored but at last we are beginning to see a light at the end of the tunnel. What we need now is for that light to become bigger and shine more brightly and that is why we need YOU to take an interest in coaching.

We are light years behind Wirral who have a thriving coaching scene and have successfully integrated with a number of schools for it is in schools that the future table tennis players are waiting to be discovered.

In our city all most schools are interested in, and most other people for that matter, is football. Most sporting comment in the Liverpool Echo is about football and if you buy it to read about other sports you won't find much to read. In every school there are many youngsters not interested in football who may be interested in taking up another sport and some schools are at last beginning to realise that there is more to a sporting life than football. We have to capitalise on this and get them focussed on table tennis as league members in other towns and cities are doing.

We have made a good start in that Stan Clarke is now coaching in Archbishop Beck, Arthur Garnett and Dave Oakes are working within Childwall Comprehensive and waiting to go on a coaching course. They also managed to rustle up some tables to get the school started until they can obtain their own. I am also talking with an interested teacher at Gateacre Comprehensive who is introducing table tennis into the school curriculum. Bath St also run coaching sessions and Dave and Sylvia Graham work within the Formby area. Their club having two teams of promising youngster playing in the National Junior League, Liverpool have none.

Since the Tennis Centre ejected us we have been without a venue for our league coaching ses-

sion but now have a new venue, Lee Manor We are slowly building up Sports Centre. attendance and expect to be functioning fully by the New Year. Our new venue is more suitable as we have our own Gym and are not dependent on any other party. The same team are now coaching at Lee Manor, Bill Proffitt, Alan Biggs, George Smith and Graham Rollinson and we welcome further assistance.

Your league is willing to assist any member interested in qualifying as a Coach and attending the required Course. These are held over several weekends, generally of three or four day's duration the qualifying test being taken on the final day. You don't have to be a qualified coach to assist in this important area but it obviously makes sense to become qualified if you intend to get involved in recruitment and retention of interested youngsters.

Many of you have taken a lot out of table tennis over the years and coaching is one way of putting something back into our sport and by doing so you will help ensure our continued existence and expansion and in return you gain personal satisfaction from watching someone you started off going on to become a dedicated table tennis player. Champions don't grow on trees and neither are they born as such, someone has to get them started and that person just could be you. Desmond Douglas became a table tennis player more by accident than intention and went on to become one of England's greatest ever players. There are many possible youngsters like him out there but they will not come looking for us we will have to go looking for them.

ORIGINS OF TABLE TENNIS

able tennis burst explosively onto the sports scene towards the end of the nineteenth century and is commonly believed to be a miniature version of lawn tennis. Formerly known as Flim-Flam and Whif-Whaf, its origins however are shrouded in mystery. Theories that the game was first played by the Syrians, Japanese, French and North American Red Indians seem unlikely and the hard evidence points to the English as the inventors of the game.

Arthur Parker, author of 'Ping Pong and How to Play it', 1902, refers to rumours that the game was played as early as 1881 with cigar box lids for bats, champagne corks for balls and a row of books for a net, but this has not been authenticated.

The first catalogue which advertised the game as 'Miniature Indoor Lawn Tennis' was published by F.H. Ayres in 1884 and in 1889, Mr Charles Barter of Gloucestershire patented the game as played with cork balls, clamp posts and rectangular wooden bats covered with bookbinders' cloth to give a 'twist to the ball'.

The first celluloid ball was introduced about 1890 when a Mr James Gibb returned from a business trip to the United States with a supply of toy balls he had spotted there.

Mr. Gibb is also credited with coining the name 'Ping Pong' which he used mockingly when watching a couple of 'stonewallers' at play, and repeated the sound the ball made on the bat and table. He persuaded his neighbour, sports manufacturer, John Jaques to register the game, which he did in 1891, using the title 'Ping Pong or Gossima'.

Further confirmation of the English theory is the well documented story of Mr Goode who lived in Putney.

In 1902 Mr Goode was a contestant in the Great Ping Pong tournament in what was then the Royal Aquarium at Westminster.

On the Saturday before the tournament he left his office with a nasty headache and called into the local chemist. At the counter his eyes fixed on the chemist's rubber cash mat and he went home with the cash mat as part of his purchase. Then he cut down the uneven rubber spikes and pasted the rubber mat onto his bat, and he practised over the weekend until he had developed a capable back hand flick stroke.

His subsequent top spin progress through the tournament was amazing as none of the record 300 competitors could match him. In the final Mr Goode thrashed the then English Ping Pong champion, Mr A. C. Parker by 50 points to 3.

Until the very end of the nineteenth century, table tennis was very much a parlour game, played in the home on large dining tables. The equipment in those days was very primitive, with the balls being made of cork or India rubber and the bats being little more than stiff cardboard.

Ping Pong enjoyed a period of spectacular popularity in the early years of the twentieth century. At this time a cheap version of the game, placed on the market under the trade name, 'Ping Pong' made its way into virtually every home, and became the craze of the day.

Ping Pong leagues were formed at local level and in the season 1901/1902 frequent tournaments were played all over Great Britain, attracting up to 300 competitors, with regular prizes of up to £100.00 available.

One of the main manufacturers of table tennis equipment at the time, the Table Tennis Supply Association were forced to move to larger premises, due to the demand for equipment and were honoured with an order from HRH Princess Victoria.

Many Ping Pong Halls were established and even set up in public houses, hotels and working men's clubs, leading a reporter in the Sussex Daily Post to write,

'It seems extraordinary that grown up persons should forsake the billiard table, as many have, and devote their attentions to what seems to me to be the effeminate game of ping pong. The game is simplicity itself and almost savours juvenility'.

PING PONG V TABLE TENNIS

There were two groups of players at the time, the Ping Pong players and the Table Tennis players.

A weekly journal for table tennis and ping pong players, 'The Table Tennis and Pastimes Pioneer', was in existence at the time and contained articles on the merits of ping pong as opposed to table tennis.

Such was the rivalry between the 'Ping Pongists' and the Table Tennis players that two independent associations were formed. The Table Tennis Association was set up on 12th December, 1901, and the Ping Pong Association just four days later, the latter adopting a double bounce service, the former allowing players to serve over the net without a bounce.

There were many pleas for unity, with many of the view that it was a great mistake in allowing two associations to be formed to govern two games that were so similar.

Although there was a fanatical following of the new sport, there were many who opposed it, and anti ping pong groups were formed. The 'Pioneer', of Saturday 18th January, 1902, contains a rather prophetic article from the Daily Mail.

For the sake of the unenthusiastic and the people with nerves, let us have some rest or ping pong will follow its victims into an early grave.

EDITORS COMMENT

In 1902 a Mr.Goode won The Great Ping Pong Tournament using a rubber cash mat with rubber spikes off a chemist shop counter, most probably the forerunner of todays TSP Curl rubbers!!!!!

Did you know that there are over 22 million registered table tennis players world wide, second only to soccer as a played sport ,but 20 million of those players are in China, where it is recognised as their National sport, most cities have dedicated schools for the coaching of table tennis during the normal course of education, another reason for us to get involved with our local schools.

Back to Tony's book,

This is the leagues 75th. Year, and would have been the ideal time for publication, but Tony still needs more confirmation orders to keep the book price under £10, and as well as interesting reading, every purchaser will get a mention in 'The Roll of Honour' section.

So for an order form,

Rubbers -: legal or not legal

always read Don Davies's reports in the Liverpool Echo, and his report on the Veterans match between Liverpool 'B' and Oldham 'B' in the Lancashire & Cheshire League which ' came to controversial end ', when the Liverpool non playing captain questioned the legality of an Oldham players bat, (the player concerned admitted the bat was illegal), even so the rest of the Oldham team refused to continue. I'm probably a bit naïve at what goes on at this level, but I'd have thought the player concerned would have accepted that he'd been rumbled and got another bat out of his bag and carried on with the match, mine may be a rather simplistic view, but is the desire to win heading in the wrong direction.

Anyway I was a bit intrigued by this situation and decided to have a look at the ETTA. (our governing body) web site to see what was mentioned about rubbers, or as they describe them, Authorised Racket Coverings, it was list 22 for 2001 to 2002. I was amazed to find that there were 805 legal rubbers listed, and a total of 87 manufacturers, mind you these are world wide, so it's just as well that our local distributors cut these lists down dramatically, otherwise, I for one, would never be able to decide on a rubber, it's bad enough now. It certainly isn't in a manufacturers interest to produce rubbers which aren't going to be accepted by T.T.governing bodies (I may stand corrected on that one).

At the start of the list is a paragraph which I think needs a mention in full-:

"Dark sponge(black, blue, brown, green, purple, red) should not be used under translucent (letting light pass through, but not transparent, (my inclusion)) red coverings, (most red coverings are translucent). It is the PLAYERS responsibility to use a racket covering which appears BRIGHT RED, and the use of a dark sponge under a translucent top sheet is likely to make the rubber illegal. Even if racket coverings appear in this List without reference to sponge, the law 2.4.3. Governs the use of sponge"

Rule 2.4.3. Governs the maximum thickness of the covering i.e. ordinary rubber to a max. of 2mm thick, and sandwich rubber to a max. of 4 mm, thick (both including the adhesive), don't pile the glue on. Page 18

Having read all this, I thought, where's the relevance here, the sponge is already on the rubber, and I've only seen a light colour used, but then the Barna type rubbers came to mind, could these be built up as " questionable rubbers "by the use of thin rubber sheet as a sandwich rubber, rules 2.4.3.1 describes the outer covering as 'non cellular' and the sponge as 'cellular'.

Hmmmm. Got it you chemistry buffs?.

This tale brings to mind the story of Mr. Goode who won the Great Ping Pong Tournament in 1902 (Tony Harris's History Of Table Tennis excerpt on pages 12 & 13) by the first use of pimples, before everyone else got it and rules were made.
