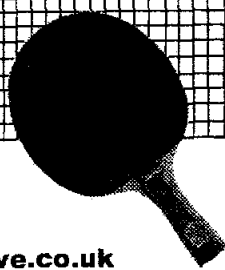
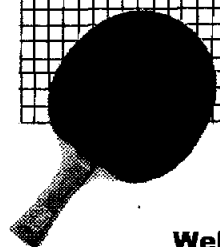

This \$350,000 extravaganza of Table Tennis was a collection of the Worlds top players competing for BIG prize money, a re-match of this years Mens' World Championship Final, and a round of the Japan Million Dollar "Super Circuit", then to finish up with New Year in the States, not bad if you have a 'few bob' to spare.

The league has lost a well regarded top player, and Wavertree Labour, a popular club man, John Gratton, John having been out of work most of the year, after many, many attempts, recently accepted an offer, which will mean eventually moving to Sheffield, I'm sure John will soon be playing again, as I believe Sheffield has a thriving table tennis scene, with more leagues and clubs than we have, so 'good luck' to John from everyone here.

There are a few contentious issues you will read about raised in the Div. Reports,

Players gaining advantage by the use of foul serves, always a problem, but what is the answer, I know there should only be one answer to that question, but I would love to hear "YOUR" thoughts on this one. Another is when Clubs rank players below their known capability, my thought is that some players just want to play in a certain team to play with their 'mates', it isn't a new problem, but at the end of the day, the "spirit" of the game is made a little hazy. What does stretch the rules a bit is when a 'B' team gets relegated from a higher division, and a 'C' from the same club, gets promotion into the same division, with the make up of the teams more or less the same as before, why does the 'B' team then become the 'C' and the 'C' team the 'B' team, I was told that it helped with the unavailability of players,

and it's better than playing short, that may be so, but that simplified thinking certainly gives a big advantage to a club, how can a 2nd. Division team be ranked lower than a 4th. Division team the following season I think there needs to be a bit more thinking on this one.

While I have been putting this together, my favourite magazine has just dropped through the letter box, Table Tennis News, all the years I have been playing TT. I didn't know it existed, only since taking on the Digest, did I come to read it, (my thanks to Brenda Buoei who lent me a few back issues got me started, I get my own now) I know some players just want to play a game, but if you want to understand the in's & out's of the sport, I thoroughly recommend this

mag. A full A4 glossy, loads of pages and pics. and information on your sport, only £21 for 8 issues through your letterbox, I know we could pass them around, but what's that classic "cheaper than a packet of cigs a week" more information can be got by asking around.

Your CLOSED CHAMPIONSHIPS

We have finally agreed a date for our Closed event with the Tennis Centre and this will take place on Sunday 15 February, an entry form has been included as part of this magazine.

On the same day at the request of the City Leisure Services we will be running alongside our event a Cadet & Junior event open only to boys and girls resident in Liverpool who do not play for a club in an organised league. This being part of the Leisure Services Sports Development programme.

Entries have been steadily reducing over the past 3-4 years and this trend needs to be reversed if we are to continue organising this annual event. This applies particularly in respect of our divisional championships as this event has been very poorly supported and requests for your views have met with no response. Our divisional championships should be seen as an opportunity to compete against players in your own division away from league competition and also an opportunity to socialise. The A team of Ken Jackson, Ahmed and Fred Bainbridge returned from Trafford with a 7-3 scoreline although their next match was postponed by Preston due to their 75th anniversary dinner on the same night.

The A team were division two champions last season one but the line-up for their opening four matches, also in Lancaster, and the subsequent results deserves an explanation. The title winning side was due to kick off but Les Molyneux withdrew due to illness just a few days before the matches - Omid Khaiyat then dropping out for family reasons

which left just Ahmed Thabet. I then tried more than a dozen suitable players but for various reasons, was unable to obtain a full team. With just one day before the matches and still without a full compliment, I left for an evening dinner in Cumbria, still waiting for confirmation from a couple of players. Both before and immediately following dinner, I continued on the mobile until at 10.50pm, I persuaded two already 'signed on' players to travel. A few minutes later though, due

to a change in circumstances, one pulled out and on telephoning Ahmed to advise that we had only two players, he reluctantly withdrew due to a family illness. By now it was after 11 pm. and the one remaining player decided against it, which left me without a team.

At that point I rang my brother Rob and we decided to play, mainly to avoid a £60 fine. I arrived home at 3am and we left for Lancaster at 7-30. Each match was lost 6-0 which reduced the fine to £20 for playing just one short. This leaves us bottom but with three matches to play and providing we turn out a good team, we should avoid relegation but it was not a satisfactory state of affairs.

The British League Premier Division.

For those who like to watch top class table tennis why not go along to the Halton Table Tennis Centre, which is at the Auto Quest Stadium, Widnes, 'just down the road' to see the 3rd. round of the new format British League Premier Division, now played over 4 various week ends, the next one is a one day event on Sunday January 25th, with the top 8 teams in the country taking part, 4 matches in the morning and 4 in the afternoon, the morning matches start at 10am. Our local interest is of course the Seasiders, who have local players Kevin Dolder, John Rankin and Ian Girdler playing in the Premier Div. team, (but also includes many other locals who play in other British League divisions for Seasiders), last season was Seasiders first season in the Premier Div. and would have got second spot if it were not for a controversial last match between two London Clubs. This season Seasiders got off to a bad start, not being able to field their full strength squad for the first weekend, and consequently closely losing all their matches.

The second weekend was the other side of the coin, with a full strength squad to pick from, the team being Jonathan Taylor (former England International) a young Adam Bleakly, National Junior Boys No.6, (recently moved from the Halton Croda Club), Greg Baker, National Junior Boys No.7, and Kevin Dolder. National ranked 34. Seasiders started off what was to be a very memorable weekend by polishing off Batts Team Peniel 1, (the team that "pipped" Seasiders into 2nd. Place last season) 6 games to 2. But the afternoon match was the icing on the cake, against a full strength London Progress team, no team is supposed to beat Progress, but Seasiders had forgotten that one, and powered on to a fantastic 5-3 win, only the second defeat in 5 years for London Progress 1. The next day started well with a 7-1 win over Derwent 1, but the bubble burst with the last game, going down 5-3 to a Barnet team that included stars of the future young Tim Yarnall and Darius Knight, currently ranked National Juniors at 2 and 4 respectively.

So the next weekend could be full of high class table tennis, with a lot of star names, and maybe a few surprises, so put it in your diary, January 25th. The Auto Quest Stadium, Widnes, starts 10am.

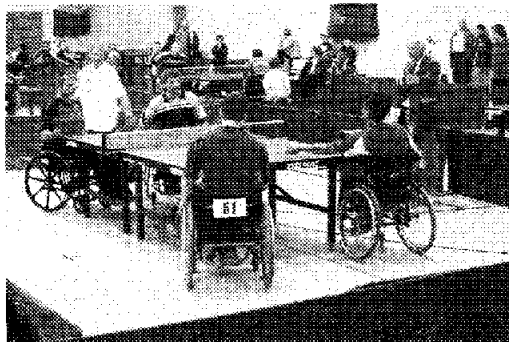

Everybody who took part can feel proud.

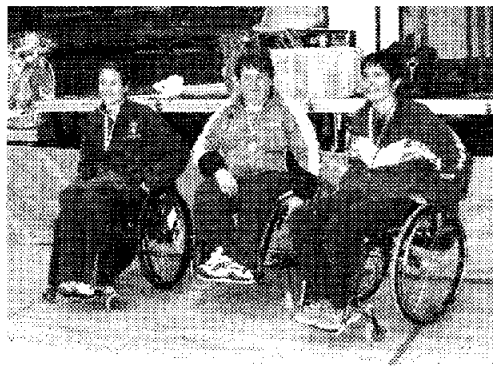

The most notable wins in the City of Liverpool open, were by Neil Robinson and Lynne Riding. Robinson won the class three event, beating Oerjan Kylevik of Sweden in a thrilling five set final. Robinson actually winning the 3rd set 19-17. Riding beat the top ranked class 2 player, Genevieve Clot, France, in her final within 4 sets.

This was Lynne's best win to date, as Clot was ranked at number one at the mid term of this year.

The women's open tournament was won by Satoko Fujiwara from Japan, beating Alena Kanova in another close match. The men's open was won by Germany's Selcuk Cetin who out fought his compatriot Jan Gurtler in the final. World number two, Christophe Durand won bronze in this event, gaining his revenge later in the class five final beating our own Scott Robertson. Robertson also won bronze in the Class 5 Team with Stefan Trofan.

Other notable GB performances were by Mark Palmer and Arnie Chan, who won Gold against Little-

He has won 5 out of his 6 games played in the Southport 2nd. Div. This current season.

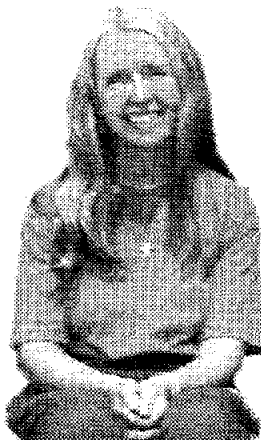
This season he has moved into the Liverpool League arena, playing for Maghull 'A' in the 4th. Division.

Anyway, welcome to a new season where the talking point remains the 11 up scoring system that was imposed on us. I've found that the 11 up is great if you win but a



load of rubbish if you lose. It certainly makes our sport different with many games won and lost in the head (if you know what I mean!).

After agreeing to write these notes I intend to use the power of the pen to raise some of the contentious issues (fiddles) that arise

every season and are seemingly allowed to happen by our Management Committee (more of that later).

But back to the business in hand. The division is headed by Police 'B' with just a few points separating the chasing pack of CADWA 'C', Bootle YMCA, Manweb 'B' and Bath St 'D'.

Police 'B' remain unbeaten after 6 matches and their regular foursome of Tony Harris, Paula French, Len Dyson and Brian Burrows have been strengthened by cameo appearances by Gavin Lloyd and Clare Langford. They had a tough opening match at Manweb 'B' and were surprised to see Trevor Barraclough play-

ing at number 4. Trevor is the same tough opponent he has always been and he won his two for Manweb, bemusing Brian Burrows and then coming from two games down to beat Len Dyson 11-8 in the fifth. Another tough game in week 2 saw a Police 'B' 6-4 victory over Bootle YMCA, the winning margin being guaranteed by Police taking both doubles points. Further 8-2 wins versus 'Wav. Lab 'B', 9-1 versus CADWA 'B' and 9-1 versus Marconi 'B' have put Police 'B' in a strong position at the top and it's going to take a good team to dislodge them.

The CADWA 'C' team of George Lennon, Steve Graham, Rob Davies and George Higham are a strong outfit and quite capable of winning the race for the title, especially as they can and have called on Colin Rourke as a reserve on a couple of occasions. Week 1 saw a comfortable 7-3 win over Bath St 'C', George Lennon winning his two v Rob Peat, 11-4 in the fifth and Dave Stoddern in three. After a 10-0 win over Waterloo 'B' they beat Manweb 'B' 7-3. George Higham starred for CADWA as he won his doubles, beat Alan Cameron and topped the evening off with a magnificent fight back win over Trevor Barraclough, 8-11, 10-12, 11-9, 11-6, 12-10 (some game!!). The only blip to CADWA 'C' s excellent start to the season was a 3-7 defeat at home by Bootle YMCA, who were strengthened at number 4 by reserve Matt Poershke who won his two. They bounced back in week 5 with an 8-2 away win at Wav. Lab 'B' where number 1 George Lennon kept up his 100% start to the season.

The Bootle YMCA team of John Higham, Roly Wright, Danny Every and Ritchie Winckle are lying in third spot and are quite capa-

ble of making a push for promotion (if they really want it that is!) A 6-4 win over Manweb 'C' in week 1 was followed with a convincing 9-1 victory against an under strength Wav. Lab. 'C'. They then beat Bath St 'C' away, 7-3, despite Ricky Brown coming in at number 1 for Bath St and winning his two. Danny Every had good straight games victories over Rob Peat and Billy Clayton. New slimline Ritchie Winckle seems to be getting to grips with his long pimple forehead rubber (what is it about Bootle YM and funny rubbers anyway?) and he had an excellent double over Dave Stoddern, 3-1, and Billy Clayton, 11-9, 12-14, 11-3, 14-12. (I don't think that would have happened a couple of seasons ago!)

The Bath St 'D' team of Steve Nield, Les Gee, Peter Ross and Billy Clayton are a very experienced set up and they will be there or thereabouts at the finish. Steve Nield won his two in a week 1 6-4 victory away at CADWA 'B', coming from two games down to beat Billy Hargreaves, 11-9 in the decider, and also took part in a five gamer with Rob Peverall, 11-8 in the fifth. Week 2 saw the Bath Street derby resulting in a convincing 7-3 victory for the 'D' team over the 'C' team.

Which brings me to my first contentious issue.

It is obvious to everyone, and results and divisional positions confirm it, that the bath St 'D' team is much stronger than the 'C' team. **Why then are the club allowed to place the obviously stronger group of players below the weaker group, therefore gaining an unfair advantage when it comes to playing reserves?** Any member of the 'D' team, or in fact all of the 'D' team could play as a

reserve (s) in a match against another team.

COME ON MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE - THIS CANNOT BE RIGHT!! These loopholes in the rules that allow clubs to 'fiddle' albeit within the existing rules, need sorting out!

The exact same situation exists with the two CADWA teams in this division, the 'C' team pushing for the title and the 'B' team fighting relegation, but able to call on stronger 'C' team members when needed.

Back to results. Bath St 'D' had a convincing 8-2 victory away at Marconi 'B' followed by a tight 6-4 win at Waterloo 'B' where Billy Clayton starred, winning his doubles and defeating G. Oates 3-1 and K. Wright in three straight. The absence of Les Gee in week 5 against Manweb 'C' may have been a factor in their 4-6 defeat.

The Manweb 'B' team of Alan Evans, Paul Jennings, Sharon Norman and Trevor Barraclough are another side capable of mounting a serious challenge for the title. Their 7-3 week 1 defeat by police 'B' was followed by a strong 8-2 victory away at Wav' Lab' 'C' (both doubles to Wav) but they then came up against a strong CADWA 'C' and were without the services of Paul Jennings. With Colin Rourke at number 1 CADWA 'C' were too strong although Sharon had a good win over Rob Davies, 11-9 in the fifth. Restored to full strength in week 4 Manweb 'B' thrashed Bath St 'C' 9-1 and followed this with a 10-0 walloping of Waterloo 'B'

Both Wav. Lab teams should manage a mid table position but with the loss of John Gratton (new job in Sheffield, well done John!) the 'B' team may get sucked into the relegation battle. This **Wav. Lab. 'B'** team of Peter Howden, John Gratton, Paul Banks and Dave Foulis started the campaign with a good 8-2 victory over newly promoted Marconi 'B'. A 6-4 away win at Manweb 'C' where the much improved Paul Banks won his two, 11-7 v Peter Carney in the fifth, and 3-1 v Arthur Harrison, was followed by an 8-2 defeat to Police 'B'. In this game Peter Howden and Paul Banks both played well beating Police number 1 Tony Harris.

The Wav. Lab derby match resulted in a 5-5 draw. Tony Connor starred for the 'C' team with wins over Peter Howden and John Gratton, both 3-1, while Paul Banks for the 'B' team beat Dave Williams, 3-0, before an epic battle with Mike Ashton went Paul's way 13-11 in the fifth. An 8-2 defeat by CADWA 'C' brought the Wav. Lab 'B' team back to earth although Peter Howden and Dave Foulis did well to earn a point each with wins over Steve Graham and Rob Davies respectively, both in the fifth.

The **Wav. Lab 'C'** team of Tony Connor, Mike Ashton, Colin Fyles and Dave Williams should be good enough to stay in the division if they can field this foursome on a regular basis. They opened their account with two reserves against Waterloo and still came away with a 6-4 win, Tony Connor winning his two v Ted Cramsie and Harry Nelson. Back to full strength against Manweb 'B' they lost 8-2 mustering the two pints from the doubles. Another heavy defeat followed, 9-1 away at Bootle YMCA, Tony Connor picking up the sole point with a 3-1 win over Roly Wright, who

admits, 'I just can't seem to do anything with Tony's bat (Roly, you could have hidden it, sat on it or put it on a bonfire!!). A good result was needed in week 5 and it came with a 7-3 victory over CADWA 'B'. Tony Connor and Mike Ashton were the stars on the night, pairing up for a doubles win, and four further points with wins for Tony v Rob Peverall, and Mike v Rob 11-5 in the fifth and peter Roberts 3-1.

Manweb 'C' don't seem to have a regular foursome but looking at the players available to them they should finish above the relegation battle in mid table. Up to now (five games played) they have used 8 players but their 'regular' teams seems to be Neil Jennings, Peter Carney, Alan Cameron and Allan Biggs. A battling performance v Bootle YMCA in week 1 earned Manweb 'C' 4 points, Rob Barker winning his two v Danny Every and an excellent win over John Higham 11-4 in the fifth. The same result away at Wav. Lab 'B' doubled their points although with a very different team, John Ashley and Arthur Harrison coming in to the fray. They earned a draw at CADWA 'B', Rob Barker again winning two, over Rob Peverall 11-7 in the fifth and Peter Roberts in straight games. Man of the Match however was Doug Baker for CADWA 'B' as he gained a valuable doubles point with Peter Roberts v Rob Barker and John Ashley, coupled with fine wins over John and Allan Biggs, both 3-1. They recorded their first win of the season in week 5, a tremendous 6-4 away win at Bath St 'D'. Allan Biggs starred with wins over Peter Ross and Billy Clayton as well as his doubles.

At this early stage of the season the relegation battle looks like being between Bath St 'C', CADWA 'B', Waterloo 'B' and

Marconi 'B'. My favourites for the drop are the latter two as they don't have stronger reserves to draft in when needed, from their stronger groupings below (see previous contentious issue paragraph)

The **CADWA 'B'** team of Rob Peverall, Ian Burrows, Peter Roberts plus one other are still to record their first win in Division 3. A 4-6 defeat at Bath St 'D' in week 1 was followed by a battling draw at Marconi 'B' considering CADWA only had three players on show. Rob Peverall played a captain's innings picking up points with wins over Andrew Owens and Ted Gilmour. Rob Davies came in as their 'plus one' in the home match v wav. Lab 'C' and was engrossed in two grueling encounters with Colin Fyles and Dave Williams. Rob came back from two down to beat Colin 9-11, 3-11, 20-18, 11-8, 11-9, and then to prove it was no fluke he beat Dave 11-9 also in the fifth.

Bath St 'C' will also struggle especially when it appears that they don't have a team. Rob Peat and Dave Stoddern are regulars but you can perm any two from the rest of the club to see who makes up the foursome. The started with a 3-7 defeat v CADWA 'C' with Dave Stoddern and Peter Joiner picking up points with wins v Rob Davies (11-4 in the fifth) and Steve Graham respectively. Defeats at Waterloo 'B' 4-6, Manweb 'B' 1-9 and Bootle YMCA 3-7 have left Bath St in a mess. Rob Peat is a battler and he will continue to pick up points but I must admit I feel sorry for him as he struggles each week to find a team.

Marconi 'B', Andrew Owens, Ted Gilmour, John McCann and Bobby Bell, are finding life in Division 3 tough going after coming up from the fourth. They were beaten 8-2 away at Wav. Lab 'B' with Andrew Owens and Ted Gilmour picking up the points courtesy of Peter Howden. The same score line followed away at bath St 'D', John McCann beating Peter Ross and the other point coming from the doubles. However, a 6-4 victory at Manweb 'C' could have been even better as three of Manweb's points came from tight fifth game deciders. Man of the Match John Moore beat Peter Carney and John Ashley as well as a doubles win with Bobby Bell who also beat John in the singles.

Waterloo 'B' are propping up the division and although Ted Cramsie, Harry nelson, Ken Nelson and G. Oates will battle all the way it's difficult to see how they are going to escape (what's happened to Julie and Ro?). In the week 1 defeat to Wav. Lab 'C', 4-6, they managed to pick up both doubles points with Ted Cramsie and G. Oates chipping in with wins v Colin Fyles and Gordon Langshaw respectively. A 10-0 thrashing by CADWA 'C' was followed by a 6-4 victory over an under strength Bath St 'C'. G. Oates starred for Waterloo with wins over Karen Gibson and D. Cadwa 'D' opened with a 7-3 home win against **Bath Street 'F'**, a result certainly helped by the fact that **Bath Street** turned out a player short. **Cadwa** found themselves in the reverse situation a couple of weeks later when they visited **Bootle YM** when they also found themselves one short, showing tremendous fight on the night to take a draw from the game.

After surprising myself last season by getting my predictions

correct at both ends of the table, I am going to rest on my laurels and say that this season is going to be too tight to call! A lot will, as usual, depend on consistent availability of players, for example, how much of the season will **Harold House** have Eddie available for before he plays too many games up to be available for them, on the other hand they do seem to have a stronger "back-up" squad this season compared to previous campaigns. **Maghull 'A'** seem to have a settled squad with strength throughout, and will be there or thereabouts at the end along with **Harold House** and **Liverpool YM**, possibly **Wavertree Labour 'D'** managing to sneak into the shake-up.

In Memoriam

Alex Gould Bath St 1919-1984.



It would be impossible for me to go back to Alex Gould's beginnings at Bath St, mainly because in the first place I was not a member at that time in 1948 when Alex and several other enthusiasts (some of them still alive today, two of which attended our 50 years in existence celebration in 1998) laid the foundations of a table tennis club which today is just about the largest on Merseyside in the Liverpool League.

My earliest recollection of Bath St is joining sometime in the late 50s and Alex was a person I never really came into contact with. We did not run as many teams then and we played wherever Alex told us to. Playing wise I do not recall ever playing Alex at any time until well into the 70s in a club competition. I know I was beaten out of sight, not having come up against many "pen holders", and certainly not of Alex's calibre. Alex was at his peak then and was probably still playing in the 1st Div. The only time the club met as a body was at the pre-season Handbook meeting and Alex chaired the meeting and did most of the talking. This is when we learned which team we were to be in. Alex hated for any team to play short and could always be relied on to find a player from somewhere, he would even take teams in his car; and always his own team by car.

Alex was not a person you could get to know and kept himself mainly to himself and it wasn't until the early nineties, when I had passed my County Umpires exam and started to umpire at British League and Nat Vets comps in the company of Alex that I learned more about him. He let me umpire my first match at Oldham on a Saturday afternoon. I did one match he did the other seven not having seen any matches outside our club I was amazed by the high standard of play in the Nat Vets league. I watched Alex check the room and the table, plus the net and nothing started till he was ready. Mabel Neary came with us on lots of occasions and I also got to know her quite well at the end. Mabel was the map reader and reminder to Alex when to turn etc. Later on I realised driving with Alex was both educational and stimulating. And it paid to stay awake as not for the first time having dozed off on the way home to awake and find we were coming back a totally different way to the way we had gone. There was never any admittance we had taken the wrong turning, instead something like "I've found a short cut" seemed to explain it all away. I did not mention the extra miles we had travelled.

Alex did a lot of community work and I learned he worked at the Law Courts in the city helping to serve the teas at the tea bar. He also was involved in the Meals on wheels scheme delivering meals throughout Crosby, and latterly with the Crossroads Centre in Crosby. He would be very pleased that this centre has now relocated to new purpose built premises, just down the road from where they used to be. He also used his carpentry skills to carry out many repair jobs at the club and there was practically nothing he could not do, and when there was a job not within his scope, such as electricity; he would find someone who could do it.

Alex was a magnificent worker and influence at Bath St and certainly kept the club running in days when the present committee were earning a living and too busy to get involved. I have certainly found the job of secretary and match secretary a time consuming one, and this with the help of a computer and willing committee. His last unfulfilled ambition was to win a medal in a world competition for 80 year olds, and this he achieved, I think it was in 2000 at Vancouver. We aim to keep the club going and if we do move to new premises in the future I am sure we will find a way to perpetuate Alex's achievements over the last 55 years.

Apart from table tennis Ollie loved his football (LFC) but he was most happy when hitching up the caravan and heading to the country with family and friends to a Caravan Rally.

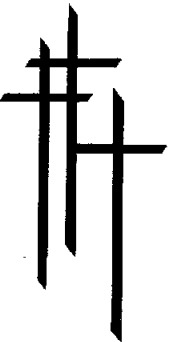
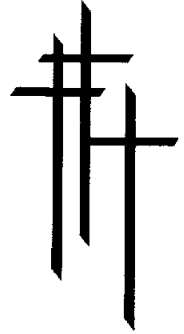
Ollie could trace his lineage back to the Nigerian Royal Family and his family referred to him as 'The Gentle Prince'.

Previous changes to the service law still being ignored it comes as no surprise that the changes from September 2003 have also been ignored. There are players still shielding the ball and too many offenders who do not throw the ball up or throw it back. Hopefully next season the amendment requiring the ball to be thrown up substantially higher than the current 6 inches having narrowly failed to receive the required majority will again be put forward and carried. If this does happen we will need to ensure it is fully implemented.



Players who do not either throw the ball up or throw it back take advantage of the reluctance of others to fault them and so gain an unfair advantage and at the same time indulging in what is basically a form of cheating.

How many of us bother to ensure our club equipment is suitable for match play at league standards? I was reminded of this failure by clubs when playing at Harold House as they were using clip on supports of dubious quality and it was virtually impossible to correctly tension the net and just as impossible to adjust it to the correct height. I won one of my sets not because I was the better player, which I was not, but because I got numerous nets the lack of tension causing the ball to just drop onto the table. My opponent was justifiably annoyed but at fault was his club and its players who were content to use inferior equipment rather than pay out for a good quality net and supports.

Have a look at your club match equipment and if damaged or of poor quality do yourself and the league a favour and get rid of it. An

already decimated 5th division has been further reduced by the enforced withdrawal of a Bath St team due to loss of players. Look around you and count how many players have joined your club during the past three seasons and how many you have lost. The number joining is unlikely to be more than one and more than likely it will be none. Now ask yourself what have you or your club done about bringing in new blood and the answer will again be big zero. Our league is getting smaller and smaller each season and our players are getting correspondingly older.

A subject near to my heart is that of our having our own premises and the continuing reduction in club venues is as big a threat to the league as loss of players and we need to address both these problems. We have been content to make use of cheap or no cost venues whilst splashing out on costly rubbers and blades. Consider how much our sport would gain if we had a league HQ and were able to play a full division on one night and always be assured of a place to practice.

The YMCA are possibly the only club certain of gaining new players as table tennis playing students tend to look for the presence of a YMCA in the certain knowledge that most towns and cities have one. But in the not too distant future even this long serving club may not have a TT facility available to them.

I am actively pressing for suitable premises to be made available to us and am confident of eventual success but success will require clubs and players to start paying for the use of such a facility and ensuring its success by means of visible and frequent support. Those I speak to within the council rightly question our ability to financially support a venue and want to know what kind of physical support such a venture would receive. I am optimistic in my responses for I know that the benefits would far outweigh the disadvantages. I am also convinced that with a place of our own we would be able to encourage youngsters to take up our sport and ensure the continuance of our league. What I can never be certain of is the support of you the members but I keep trying and hoping that if manage to get a foot in the door you will all ensure that it is pushed wide open.

Hints were made last season in the division one notes concerning the use of foul language accompanied at times by unacceptable behaviour but is it not time that we brought this issue out into the open and did something about it. I have heard rumours of the unacceptable

behaviour and language of one recently returned player but as with the foul service issue we all turn a blind eye and pretend it is not happening. The more often we turn a blind eye the more this problem will increase and we need to nip it in the bud now and not let it fester.

Judging from comments on scorecards and views of league players the introduction of 11 up has not been well received but it is here to stay and 21 up become history. The views of our members are being repeated throughout the country and the ETTA are concerned as to a possible backlash next season with leagues withdrawing their affiliation. This is unlikely to happen but it is worth bearing in mind that all too often those at the top are out of touch with grassroots views and this applies particularly to ITTF officials and committees. They will tell you that affiliated associations voted this change in but omit to say that this change, like the bigger ball, came from think tanks, better known as Committees, within the ITTF whose main pur-

pose is to change the face of our sport to fit in with their perception of table tennis as a TV force. This helps guarantee their existence and ensures continuance of their cosy freebies round the world. The last thing in their minds is the views or opinions of players below the international stage and you can be certain that they see us as nonentities and international players as their personal cannon fodder.

In many respects the ITTF whose finances come mainly from grassroots of table tennis is a closed shop open only to those whose faces fit and if at any time a face that fits falls out of favour it is ejected as Colin Clemett was with out a word of thanks and more often than not no one is ever aware they have been classed as 'not wanted on voyage' until it is all over.

Should you ever decide to communicate with one of these godly figures (that is how committee chairmen see themselves) you will only get a reply if your communication is non controversial or does not question their judgement.

How do I know this, because I have tested the water?

I suppose that is still the main problem today, most of us still tend to play from small rooms, competing with many other activities for the 'room', usually without any spare capacity for rearranged games.

If Ken's comments above seem promising, players need to start thinking about what our collective thoughts are, in order to give the backing that will be required for any future scheme. Any thoughts would be gratefully appreciated and printed.

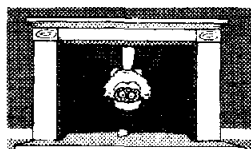
